MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

The Chief Clerk, Megan Allen, read the following:

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, since the adjournment of the 2019 General Session of the Sixty–third Legislature of the State of Utah, certain matters have arisen which require immediate legislative attention; and

WHEREAS, Article VII, Section 6 of the Constitution of the State of Utah provides that the Governor may, by proclamation, convene the Legislature into Special Session;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Gary R. Herbert, Governor of the State of Utah, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Utah, do by this Proclamation call the Sixty–third Legislature of the State of Utah into a First Special Session at the Utah State Capitol, in Salt Lake City, Utah, on the 16th day of September 2019, at 6:00 pm, to consider the following:

1. Amendments to medical cannabis laws to repeal requirements regarding a state central fill pharmacy and other amendments necessary to ensure the efficient and safe implementation and operation of the state’s medical cannabis program;

2. Amendments to the Utah Election Code regarding the date of the 2020 primary election and technical amendments;
3. Amendments to the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act regarding the transportation and storage of certain heavy beer prior to November 1, 2019;
4. Legislative approval of and appropriations for the settlement of lawsuits against the state;
5. Amendments to certain tax incentives regarding the review required by an independent certified public accountant and technical amendments;
6. Appropriations for the 2020 United States Census; and
7. For the Senate to consent to appointments made by the Governor.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

Roll call showed all members present.

On motion of Representative Gibson, the House voted to print Speaker Wilson's remarks and the prayer given by Elder Craig C. Christensen upon the pages of the House Journal.

REMARKS BY SPEAKER BRAD R. WILSON

My fellow members of the Utah House of Representatives, welcome to the 2020 General Legislative Session.

The opening day of the general session is always an exciting one. I know many of you have family, friends, and other important guests joining you in the Chamber today. As we stand at the commencement of another 45–days of discussion, debate and decisions, I welcome you all to the People’s House.

Representatives – there is a reason you were elected to be in the chamber, this session, this new decade, representing your district and serving the State of Utah. The next 45 days will help us understand why.

Today is the first legislative session of the 2020s. As in decades past, we face significant issues, and how we address them will significantly impact the direction of our state for years and decades to come. We have an economy that is evolving, our population is growing at an unprecedented rate, and we are charged with educating a tech–savvy generation of students who will operate in and change the world in ways we can scarcely imagine.

(Sounds easy enough. Right?)

It’s a great responsibility. And it’s a great opportunity.

I mention technology, which is not only changing today’s classrooms, it is changing the way we work here on the hill, as well. While we are an institution steeped in tradition that operates today much as it always has, we also enjoy unprecedented capabilities to connect with the people we represent.

In light of recent events, let me be clear about the elephant/or donkey in the room.

Legislation by referendum, while a part of the political process, can be divisive and many times short of facts. It has proven ruinous for states that have turned away from the basic principles of a democratic republic.

Our neighbors elected us to immerse ourselves in the details of each policy, weigh the various interests, drawbacks, and benefits. It is a significant amount of trust. But on many complex issues our constituents are an essential part of the process. They play an important role in shaping the policy decisions we make. Their voice is important.

We must find new ways of both listening and explaining to our constituents the issues we face and the decisions we make to address them.

As we open this session, let us each commit and let us collectively commit to employing the considerable resources available to us in our quest to serve as the voice of the people. As I have said before, we are not foes on a political battlefield; we are all Utahns committed to getting the policy right.

This year, we celebrate two important historical events: the 100th anniversary of the passage of the 19th Amendment, which gave women the right to vote, and the 150th anniversary of the first vote cast by a woman, which occurred right here in Salt Lake City. That event is memorialized in the painting of Seraph Young above the doors to this Chamber.

Those important milestones changed the course of history for the better. They have helped this body be more representative of the people and opened the door for women to serve and lead. Today our capital city and the state's most populated county are led by women, both of whom are with us here today.

I first want to recognize and welcome the mayor of our capital city, Erin Mendenhall. On behalf of the whole House, I extend our congratulations and wish her well in her new role.

The prosperity of our capital city is inextricably linked with the prosperity of our state, and I personally look forward to working with Mayor Mendenhall on the many important issues we face.

I also want to recognize and welcome Salt Lake County Mayor Jenny Wilson. Her leadership on mental health issues and homelessness is noteworthy, and I look forward to working with her to address these significant challenges going forward.

I have two incredible daughters, and I hope they can look to Mayors Mendenhall and Wilson as well as female legislators as inspirational examples of the importance of public service. To women throughout our state: We need your voice, we need your experience, we need you to be an active part of this important process.

The demands of serving in public office are significant for us individually and our families collectively.

Now I want to mention another Jeni Wilson—the one I am married to. Jeni is my sounding board, my confidant, my gluten free chef and as I know in our home and now out it – the SHW. Her willingness and sacrifice which allows me to serve in this role are nothing short of saintly, and that is true of every spouse, partner, and family of the members of the House. Please join me in thanking all of them for this selfless service to our state.

Representatives, I imagine that those who sat in this Chamber in years gone by probably felt much the same as each of us feels today. They faced challenges. They had ideas to make things better. And they wanted Utah to fulfill its potential.

President Harry Truman said, “Men [and women] make history and not the other way around. In periods where there is no leadership, society stands still.

Progress occurs when courageous, skillful leaders seize the opportunity to change things for the better.”

The challenges we face as lawmakers are real. The issues we tackle are complex, and at times it seems as though we’re taking two steps forward and one step back. But I believe in this room we have the commitment to service, determination, and the foresight to solve any challenge. As we plan for the future and look to the opportunities ahead, I want to share with you some things I hope we can accomplish together.

(The House watched a Penna Powers video, “Where We’re Going”)

I’d like to thank Representative Carl Albrecht, who apparently moonlights as a voice over actor.

The issues in that video are just a few of the policy decisions we will consider in this chamber over the next 45 days. I believe much of our state’s success has grown from wise decisions made by representatives who sat in these chairs in the past.

In contemplating the exciting decisions before us, I borrowed this quote from a dear friend, “The best way to predict the future is to invent the future.” That’s what we’re here to do today.

To invent Utah’s future, we must embrace many of the ideals that have shaped Utah into the remarkable place it is today: **Industry, compassion, and faith.**

These are among the core elements that have made Utah what it is today and they are essential to our efforts going forward.

Industry

First, I want to speak about industry. Industry isn’t just hard work it’s organized, focused, collaborative work. As we embark on a new decade, in this modern century, we could be quick to forget the lessons of those who planted the first seeds of our community.

When the pioneers first arrived, the only resource available to them was land. And by most standards, it wasn’t much of a resource. In fact, most considered it utterly inhospitable.

In late June of 1847, Brigham Young encountered mountain man Jim Bridger. Brigham Young was eager for any available information about the Salt Lake Valley and asked Bridger about the local terrain. Bridger told him he thought it

unwise to bring a large population into the area and said he'd "give a thousand dollars for a bushel of corn raised in the basin."

According to witnesses, Brigham Young responded, "Wait a little, and we will show you." Then Brigham Young and the pioneer families who came with him to the valley set to work.

They shaped the land through sheer will and effort, converting the arid desert soil into productive farm and ranch land. I don't know if Brigham Young ever collected that thousand dollars, but we've produced far more than a bushel of corn.

Along with the rest of the country, we've rolled from the agrarian age to the opening of the 4th industrial revolution. As the years have passed, we've mixed our ability to embrace the new while preserving the fundamental elements of distinctive Utah. Today, the pace of innovation is impacting all of Utah's citizens and industries, from agriculture to manufacturing to the most white-collar of professions. As technology continues to make our lives better by doing more of the jobs we've always done, how will it impact the fundamental way our economy and society operate?

Like our courageous forebears who produced bushels of corn from a dusty basin, we will continue to build and lead through an ongoing commitment to industry and cooperation, whatever the challenge.

Compassion

The second ideal is compassion.

Concern for our neighbors is deeply ingrained in our state's culture, and I believe it has been a driving factor in our success. From our youngest to our most senior citizens, from the most liberal to the most conservative, from the rural areas of Utah to our urban centers, our ability to come together in a spirit of community and compassion sets an example to which our increasingly fractured nation can look.

A few months ago, Kelli Snider was driving down State Route 165 near Providence when she saw a young man standing on the shoulder of the road. Something struck Kelli as out of place. After putting gas in her car, she turned around and went back. The young man was still there.

Pushing aside the trepidation she undoubtedly felt, Kelli tapped him on the arm and asked, "Are you feeling suicidal?" As Kelli describes it, "with tears in his eyes, he reached into his pocket and handed me a long, handwritten suicide note."

Kelli invited the young man to sit in her car. She reassured him that he had value and that he was loved and encouraged him to hang on. Her compassion saved a life and prevented untold heartache among those who know and love that young man. At a time when two Utahns die from suicide, and 13 Utahns are treated for suicide attempts each day, we need more people like Kelli Snider.

We are doing better to remove the societal stigma related to mental health issues. During this session, we will have the opportunity to consider several bills seeking to address mental health and prevent suicide. I can think of nothing more important than doing everything we can to reach out to those in need and ensure they know they have an important place among us.

This compassion is reflected as our state consistently leads the nation in volunteerism. It is reflected in our enthusiastic welcoming of refugees seeking a better and more stable life. And reminds us that we must continue to foster the right political dialogue that is civil, issue-focused, and defined by our common ground rather than by our differences.

Utah's future success is dependent on our compassionate commitment to reach out and help one another as Kelli Snider taught us on Route 165 one afternoon.

Faith

The third and final principle that has brought us to where we are is faith, faith in God and faith in one another.

Joining us today are some of the leaders of Utah's faith communities:

- The Right Reverend Scott Hayashi, Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Utah
- Imaam Osama Hussein of the Khadeeja Islamic Center

Please join me in welcoming these excellent and dedicated leaders. Each of you embodies faith in God, which has been a bedrock element of our state's culture and identity and a key ingredient in the success of our blessed state.

According to the Pew Research Center, a vast majority of Utahns profess a belief in God. Because of our fundamentally connected faith in God, Utah is a haven for individuals seeking a sense of community and belonging.

That faith is what ultimately led early pioneers to settle here. Since then, Utah has become a place where interfaith collaboration results in compassionate cooperation unrivaled anywhere in America.

Organizations like Catholic Community Services, the Asian Association of Utah, Jewish Family Services, and The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints set aside differences in belief and link arms to help refugees, the homeless, and other vulnerable populations to establish new homes and lead lives of dignity and meaning.

Without question, Utah is a place where religious faith strengthens both public and private lives.

Representatives – A second aspect of faith that has brought us to where we are is faith in one another. I have been personally enriched and strengthened by the sense of unity that our shared public service creates. I have made friends that will last a lifetime, and hopefully beyond, serving shoulder to shoulder with you. This unity can empower us to face the future with optimism and courage.

It is my hope that we will emulate the devotion of our faith community's leaders and become empowered to lead and lead together with faith in one another.

As we move into a new era in our state's history, there is no finer group of people with whom I would rather serve with. Thank you for your sacrifice, for your service, and your unwavering commitment.

May our path forward be paved by industry, our actions defined by compassion, and our way illuminated by faith in God and faith in one another.

Now, let's get to work.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

On motion of Representative Tim Hawkes, the House voted, by a two-thirds majority, to adopt House Rules, Joint Rules, and Interim Rules as were adopted by the 2019 Second Special Session of the 63rd Legislature, until such time as new rules may be adopted by the 2020 General Session of the 63rd Legislature.

On motion of Representative Tim Hawkes, and as allowed by the Utah Constitution and the Joint Rules of the Legislature, the House voted, by a two-thirds majority, to continue its practice of reading only the short title of bills and resolutions as they are introduced or considered on a House calendar and not read the long title of the bills and resolutions, unless a majority of the House directs the reading of the long title, short title, or both, of any House or Senate bill or resolution.

JOINT CONVENTION

The Joint Convention was called to order by President Adams at 2:20 p.m. A quorum of both the House of Representatives and the Senate were present.

Supreme Court Justices in attendance: Chief Justice Durrant, Associate Chief Justice Lee, Justice Himonas, Justice Pearce, and Justice Petersen.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

On motion of Senator Vickers, the Legislature resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole for the purpose of hearing Chief Justice Durrant's State of the Judiciary address.

STATE OF THE JUDICIARY BY CHIEF JUSTICE MATTHEW DURRANT

"Thank you, Speaker and President. It is a lot better for me to give one speech. And I very much appreciate the willingness of you to do this. I count it a real privilege to be able to speak to you. It's one of the great privileges and responsibilities I have as chief justice, and it is a chance to thank you for your dedication to Utah's citizens. I know that you are here at considerable sacrifice of time and purse. And just so you know, you are appreciated; your work is appreciated, certainly by the judiciary. We are also grateful for how supportive you have been to us over the years.

I am joined here on the floor by my colleagues. They have already been introduced. I can tell you they are good and decent people who also happen to be extraordinary jurists. I am also joined by our judicial council. They are sitting right up there. These are judges. We have one bar representative as well. These are judges who have been elected by their peers to make policy decisions on behalf of the judiciary and develop a budget for the judiciary. They do all this in addition to their day jobs, and they do it very well. We have never had such an invested and energetic council. I am also pleased to be joined on the floor by Judge Mary Noonan and Cathy Dupont. Judge Noonan is our state court administrator. She has been in the position about a year now, and she has already demonstrated ten times over that she is a leader of exceptional vision and gifts. Cathy Dupont is cut from the same cloth. I think many of you know her personally from her almost 20 years

of service in the Office of Legislative Research and General Counsel. I can say that, as to our administrative leadership, the state of the judiciary is strong. I have never been more thrilled with our top administrators.

I would like to begin my remarks by telling you about my favorite ancestor, William Durrant. He's my great-grandfather on my father's side. He lived in American Fork. We call it "American Fark." I get to say that. Those are my people. He was a slight man, a quiet man, and he had a bit of a drinking problem. The truth is he was likely an alcoholic. He was not a churchgoer, but he always made it a point, whenever there was a rain storm on a Sunday, to go out early to the muddy road between his neighborhood and the church so that he could carry the neighborhood kids across. That way they wouldn't dirty their Sunday best shoes. Now that may seem like a very small thing, but to me it seemed like a very big thing.

In researching William's life, I came across his obituary. It was a classic. I learned that they spared no punches in those days when it came to obituaries. It said something like this: "William Durrant died this past Saturday. He was survived by his wife, Eliza." And then it listed his children. It next listed his job as "willow thrasher." I didn't know that was a thing. He supported his family somehow. And then there was the line that really struck me and I remember it exactly. The obituary read, "William Durrant was prominent in neither the church, nor the community." Okay. But you know what? He was prominent to me. And he was prominent to all those kids. He was prominent to Eliza. He was prominent enough to me that, if not for him, you would be listening to someone else giving a much better speech right now. I wonder if perhaps that is something we should all keep in mind as leaders: everybody is prominent to somebody, and as leaders, they ought to be prominent to us. Every person matters.

I am reminded of this every time I have a chance to speak at a drug court graduation. These are events like no other. If you ever have a chance to go to one, please do. When I speak it is in the Matheson Courthouse in the supreme court courtroom. Let me paint the picture for you. It's always packed to the rafters. It's a big courtroom. Standing room only. Up front sit the graduates, maybe 10 to 15 individuals. On the other side, facing the audience, are the judges who have worked with them. And as I wait to speak, I like to look out at the audience, I am always struck by what a varied and rich cross section of humanity they are. And I am struck by how different they are in so many ways. They are different in how they dress for this event. For some, it's very formal, all dressed up. For others, it's jeans and t-shirts. And that is okay. They're different ages. Always a number of grandparents represented. Moms, dads, teenagers. We usually can count on maybe two or three babies. Sometimes quiet, sometimes not. That is okay too. They come from different socioeconomic backgrounds. They no doubt have had dramatically

different life experiences. And they no doubt have had widely differing world views. But they share one common experience, one common bond. They know what it's like to love an addict. They know what an emotional roller coaster that is. They know what it's like to have their hopes rise at the slightest sign of progress only to have them dashed by a relapse or some kind of setback. They know how their loved one, their special someone's addiction seems to fully occupy their lives. They know what it's like to hope and pray that somehow, something will happen before it is too late.

So because I understand all of this, my main goal when I speak to them is to be very short. They don't care what I have to say. I am just the guy standing between them and the event they have been waiting for their loved one's, their prominent one's graduation. And it is a big deal. Drug court is a rigorous program that requires perseverance and patience. Will some ultimately relapse? Sadly, yes. But many will not. For many this will mark a permanent changing point. So I sit down, their names are called, they come across the courtroom, and their certificates are awarded. They often receive them through tears. They often want to, and they do, hug their judge. Apart from this event, there's not a whole lot of hugging that goes on in our supreme court courtroom. But it is great.

After all of the certificates are awarded, they are given a chance to speak should they so wish. They all, always, so wish, because they want to thank all the people who have helped them get to this point. They want to thank their judge. They call her, "My judge." They say she was tough when she needed to be, but patient when she needed to be. Sometimes they will say, "My judge was the first person in authority to ever say a kind word to me. The first person in authority to ever believe in me." They want to thank the court clerk. They want to thank the whole drug court team. Their therapist, their social worker, their defense lawyer, sometimes even the prosecutor. It is a team effort. But most of all they want to thank those people in that audience. Those people whom they caused such pain but who did not give up on them. It moves me every time. And it is a powerful reminder to me that everyone is prominent, that treatment can work to improve lives, and that treatment plays an absolutely vital role in our criminal justice system, in our efforts to reduce recidivism, and in our efforts to reduce crime.

This is the core principle on which you have founded your various criminal-justice reform efforts over the past several years. I know at times it has been difficult, a bit of a rocky road for sure, but I think you have shown real vision and foresight in what you have done.

Now, I would like to shift gears to another area where treatment is critical mental health. Our jails and prisons are our state's and our country's new de facto mental institutions. They house more people suffering from mental illness, or

mental conditions, than do our state-funded mental hospitals. That presents enormous challenges for the court system, for everyone in our communities. There is a great deal of work being done, starting with these two bodies. With the efforts I mentioned, with the funding you've provided, with your various decisions relative to Medicaid expansion, with the funding you provided for outpatient treatment, mobile crisis response teams, and student health programs. You have been very sensitive to this issue.

There is a lot of great work going on in the counties as well. I will give you just a couple of quick examples. Davis County has a brand-spanking new receiving center. This is a facility to provide temporary crisis treatment to those experiencing a drug or mental health crisis. They are able to go there, receive much needed treatment, be stabilized, and be connected with other resources in the community. Davis County has also created mobile crisis response teams. That's a group of mental health professionals who go directly to the home of a person who is experiencing a drug or mental health crisis. This is a remarkable thing to me. Sometimes they will go with a police officer. On some occasions, an individual may have committed a crime. If it is a non-violent, low-level offense, that police officer might, if the individual so elects, take him to the receiving center instead of arresting him. It is a wonderful way to keep people suffering from mental illness out of our criminal justice system altogether. It is a great example of collaboration. A joint effort of Davis County law enforcement, mental health professionals, and judges, as well as defense lawyers and prosecutors.

Another example is Washington County. There, they have a relatively new program to help people who suffer from drug dependency or mental health conditions transition from jail back to the community. Offer them a warmer transition. Help them find jobs. Help them find transportation, housing, medical, dental assistance, ongoing treatment for their particular problem, or even insurance coverage. This, too, is a joint effort. Corrections was involved, as was the CCJJ (the Commission on Criminal and Juvenile Justice) and Washington County Court Support Services. These are the kinds of wonderful things happening across our state.

We are proposing as a court system to serve as a convener for all of these stakeholders. We would like to bring them together in local communities. We have the infrastructure in place. We have the judges in place. We are only one of the many stakeholders in this process, but we are a significant stakeholder we have about 17 mental health courts right now. But we think we are uniquely positioned to bring the other stakeholders in the community together so that they can share their ideas, map what is being done, and identify gaps where the needs of those afflicted by a mental illness are not being met. I have very high hopes for this initiative. We are going to kick it off with a statewide conference this August. You

are all invited. I had the opportunity to share this with President Adams and Speaker Wilson and they have very graciously indicated their support. I hope we will have your support as well.

I want to quickly touch on just a couple of other things. One concerns access to justice. There is a crisis in this respect – an enormous gap between those who need legal help and the availability of services. People simply cannot afford a lawyer. I am not talking about big corporate lawsuits, high stakes litigation. I am talking about the kinds of legal problems you and I have. They are an inevitable part of our everyday lives. Whether it is a property question, a contract question, an insurance claim, wills, taxes, child support. The list goes on and on. People, certainly lower income people, but also middle income people, cannot afford to get the help that would be so useful to them in addressing these problems. We have tried a number of things to address this as a court system. We have tried to provide additional tools for self-represented parties and, over the past decade, that number of self-represented parties has skyrocketed. We have an online court assistance program and hundreds and hundreds of forms. This allows people, in a guided way, to address their legal issues. We also have our self-help center, which is a group of lawyers housed in Matheson. They receive calls and texts from your constituents all over the state. It is another tool to help people navigate their way through the judicial system. We have also created an online dispute resolution program. Some like to call it “pajama court.” It is not unlikely you might use it one day. I think I might use it one day. It is for matters under \$11,000. You can resolve your whole case online, try to settle it or, if that fails, have a judge decide it online.

We have also created a new profession, licensed paralegal practitioners. Think nurse practitioner for the legal profession. It is a way to get legal advice to people in a more affordable way. We have also, with the bar, emphasized the importance of pro bono service. And lawyers have been extraordinary generous with their time.

But even with all of these efforts, and they have been significant steps forward, a real gap remains – an access to justice gap. It is for this reason that our supreme court, at the request of bar leadership, created a work group in August of 2018. It was chaired by Justice Himonas, as well as John Lund, then immediate past president of the Bar. It included Dickson Burton, the then-president of the bar, Gordon Smith, the dean of the J. Reuben Clark Law School, as well as national and international experts. They worked hard for a year and in August of 2019, they presented their report to us. It included a number of recommendations. I won’t go through them all, because your time is precious. But I want to give you a sense of it and ensure its on your radar.

The work group recommended reforms that would allow lawyers more freedom in how they structure their business relationships, potentially even partnering with non-legal professionals; more freedom in how they market their services to the people who need them; more freedom in structuring fee-splitting and referral-fee contracts; and, perhaps most importantly, it would allow lawyers more freedom to develop new and innovative products and ways of delivering legal services. These things are not permitted under our current regulatory structure. The idea here is that we would like to reform our regulations for the administration of the legal profession in such a way as to provide more room for the free market to work. And we would like to invite more of a spirit of entrepreneurship into the legal profession, to explore new ways to get services to people not presently being served. We are going to do this in a thoughtful, data driven way. And where individuals, lawyers, and non-lawyers come to us with an idea and can provide adequate assurance of consumer protection, they will have the opportunity to market that idea. This is something I am very excited about.

Now, to conclude, I need to touch on our budget requests. It is time for me to ask you for money. Each year, we try to be responsible and modest in our requests because, like you, we respect the fact that this is the people's money. This year is no different. We are asking for just under \$1.2 million in on-going funds and \$450,000 in one-time funds. Most of this is for investment in technology. We need to fix the failing sound system in our West Jordan courthouse. We need to hire new IT professionals, a couple to maintain the online court assistance program that I have mentioned, and we need six additional people for our central office. We have almost doubled the number of applications we use to serve the public. Technology has greatly assisted us in meeting that responsibility. But our IT department is overwhelmed. I am told there is up to a 10-year backlog. So any funds you can allocate in that respect would be much appreciated. We are also asking for additional funds to move our self-help center service from four days a week to five. A lot of people across the state use this service, but we are able to respond to only about 30% of the calls we receive. Moving to five days a week will at least make a dent in that. And we are asking for additional funds for salary increases for our court commissioners so that we can attract and retain quality people. Finally, we are asking for on-going funds for a half-time child welfare mediator. This is a very important program that helps families in crisis resolve their dispute without having to take it to a courtroom.

On the topic of budget, let me thank you for what you allocated last year for our judicial assistants. That was deeply appreciated. We have wonderful employees in the court system. I know sometimes it is popular to criticize government workers as bureaucrats who are unresponsive or uncaring. That may be easy to do as long as they are viewed as an abstract group. But it is very different

when they are viewed as individuals. When I look at the individuals working in our court system, I see dedicated, hardworking people. There are exceptions. There always are. But, overwhelmingly, I see people who want to be a part of something bigger than themselves, who care about ensuring justice for Utah's citizens. I am proud of our employees. And I'm guessing that when it comes down to individuals, you feel the same way about your employees in this branch. I am also proud of our judges.

I am sure I brag way too much about them. But you know what? It is more than hometown cheerleading. We have a system, a constitutional system and in my view we are deeply fortunate as a state to have this system that is designed to pick judges based on merit. It is a selection process as rigorous as any in the country. It includes confidential evaluations by the various people lawyers have dealt with over the course of their careers. It is designed to ensure that only those lawyers who have developed a reputation for honesty, hard work, and integrity are selected as judges. So, yes, I am proud. And yes, the state of the judiciary is strong. You can see that I am a big fan of the judiciary. But we hope to get even better. And I hope I can report to you next year that we are. Our judicial council has voted to retain outside consultants to come in and tell us what we are doing right and what we are doing wrong, and how we can improve and be more responsive to our employees and to Utah's citizens. We are now in the middle of that evaluation.

That concludes my remarks but let me once again say how appreciative I am, and how appreciative my colleagues are, for how well you do your jobs. Just as President Adams said, you are recognized nationally for how well you do your work. And I am proud to say the same is true of the judiciary. We are viewed as a national model. Thank you so much for your time and for your accommodation."

On motion of Representative Gibson, the Committee of the Whole was dissolved.

President J. Stuart Adams called the Joint Convention to order at 6:15 p.m. in the Chamber of the Utah House of Representatives and recognized Brad R. Wilson, Speaker of the House.

President Adams announced that a quorum of the House of Representatives and the Senate was present.

President Adams appointed a Joint Committee comprised of Senators Evan Vickers, Dan Hemmert, and Karen Mayne, and Representatives Francis Gibson, Mike Schultz, and Brian King to notify Governor Gary R. Herbert that the 2020 General Session of the Sixty-Third Legislature is in Joint Convention and ready to hear his State of the State address.

President Adams acknowledged special guests and elected and appointed officials in attendance at the Joint Convention.

Senator Evan Vickers made a motion that the Legislature resolve into a Joint Convention and Committee of the Whole for the purpose of hearing Governor Herbert's State of the State address.

The Joint Committee escorted Governor Herbert to the House rostrum.

**STATE OF THE STATE ADDRESS
BY GOVERNOR GARY R. HERBERT**

President Adams, Speaker Wilson (Happy Birthday), members of the Legislature, justices of the Supreme Court, the First Lady of my life, Utah's First Lady, Jeanette, (thank you for your love and support), Lieutenant Governor Spencer and Mrs. Cox (thank you for your partnership and leadership), the other constitutional officers, and my fellow Utahns:

I am indeed grateful to be here to address you this evening.

I'd like to welcome our legislators back to the hill and also extend a special welcome to Representatives Candice Pierucci and Steve Christiansen, who are joining us for their first general legislative session.

My advice to them, and to all of you, is to roll up your sleeves and get to work, because we have a lot to do in the next 42 days.

For those who are keeping score, this is my 11th and my final State of the State address.

And I give this speech tonight full of renewed hope and optimism for Utah's future.

I have learned much in my ten and a half years as governor.

And as I reflect on our state's successes, I feel humbled and grateful for the opportunity to serve alongside all of you, and to see firsthand the impact Utahns are having on improving our state.

Tonight, I'd like to express the deep respect and admiration I have for the people of Utah. I would like to speak directly to them for just a moment:

You are kind-hearted people.

You do good wherever you live.

It is your hard work that helps bolster our economy.

It is your kindness and service that make us the most charitable state in the nation.

You care about your neighbors. You volunteer.

It is your hopeful spirit and work ethic that make Utah the best place in the nation to live, to work, and to raise a family.

You are the main reason for our success.

Thank you for all that you do to make Utah great.

As directed by the Utah Constitution, I'm here tonight to report to you on the State of our State and to "recommend such measures as may be deemed expedient."

To say that the State of our State is excellent would be a gross understatement.

Utah is thriving and we are in the best position economically that we have ever been in our state's history.

We are leading the nation in job growth!

Our unemployment rate is at an all-time low of 2.3 percent!

And what that means is that our state's economy has created over 312,600 new jobs since the Great Recession.

We have the largest middle class in America.

Here in Utah, people are living the American dream of upward mobility the best in the nation.

Personal income is growing by approximately 7 percent per year, which is the second highest rate in the nation.

And if that's not enough, our household income is now the seventh highest in the nation.

And if that's *STILL* not enough, Utahns now have the lowest state tax obligation in 27 years.

In addition, our education system has improved dramatically, with high school graduation rates improving by 11.4 percentage points since I became governor.

Our student achievement is no longer at the middle of the pack on tests that compare states one to another. Today, our students score in the top ten in almost every subject.

Our goal to have the best education system in America is clearly within reach!

We've also seen tremendous successes in higher education, including in our technical and vocational training colleges.

We've seen improvements in transportation and infrastructure, in healthcare, and in many other areas.

I could go on and on, but ... you get the picture. The State of our State is well, it's just the best.

Utah is leading the way today. And by the way, Utah has led the way in the past.

This year, we celebrate the 100th anniversary of the passage of the 19th Amendment women's suffrage, the right to vote! It's also been 150 years since Seraph Young became the first woman in the nation to vote, right here in Utah!

This year we are even sending Dr. Martha Hughes Cannon to Washington to remind everyone that Utah women voted first!

In honor of this event, I would like to ask all of our female elected officials, who are carrying on the legacy of Dr. Cannon, to stand and be recognized. You are proving that a Utah woman's place is in the House AND in the Senate!

This evening, let us look forward to the challenges of the future with hope, optimism and with focus.

Let us determine WHAT we need to accomplish NOW for the future generations and for the decades to come.

We've gathered here at the start of not just a new legislative session, but at the literal dawn of a new decade.

Our quality of life has never been better. And our FUTURE has never been brighter!

Utah has always represented a better tomorrow.

Our pioneer ancestors journeyed to the Salt Lake Valley in search of a better life and new opportunities.

On their journey, they planted crops that they would never harvest, and improved trails on which they would never again set foot.

They did this because they knew that there would be others who would follow...

TODAY, new, modern-day pioneers are still coming here in search of a better life and new opportunities.

One such person is Mohammad Alsoudani, a 23-year-old refugee from Iraq, who came to America six years ago.

In high school, he worked a part-time job to help support his family while working hard to graduate and to learn English.

After graduation, he signed up for computer programming courses taught at our Refugee Education and Training Center.

His hard work paid off. He is now employed by NAV, a tech company in Salt Lake. He is making a six-figure salary.

He reminds us all of what my Dad used to say, WORK WILL WIN WHEN WISHY WASHY WISHING WON'T!

Mohammad is here with us tonight, along with other representatives of our refugee community some of today's modern pioneers.

Mohammad's success is impressive, but what I find truly remarkable about his story is that he now volunteers at the same Refugee Education and Training Center where he once studied.

He is helping others on their journey.

He is improving the trail for those who are coming after him.

He and his colleagues embody the same pioneering spirit that has defined us since 1847. Refugees then and now, are an important thread that has been woven into the tapestry of our state and our lives. Please join with me in recognizing their contributions.

Significant challenges, though, do lie ahead for us.

For example, projections show our population will reach 5.8 million by the year 2065.

Growth IS coming to the state of Utah. And we must plan for that growth, and proactively prepare the way for those who are coming.

Our success in Utah has not been by luck, accident, or serendipity.

It has been by DESIGN, and it comes as the result of proper planning, and developing good policies that empower the private sector.

In my last ten and a half years as governor, I have learned that every success creates not only new challenges but also new opportunities!

The 2010s have been the most successful decade in Utah's history.

Let us work together to make sure that the 2020s are an EVEN BETTER decade.

So, let's now focus on the challenges and opportunities that growth is bringing.

More people will mean we need more housing. So, how do we ensure housing affordability?

More people will drive more cars and create more traffic. So, what changes will need to be made to avoid a California-like gridlock in traffic, and time-consuming commutes?

More cars will create the potential for added pollution. So, how do we protect the air that we breathe?

Your actions as a Legislature over these next 42 days will be instrumental in answering these, and many other important questions.

Above me are the Latin words “Vox Populi” – which literally means the “voice of the people.”

The voice of the people is an essential part of representative government, and it is the reason that the tax bill passed during December’s special session will NOT be implemented.

But tax policy is complex. And tax modernization is still needed in order to have sustainable funding for public education, Medicaid, and other critical, core government services.

I appreciate your efforts on this very difficult issue.

But we need to continue this discussion with the people of Utah. We need to improve the dialogue. We need to build consensus, and we need to take the time to find solutions that are fair and equitable, AND that will serve the best interests and the long-term needs of the people. I know we can do that.

Most of you will remember that in the depths of the great recession, I set the goal for Utah to not only come out of the recession, but to become the top performing economy in the nation.

By continuing to rely on sound economic principles, we can ensure that this success will continue for decades to come.

And TODAY, as a result of our efforts, we NOW have the healthiest and most diverse economy in the United States!

One of the challenges that still remains economically is to ensure job opportunities to the nearly 25 percent of our people that live in rural Utah.

As I travel from county to county, I recognize that Utahns love the beauty, peace and serenity of the road less traveled, such as Highway 10 through Ferron, or Highway 130 through Minersville, or through Rep. Casey Snider’s hometown of Paradise.

Many Utahns don’t want to just vacation in rural Utah, they want to live there, and to work there, and to raise their families there.

But raising a family in rural Utah requires stable employment.

And many rural families are searching for better job opportunities closer to home.

The good news is that according to our Department of Workforce Services, we are on track to exceed our goal of creating 25,000 new jobs in rural Utah by the end of this year.

For example, the Utah Advanced Materials and Manufacturing Initiative is finding new ways to turn coal into carbon fiber.

The Utah Rural Online Initiative is empowering rural residents with new career options.

Our successful efforts to develop broadband throughout the state are setting the foundation for opportunities we can't yet even imagine.

And thanks to technology and our telecommuting initiative, we've moved many state jobs to communities off of the Wasatch Front.

From Panguitch to Providence, and from Richfield to Richmond, we are making significant progress.

But we all agree that WE WILL NOT REST until all 249 cities and towns, in all of our 29 counties, are thriving economically.

But ensuring a high quality of life isn't just about the jobs it's also about the environment that we live in.

I'm pleased to note that in the past decade, air pollution in our state has decreased by over 30 percent!

We've also worked hard to bring Tier 3 fuels to the state.

Newer cars using this fuel can see an 80 percent reduction in emissions, which is like taking four out of every five cars off of the road.

However, as our population grows, so does the potential for increased pollution and crowding.

We need to ensure that our children have safe places to play, clean air to breathe and good water to drink.

Salt Lake City's new mayor, Erin Mendenhall, in indicating a desire for more collaboration with the State, has said that Utah "has an incredible opportunity to ensure continued growth, financial stability, and environmental viability by helping shift commuters onto public transit."

We do need to boldly reimagine our roads to safely accommodate cars, mass transit, bikes, pedestrians, and even those scooters.

We should make commuting by transit as easy as commuting by car.

Therefore, as President Adams has recommended, we do need to double-track sections of Frontrunner. WHY? So we can run trains every 15 minutes, instead of every half an hour.

In my budget, I set aside a \$34 million down payment toward improvements in heavy rail, light rail, and bus transit.

Also in my budget recommendations, I set aside \$66 million for fast electric vehicle charging stations, to help accommodate the growing use of electric automobiles on Utah's roads.

This \$100 million investment in our transportation and mass transit is a necessary step toward improving the air that we breathe.

Thanks to you all for taking this issue seriously especially members of our Clean Air Caucus, including legislators like Luz Escamilla and Patrice Arent, Steve Handy and Todd Weiler and many others includingUCAIR, the Utah Clean Air Partnership for your work on improving air quality.

In addition to putting pressure on our transportation system, Utah's continued growth has created a very tight housing market, which is driving up the costs to purchase or to rent.

It's time to consider making our land use zoning laws, and building codes more responsive to our growing population and market needs when it comes to housing affordability.

This means we need to reimagine what our communities and houses will look like in the future.

By thinking creatively, and working in collaboration with our cities and counties, we can help change the landscape of our housing market, and help design neighborhoods that our children and grandchildren will want to live in, and just as importantly that they can afford to live in.

This will be difficult, but it is needful, and it will be worth the effort.

In the last three years, the State has worked with Salt Lake City to change how we help those experiencing homelessness.

I express my appreciation to Lieutenant Governor Cox for his compassion on this issue, and for his leadership in bringing people together to find solutions.

This past year saw the opening of three new resource centers, which provide shelter, food, medical care, employment assistance, community support, and help in finding long-term housing.

These centers are changing lives.

It is our responsibility, and the role of government, to make sure that our state provides unparalleled opportunity and quality of life for the people that we represent.

I'm grateful to all those who work to focus their efforts on helping the most vulnerable citizens among us.

I share the vision of my friend, Pamela Atkinson, the Mother Theresa of Utah, who said:

“We want to help individuals and families who are experiencing homelessness to be able to attain safe housing, and enjoy positive life activity by finding a good job with a livable income, so that all may have a productive and meaningful life!”

Pamela, we all share that goal with you.

Ladies and gentlemen, all of the planning we do for the future success of our state all of the energy and time we invest in supporting its economy will do very little if we do not put our children and their education first in every decision that we make.

If we want to plan for the future, if we want to plan for growth, we would be wise to invest directly in the people who will lead Utah in the future our children.

Throughout my time as governor, education has been my number one priority.

I've often said that education is not all about the money, but it is some about the money.

I appreciate that with the adoption of this year's budget, you will have invested an additional 2.6 billion dollars in our school children in K-12 over the last nine years.

On behalf of students, their parents, their grandparents, teachers, the business community and nearly everyone in the state we say thank you to the Legislature, for your commitment to education!

These have been necessary and important steps in the right direction, and I urge you to stay the course!

I realize that providing the best education possible to our students is not only about the dollars spent, but also about the people who are teaching our children.

I have such respect for our teachers, and for their dedication to our students. They deserve our trust and our support. They get the big picture.

This year's teacher of the year, Lauren Merkley, is here with us tonight, and she is one such teacher who gets it.

Her vision is that Utah will lead not just in test scores, but in an education system that meets the individual needs of every student a system unafraid of innovation, dedicated to equitable practices, and filled with teachers expertly versed in both content and compassion.

Please join with me as we recognize her, our teacher of the year and express appreciation for all of the teachers in Utah!

And by the way, compassion is so important in our schools not just with our very young students, but also with students in middle school, and high school.

I'd like to once again thank the Legislature, and especially Rep. Eliason and Sen. Thatcher, for crafting meaningful policy and helping to direct investments in school counseling, anti-bullying campaigns, and the development of the SafeUT app, which lets our students anonymously connect with mental health professionals.

These resources are improving, and even saving, the lives of our young people.

This session we can continue to strengthen and enhance our mental health resources, because... EVERY PERSON MATTERS.

My friends, we have everything it takes to achieve our goal to become the best education system in America, and we can achieve that goal by working together, by expressing gratitude to and supporting the good work of our teachers, and also by continuing to appropriately fund public and higher education.

We also need to acknowledge the efforts of our parents, principals, superintendents, school board members, and our private sector partners.

Let's continue to commit, right here and right now, that as a state, when it comes to supporting education, we will settle for nothing less than an "A" grade.

Exactly 10 years ago, I stood here and delivered my first State of the State address.

Next year, someone else will stand here in my place.

(And from the number of candidates running for governor, it looks like there are a LOT of people who really, really want to deliver that speech.)

It has been an amazing decade. We've had a great run together.

We've seen major challenges, but we've also created solutions and seen unparalleled success.

The challenges we face today are not the same challenges that we faced ten years ago.

Ten years ago on this same occasion, I said that we could find unlimited possibilities of what we could accomplish through creating unprecedented partnerships.

Tonight, as I look out at you, at the dawn of a new decade, I am in awe of the infinite possibilities that lie ahead of us.

We can make the most of these opportunities by following the formula of unprecedented partnerships that we have used these past ten years.

Let's not allow anything dividing our nation to divide our state. Let's build our friendships based on mutual respect, better communication, and the strengthening of our partnerships.

Let's work together, day in, and day out, to build a better future.

Let's work hard.

Let's make 2020 the best year ever!

My dear friends, there are many others including our children and grandchildren following after us in search of a great life and an even better tomorrow.

Let's prepare the way for them. Let's give them hope and opportunity. Let's show them that we care.

Together, we can be like the pioneers of the past and sow the right seeds, and prepare the trail for those who are yet to follow.

Thank you for your efforts. May God bless you and your families, and may God continue to bless what I think is His favorite state, the great state of Utah.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

The Chief Clerk, Megan Allen, read the following:

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, Article VI, Section 2 of the Utah Constitution authorizes the President of the Utah Senate and the Speaker of the Utah House of Representatives to issue a joint proclamation convening the Utah Legislature in a special session when two-thirds of the members of the Senate and House of Representatives favor convening the Legislature into a special session because an emergency in the affairs of the state necessitates convening the Legislature into session; and

WHEREAS, a poll conducted by the President of the Utah Senate and the Speaker of the Utah House of Representatives determined that at least two-thirds of the members of the Utah Senate and at least two-thirds of the members of the Utah House of Representatives are in favor of convening the Legislature into a special session because of the COVID-19 emergency;

NOW, THEREFORE, we, J. Stuart Adams, President of the Utah Senate, and Brad R. Wilson, Speaker of the Utah House of Representatives, by the

authority vested in us by the Utah Constitution, do by this joint proclamation, call the Sixty–Third Legislature of the State of Utah into a Third Special Session to be conducted electronically with the anchor location at the Utah State Capitol in Salt Lake City, Utah on the 16th day of April, 2020, at 9:00 a.m. to consider:

1. authorizing the state to accept certain federal funds available from the United States government to assist states, political subdivisions, and individuals in addressing issues raised by the COVID–19 emergency and issues raised by steps taken to abate the emergency;

2. adjusting the fiscal year 2020 and fiscal year 2021 budgets to address the COVID–19 emergency and its impacts;

3. increasing the state’s capacity to issue general obligation bonds by removing statutory limits on current debt authorizations;

4. making changes to budget implementation and budget reporting requirements;

5. making changes to the state’s unemployment insurance program to reduce the waiting period before benefits can be distributed to an applicant under certain circumstances;

6. making changes to the state’s workers’ compensation insurance program to cover first responders who contract COVID–19 under certain conditions;

7. making changes to income tax provisions relating to qualified retirement plan distributions, filing and payment deadlines, and extension requirements;

8. establishing protocols, requirements, and processes to guide the state toward economic recovery from the impacts of the COVID–19 emergency;

9. providing assistance to certain Utah businesses and residents negatively affected by the COVID–19 emergency;

10. making changes to requirements governing statewide emergencies, including pandemic emergencies;

11. making changes to requirements governing local government authority in emergencies, including pandemic emergencies;

12. establishing, or encouraging the establishment of, protocols, requirements, and processes to make it easier for patients to obtain safe medications that could positively affect outcomes for patients diagnosed with the COVID–19 virus;

13. establishing liability protection for certain entities that provide or support access to emergency medical treatments to address the COVID–19 virus and, with certain exceptions, establishing liability protection for health care providers who provide health care to a patient for an illness or condition that resulted from a declared public health emergency;

14. establishing processes to govern the 2020 regular primary election;

15. making changes to municipal annexation requirements;

16. making changes to the sales and use tax exemption for sales of fuel to a rail carrier for use in a locomotive engine and enacting related provisions;

17. creating a program to provide scholarships for students with disabilities to help cover certain costs to attend qualifying private schools, and creating related corporate and individual tax credits for certain donations to the scholarship program;

18. a resolution urging state and local government entities to exercise fiscal responsibility with the remainder of their 2020 budgets and to continue to limit spending in fiscal year 2021 because of the economic impact of the COVID–19 emergency.

19. waiving the requirement for local education agencies to administer year–end statewide and other assessments for the 2019–20 school year; addressing statutory requirements impacted by the suspension of year–end assessments in the 2019–20 school year; granting a waiver from the requirement to pass a civics test as a condition for graduation if the student is a senior and meets certain conditions; and addressing the requirement that local education agencies perform educator evaluations for the 2019–20 school year;

20. a resolution expressing solidarity with the Chinese people regarding the COVID–19 virus; and

21. establishing liability protection for individuals and entities related to exposure to contagious diseases.

INTENT LANGUAGE FOR 1ST SUB. S.B. 3007

“In light of the COVID–19 pandemic, the Legislature finds that to facilitate people’s participation in social and economic activities the Legislature needs to address the fear of litigation over exposure to COVID–19. The possibility of

abusive litigation for people who own or operate premises or manage activities are clear social and economic evils that needs to be addressed. Removing the fear of litigation from COVID–19 exposure makes it likelier for people to participate in the economy or in institutional activities such as churches, schools, and government services. The Legislature finds that providing immunity from civil actions to these people, except in cases of willful misconduct, reckless infliction of harm, or intentional infliction of harm, is a reasonable method to address the social and economic evils.

Additionally, the Legislature finds that to facilitate businesses' response and encourage participation in potential tracking and reporting of the COVID–19 pandemic. That 1st Sub. SB 3007 addresses social and economic evils in helping to track and curb the pandemic.”

1. adjusting the fiscal year 2020 and fiscal year 2021 budgets and making statutory changes relating to those budgets;

2. making changes to data privacy provisions relating to the State's response to COVID-19;
3. providing rent and mortgage assistance for individuals and small businesses affected by COVID-19;
4. recognizing the students graduating from high school and institutions of higher education in 2020;
5. changing private investigator residency requirements;
6. amending provisions relating to the unveiling of the statue of Martha Hughes Cannon in the United States Capitol and extending the repeal date of the Martha Hughes Cannon Capitol Statue Oversight Committee;
7. correcting a mistake made in S.B. 90 from the 2020 General Session;
8. making technical corrections to the Utah Code;
9. making changes to municipal annexation requirements;
10. modifying alcohol policies at the Salt Lake City International Airport;
11. modifying unemployment insurance provisions;
12. addressing certain methods of restraint by peace officers;
13. extending the COVID-19 state of emergency;
14. making changes to the Federal Funds Procedures Act and the Emergency Management Act to require notification by the governor to the Legislature before the expenditure of federal funds received during a pandemic emergency;
15. addressing the operation of the Open and Public Meetings Act during an emergency;
16. addressing governmental immunity related to exposure to COVID-19;
17. addressing exposure to bodily fluids by first responders and correctional facilities staff;
18. addressing testing for COVID-19 of staff and residents of residential care facilities;
19. establishing targeted assistance programs with CARES Act Funding;

20. making adjustments to the Utah Fund of Funds;
21. providing approval of the purchase of two pieces of real property and transferring funds from the Fleet Motor Pool Fund to the State Fuel Network Fund for the purchase of the real property;
22. approving a proposed settlement agreement to resolve the Hepatitis C class action lawsuit against the State of Utah and the Department of Corrections;
23. addressing the transfer of reserve funds from the state health insurance pool to the state;
24. modifying Section 53F-8-303 to allow school districts to use revenue generated by the Capital Levy to fund the school district's general fund for the FY21;
25. making changes to the state's workers' compensation insurance program related to first responders who allege that they contracted COVID-19 during the performance of their job duties; and
26. for the Senate to consent to appointments made by the Governor.

On motion of Representative Hawkes, as allowed by the Utah Constitution and the Joint Rules of the Legislature, the House voted to continue its practice of reading only the short title of bills and resolutions as they are introduced or considered on a House Calendar and not read the long title of the bills and resolutions unless two-thirds of the House directs the reading of the long title, short title, or both of any House or Senate bill or resolution.

REMARKS BY SPEAKER BRAD WILSON

Good morning! It's nice to finally see many of you in person. It's wonderful to have many of you here in the chamber. And to those of you joining us virtually today, I hope you are wearing pants.

A few months ago, none of us expected to be here today, having to make incredibly hard decisions about budget cuts and policies to support individuals, organizations and businesses impacted by a global pandemic.

None of us ran for office thinking we would be cutting \$850 million from the state budget; but we're here now and we are going to serve the state to the best of our abilities.

However, because of a multi-pronged approach that includes the utilization of spending reductions, cash flow management, drawing a portion of the education rainy day fund, the general rainy day fund and the Medicaid rainy day fund, and budgetary reserves, we will only be voting on overall cuts of 1.7% to the state budget.

That 1.7% would be significantly higher, and the cuts much deeper had we not created a state with policies that led to a flourishing economy and strong reserves set aside for this very day.

That's not to say that we're coming out of it unscathed. Every person in this room is losing a bill with a fiscal note or a project or initiative of special significance to them or their constituents. But Utahns—especially our children and the vulnerable among us—will be well taken care of by our actions today. Thanks to each of you and the great work you did in your appropriations committees.

In fact, both education funding and social services funding are increasing through this process. That is truly remarkable considering the times we are in. And

this is all in part to the incredible thoughtfulness you all have put into the appropriations process over the last month.

This Special Session agenda is the longest in state history with 26 items on the call. We have an incredible amount of work to do to get through policy and budget items.

The next two days are going to be long and will require our best thinking and deliberation as representatives of the people. Some of us may be looking for opportunities to score political points through this process, but doing so would be a betrayal of the trust Utahns have placed in us.

The next two days **MUST** be about policy, not politics or tearing down the other caucus.

I am appealing to our better natures to **LEAD** over the next two days rather than resort to partisan rhetoric. We are all on the same team, Team Utah, and that needs to be more evident than ever during the next two days.

2020 has been unlike any other year. We have been faced with tremendous health, economic, and societal challenges. I've been so impressed with the way people across our state have adapted – time and again – to changing circumstances and new challenges.

WE all know these have been difficult months for Utahns – especially difficult for individuals personally impacted by the pandemic.

Our collective commitment to work together and to keep our eye on Utah's long-term health and prosperity has us primed to get people back to work, businesses back to prosperity and Utah back on top.
