The House was called to order by Speaker Brad Wilson at 10:10 a.m.

Prayer given by Representative Sandra Hollins.

Pledge of Allegiance led by Representative Carl Albrecht.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

The Chief Clerk, Megan Allen, read the following:

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, Article VI, Section 2 of the Utah Constitution authorizes the President of the Utah Senate and the Speaker of the Utah House of Representatives to issue a joint proclamation convening the Utah Legislature in a special session when two-thirds of the members of the Senate and House of Representatives favor convening the Legislature into a special session because an emergency in the affairs of the state necessitates convening the Legislature into session; and

WHEREAS, a poll conducted by the President of the Utah Senate and the Speaker of the Utah House of Representatives determined that at least two-thirds of the members of the Utah Senate and at least two-thirds of the members of the Utah House of Representatives are in favor of convening the Legislature into a special session because of the COVID-19 emergency and the economic consequences of that emergency;

NOW, THEREFORE, we, J. Stuart Adams, President of the Utah Senate, and Brad R. Wilson, Speaker of the Utah House of Representatives, by the authority vested in us by the Utah Constitution, do by this joint proclamation, call

the Sixty–Third Legislature of the State of Utah into a Sixth Special Session to be conducted electronically with the anchor location at the Utah State Capitol in Salt Lake City, Utah on the 20th day of August, 2020, at 10:00 a.m. to consider legislation:

1. making changes to the emergency drill requirements for certain educational facilities;

2. amending the qualifications to serve as the executive director of the Department of Health;

3. modifying provisions related to the regulation of tobacco retailers;

4. modifying the election process for the 2020 regular general election in response to the COVID–19 pandemic and modifying ballot harvesting provisions for all elections;

5. amending the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act to delay license renewal deadlines for certain retail licenses, to adjust the percentage of annual gross receipts from the sale of alcoholic products that a reception center licensee may maintain and what is included in that percentage, and to allow certain public service permittees to change location under certain conditions;

6. addressing issues related to public education funding and enrollment;

7. modifying provisions relating to community reinvestment agencies to provide an extension of the tax increment collection period for certain agencies impacted by COVID–19 and to allow agencies to provide assistance to certain small businesses negatively impacted by COVID–19;

8. enacting the Uniform Electronic Wills Act;

9. amending the income tax provisions to provide that forgiven loans and individual recovery rebates authorized by the federal government in response to COVID–19 are not subject to Utah income tax;

10. adjusting the fiscal year 2021 budget to address the COVID–19 emergency and its impacts and other budget issues;

11. addressing emergency powers and the state of emergency in response to the COVID–19 pandemic;

12. addressing issues related to online instruction provided by schools licensed under the Cosmetology and Associated Professions Licensing Act;

13. addressing the modification of jail sentences in a public health emergency;

14. addressing the inadequacy of the amount of federal government payments in lieu of taxes;

15. modifying the statutory provision regarding when a local referendum ballot question may be submitted to voters;

16. addressing issues related to the federal CARES Act and other federal legislation enacted in response to the COVID–19 pandemic, including modifying certain COVID–19 assistance and recovery programs created in the state that are using federal funding;

17. amending the maximum premium subsidy the Department of Health can request for the Utah Premium Partnership for Health Insurance program;

18. modifying the date by which the governor must submit an audited financial statement for the last fiscal year;

19. modifying application limit requirements for the Public Safety Officer Career Advancement Reimbursement Program;

20. that, except for rules and fees applicable to activities in counties of the first and second class, and for specific time periods and unless specified conditions are met, prohibits the Board and Division of Oil, Gas, and Mining, the Board and Division of Water Quality, and the Board and Division of Air Quality from: taking rulemaking action under Title 40, Mines and Mining, or related to water and air quality under Title 19, Environmental Quality Code; and imposing new fees or fee increases under Title 40, Mines and Mining, or related to water and air quality under Title 19, Environmental Quality Code;

21. delaying certain reporting requirements regarding the price of pharmaceutical drugs; and

22. repealing certain provisions that allow a municipality to annex certain unincorporated areas without an annexation petition.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

Roll call showed all members present.

Speaker Wilson announced that pursuant to Joint Rule 2-1-101, the Rules adopted by the Legislature during the 2020 General Session apply to the conduct of the House during the 2020 Sixth Special Session.

Due to the virtual setup of this session, in lieu of notifying committees, Speaker Wilson appointed Representative Joel Briscoe to notify the Governor, via

email, that the House is convened in the Sixth Special Session and is organized and ready to receive any communication or message he may have to offer.

Speaker Wilson appointed Representative Ray Ward to notify the Senate, via email, that the House is organized and ready to do business.

Representative Ward reported that, for the purposes of meeting electronically, the Senate has been notified via email that the House is organized and ready to do business.

Representative Briscoe reported that, for the purposes of meeting electronically, Governor Herbert has been notified via email that the Legislature is organized and ready to do business.

On motion of Representative Hawkes, as allowed by the Utah Constitution and the Joint Rules of the Legislature, the House voted to continue its practice of reading only the short title of bills and resolutions as they are introduced or considered on a House Calendar and not read the long title of the bills and resolutions unless two-thirds of the House directs the reading of the long title, short title, or both of any House or Senate bill or resolution.

On motion of Representative King, the House voted to suspend the rule requiring that bills and resolutions remain on a calendar for one legislative day between second and third readings.

On motion of Representative Gibson, the House voted that the House suspend the following rules due to the virtual circumstance of this session: Joint Rule 1-2-101, Joint Rule 1-2-102, and Joint Rule 1-2-103 regarding Notifying Committees; Joint Rule 4-1-202(h) and Joint Rule 4-2-101(ii) regarding cosponsors; and House Rule 1-5-103 regarding the Daily Order of Business.

REMARKS BY SPEAKER BRAD WILSON

Once again, welcome Representatives to yet another special session of the Utah Legislature. I want to begin today by expressing my sincere gratitude to each of you for the service you render on behalf of your constituents and on behalf of all the people of our state.

This is the SIXTH special session of 2020 – and we concluded the General Session just FIVE months ago. Since closing sine die in March, the global

pandemic has forced us all to make significant and temporary changes to our way of life to protect our families, friends and neighbors. Those changes sent an immediate and difficult-to-measure ripple effect through our state, and have made it necessary for us to reconvene more frequently than usual. During our special sessions this year we have worked on 85 bills and 30 formal substitutes for bills. We have passed 12 budget and revenue bills and reworked the state budget 4 times to adjust to the ripple effect of the current health crisis. To provide some additional perspective, it took until the fourth week of the 2020 General Session for us to pass as many bills as we have in special sessions this year.

As House leadership, we have recognized the urgency of each of these issues and feel each has merited your timely consideration. But, they say the more you do something, the less special it becomes. As I've reflected on that, I feel it important to make something clear so that our much more frequent meetings this year do not send the wrong message either within our body or to the public. These are extraordinary circumstances. This is not and cannot become the new normal for the House. Utah benefits greatly from the service of a part-time legislature and must continue to do so. We must not allow the COVID-19 pandemic to trigger a transition to a full-time legislative body. It is simply not in the best interest of the people.

Within the House of Representatives, we have elected officials who are engineers, ranchers and researchers. We have homemakers, small business owners and teachers. We have more than a few attorneys, some bankers and developers. We have surgeons, a police officer and, perhaps most appropriately, we now have a referee (Rep. Birkeland). Each of us brings a unique perspective to our policy discussions and, even more importantly, each of us is more directly impacted by the policies we enact because we live and work in the real world. I would argue Utah's system of a part-time legislature – one that is supposed to meet in session just over one-tenth of the year – much more closely adheres to the original design of our nation's founding fathers than a full-time legislative body would. By the voice of the people, we serve for a season but we do so as we remain citizens first and lawmakers second.

While recognizing that you have all given more than you originally bargained for, so have the many dedicated members of our staff. They have also had additional demands made on their time and they have each answered the call. They deserve our sincere gratitude for all they do. We meet today to deliberate and debate the best path forward for the people of our state on issues caused by the pandemic ranging from educating our students... to regulating commerce... to matters of health and public safety.

So, again, I thank you for your service, for taking considerable time from your jobs, your businesses and your families – all to address urgent and pressing matters facing your districts and our state. Now, to the business at hand.

Former Congressman Rob Bishop administered the Oath of Office to the re-elected and newly-elected members of the House of Representatives.

Roll call showed all members present, except Representative Jon Hawkins and Representative Stephanie Pitcher, excused.

On motion of Representative Brian King, the House voted to nominate Brad R. Wilson as Speaker of the House for the 64th Legislature.

On motion of Representative Francis Gibson, the House voted to elect Brad Wilson, by acclamation, as Speaker of the House for the 64th Legislature.

Former Congressman Rob Bishop administered the Oath of Office to Speaker Brad R. Wilson.

REMARKS BY SPEAKER BRAD R. WILSON

My fellow members of the Utah House of Representatives, welcome to the 2021 General Legislative Session.

I would say it is great to see all your smiling faces, but I'll settle for saying that it is great to see you masked up and ready to work.

I thank my good friend, Congressman Rob Bishop, for joining us today and for administering the oath of office. As you know, Congressman Bishop just retired after serving nine terms in the U.S. House of Representatives. Before that, Rob served in this body for 16 years, including two years as Speaker of the House. Most importantly, he was a public school teacher for nearly three decades. Please join me in giving Congressman Bishop a round of applause to thank him for his decades of devoted public service. Thank you.

I also want to take this opportunity to congratulate our new governor, Spencer Cox, and express our commitment to working with him, Lt. Governor Deidre Henderson and their administration to serve the people of our state. We look forward to welcoming Governor Cox to hear the State of the State address later this week.

As we open this general legislative session, we do so with a heavy heart.

Just prior to the new year, Representative LaWanna Shurtliff succumbed to pneumonia. Known to her colleagues and friends as "Lou," she served two stints in this Chamber from 1999–2008 and was elected again a decade later. Her service to the people of Utah went well beyond the Legislature as she taught thousands of students English, accounting and business at Ogden High School for nearly three decades. We are joined in the gallery by her son, Scot, and her daughter, Stacey, who led us in the pledge this morning. On behalf of the entire House, we express our condolences to her family and I ask that we all pause for a moment of silence to honor our friend and colleague. Thank you.

2020 was a tragic year for the world, for our country, and for our state. More than a thousand Utah families – including several in this body – lost loved ones. Thousands more have faced serious health challenges due to COVID-19. As we meet, one of our colleagues is in the hospital right now due to COVID and we pray for his swift recovery.

As vaccines begin to be administered across the state, now is not the time to let our guard down. As we spend the next 45 days in close quarters, we must remember that some among our colleagues and staff – and their families – have conditions that put them at increased risk of complications if infected. Under these far less than ideal circumstances, we should all do our part to protect one another so we can continue the work of the people of Utah. Beyond the physical effects of COVID, the global pandemic has caused widespread economic hardship, social disruption, and mental health issues. Discouraging news about the pandemic, natural disasters, and civil unrest have seemed to arrive at a tempo that left moments of reprieve few and far between. But in the midst of all this tragedy, we have seen Utahns facing adversity with determination, overcoming challenges with innovation, and lifting others with compassion.

As I have thought about the ability of the people of our state to rise in moments of trial, my mind's eye turned to an image from nearly twenty years ago. A flame, slowly rising above the streets of Salt Lake City until it lit the Olympic torch to open the 2002 Winter Games. In 1980, that same group of men who lit the torch that night – found themselves in a small, smelly locker room in Lake Placid, New York. They were 23 college kids – moments away – from facing the greatest hockey team ever assembled. On the line, a shot at the gold medal.

How good were the Soviets? They had won four straight Olympic gold medals and had beaten the U.S. team 10–3 just two weeks prior. That American team had worked, practiced and sweat together. They had done all they could to put themselves in the Gold Medal Game but they still needed everything to go their way just to have a chance. In the moments before they took the ice, Team USA head coach, the late Herb Brooks, opened what may be considered the most important pep talk in the history of sports, with these words:

“Great moments are born from great opportunity.”

That group of boys went toe-to-toe with the Soviet juggernaut that night, culminating in an astonishing victory in what we now call the Miracle on Ice. Over

the past few days, I've had those words running through my mind as I think about Utah's situation.

“Great moments are born from great opportunity.”

My friends, despite some significant challenges – daunting challenges – this is a time of great opportunity for our state. And we, as a Legislature, have a tremendous responsibility to create an environment in which Utahns have the freedom and ability to improve their lives and for succeeding generations to partake in prosperity. We are going to work harder and smarter than we've ever worked; and we are going to come together like never before because the moment demands nothing less.

It has been inspiring to see the people of our state embrace disruption with innovation and adapt since the word “pandemic” became a part of our lexicon. Businesses have found new ways to safely provide goods and services to their customers and have kept our economy moving forward. Teachers, students and parents have embraced new technologies and faced challenging circumstances with fortitude, ensuring Utah's children continue to receive the education they deserve. Our dedicated health professionals have worked well past the point of exhaustion to protect the lives of their patients. And ordinary citizens and families have found ways to not only cope with isolation but to reach out and bring our community closer together in a time of unprecedented division across the country. They all deserve our admiration and our sincere gratitude.

I'd also like to take this opportunity to thank each and every one of you for your dedicated service. As a legislative body, we made some important and timely adjustments to allow us to function during the pandemic. Due to the thoughtful planning of our predecessors and the hard work of public servants, state employees, and Utah citizens, our state proved well-prepared to handle an emergency. However, as time wore on, it became clear we need an exhaustive effort to review and update our plans and procedures for navigating an ongoing crisis like a pandemic.

During this session, let's provide clear direction on what constitutes an emergency, what authority that triggers, and how long it should last. No emergency should usurp the power of the people, nor should it dismiss the need for transparency and accountability for actions taken in times of crisis.

There are other significant challenges facing us as a state beyond the immediate crisis we've been dealing with the past year. Decades of smart policy from this body have prepared us to face these challenges, and now the "best-managed state in the nation" is perfectly positioned to accelerate while others retrench. This year presents a unique opportunity to do three things that will further cement Utah's position as the brightest star on the flag:

Let's:

- Broaden our Economic Success
- Invest in Infrastructure

and

- Extend Opportunity to All

Economic Development

I want to begin with broadening our economic success. Hard work and innovation are the fuel that drives our economy. Two sessions ago, the Legislature set aside 80 million dollars for tax relief. Let's finish what we started and work to find the most appropriate way to provide that relief. Now is the time to put this money back in the hands of the people of our state. For a decade, our state worked to cultivate the most business-friendly environment in the nation. Although we proved effective in attracting jobs and investment, we still have significant room for improvement. Let's work together to create a new chapter in our economic prosperity playbook;

- 1) one that rewards all businesses looking to grow in our state,
- 2) one that makes this more than just the place to add jobs, but the right place to anchor thriving enterprises;
- 3) and one that creates opportunities in rural Utah and incentivizes remote work that takes jobs to where our people live.

During this session, let's also lay the groundwork for a thorough, legislative-led review of regulation that carries through this year's interim sessions and seeks input from the businesses that power our economy. Let's look at how a regulatory sandbox can cultivate innovation. In a hyper-competitive marketplace, we simply cannot afford to crush new industries before they can even get off the ground – by forcing them to fit into a regulatory framework that has never envisioned the innovations of tomorrow's economy.

Infrastructure

The second, related area of focus is infrastructure. An ambitious vision can only become a reality when it is built on a solid foundation. Our commitment to investing in and preserving critical infrastructure is that foundation. As our state grows, so must our capacity to connect people and the goods they require. Our investment in roads and rail has been an often-underappreciated element of our economic success – and we will not ease up in our commitment to preventing the gridlock that would bring our economy to a halt.

Just as important is our investment in outdoor recreation opportunities that make life in Utah great. We love our state and national parks. So do thousands of visitors from around the globe. With more visitors than we can handle, now is the time to make the necessary investment to give access to all who wish to experience Utah's natural beauty.

Water is a perennial issue for our state. The time has come to get serious about water projects that have been talked about so extensively for so long they seem mythical. Let's reach out to our neighboring states and work toward a solution that will ensure Utahns have access to the water we need and that is rightfully ours. The Colorado River Compact allocates more water to Utah than we currently take and the process to change that begins now.

As we consider further investment in infrastructure, we should embrace opportunities to equip rural Utah with greater access to broadband internet, 5G technology, and other tools that will enable those living off the Wasatch Front to do work that previously required them to relocate.

Now is the moment to put Utah's triple-A bond rating to use to enhance the critical infrastructure that moves our people, elevates our outdoor recreation opportunities, supports our natural resources, and enhances our economy.

Extend Opportunity to All

The past year brought more issues to the forefront than just the pandemic. Growing division in communities across the country was evident in Utah, as well.

Just over a month ago, Senate President Adams and I joined other elected officials, business leaders, and community advocates in signing The Utah Compact on Racial Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion. This document states clearly that Utah is dedicated to principles and actions that create equal opportunity. Government

can't solve all of society's problems – nor should it. But where we have determined it is appropriate for government to act, we can and should do a far better job of building a system in which people have equal opportunity and are better able to help themselves. During this session, and in the months and years ahead, let's focus on education, housing, and health in order to become a more equitable and inclusive state.

First, education. Every single student deserves the opportunity to gain a quality education no matter where they live. For a student to thrive in the dynamic 21st century, that education must include reading, writing and arithmetic but that's not good enough. In an age when we can access any fact by asking our phones, students need to develop critical thinking skills, financial literacy, and an appreciation of their civic responsibility. Above all, that education must be readily available to students in every classroom, in every district across our state, regardless of their zip code. Too often our students graduate from high school without a clear understanding of what their talents are or how those talents can be developed into marketable skills. This is costing us dearly.

In Utah, only 51% of high school graduates enroll in post secondary education within three years – well below the national average. Let's look for innovative ways to help students understand why they are learning what they are taught in school and help them see the possibilities that lie before them. College access advisors have the ability to make an outsized impact on our education system by helping students make more informed choices that put them on an efficient path to the knowledge and skills to build prosperous lives.

Last fall, lawmakers, education leaders, and voters came together to make education funding a top priority. This year, we will increase our financial commitment to education by over 400 million dollars. And we will utilize our available resources to help our students discover their aptitudes and set themselves on a course that fits their interests and abilities. Doing so is the only surefire way to unlock the vast reserves of untapped potential so abundant in the youth of our state.

Next, housing. The term “starter home” has a very different meaning today than it did a decade ago. Over these past ten years, average home prices in our state have risen more than twice as fast as our median income. Rising home values are good for homeowners. However, the lack of homes priced for those looking to buy for the first time and for those who need more affordable options creates real challenges for thousands of Utahns, including our children and grandchildren.

This is an issue that warrants our immediate attention. Already, members of this body have opened bill files to address our housing affordability challenge by reducing regulations that prevent existing housing options – like accessory dwelling units – from relieving stress on the overall market. No doubt, innovative ideas will come to the forefront as we employ our best thinking to create workable solutions.

And finally, physical and mental health are also critical elements of Utah's prosperity. But today, we have more uninsured children per capita than any other state in the nation. The House is leading an effort to change that. We are working with the state health department to help families of uninsured children access available resources for coverage, including CHIP.

Our state's health depends on more than just physical well-being. Today, we have a clearer understanding of the importance of long-stigmatized mental health issues and how to treat mental illness without hiding it away. How many people will be in need of mental health treatment due to the pressures of the pandemic? How many people can we better serve by redirecting them from the criminal justice system to mental health treatment? And how many lives can we save by better addressing the mental health challenges of Utah students? The time has come to invest in a comprehensive approach to address mental health challenges.

As a conservative I see this approach to addressing education, health, and housing as critical to our ongoing effort to more effectively serve those we've been elected to represent. As the leader of a bipartisan body I see it as a noble effort in which we must all engage. And as a lifelong Utahn I see it as the mission to which we must all commit – in order to make our state a bastion of opportunity and a refuge for those looking to make the most of what they have.

Each of you has stepped forward to serve and to lead. We will face the challenges and we will seize the opportunity. Let's think broadly, debate vigorously, and do the hard work. May God bless us in that effort. And may God continue to bless the Great State of Utah.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

On motion of Representative Gibson, the House voted to print Speaker Wilson's remarks and the prayer given by Bishop Solis upon the pages of the House Journal.

On motion of Representative Mike Schultz, the House voted to authorize Speaker Wilson to appoint a committee to meet with a like committee from the Senate to wait upon the Governor to inform him that the Legislature is organized and ready to receive any communication or message he may have to offer. Speaker Wilson appointed Representatives Albrecht, Shipp, and Harrison.

On motion of Representative Karen Kwan, the House voted to authorize Speaker Wilson to appoint a committee to notify the Senate to inform that Honorable Body that the House is organized and ready to do business. Speaker Wilson appointed Representatives Stratton, Johnson, and Wheatley.

On motion of Representative Tim Hawkes, the House voted, by a two-thirds majority, to adopt House Rules, Joint Rules, and Interim Rules as were adopted by the 2020 Sixth Special Session of the 63rd Legislature, until such time as new rules may be adopted by the 2021 General Session of the 64th Legislature.

On motion of Representative Tim Hawkes, and as allowed by the Utah Constitution and the Joint Rules of the Legislature, the House voted, by a two-thirds majority, to continue its practice of reading only the short title of bills and resolutions as they are introduced or considered on a House calendar and not read the long title of the bills and resolutions, unless a majority of the House directs the reading of the long title of any House or Senate bill or resolution.

On motion of Representative Jennifer Dailey-Provost, the House voted to print the elected House Majority Caucus Leadership for the 2021–2022 term upon the pages of the House Journal.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

STATE OF THE JUDICIARY BY CHIEF JUSTICE MATTHEW DURRANT

I'm pleased to join you virtually with my colleagues Associate Chief Justice Thomas Lee, and Justices Deno Himonas, John Pearce, and Paige Petersen. They are good and honorable people, and it is a great privilege to serve with them.

In the course of the past year, our world has changed in ways we could not have imagined. We've moved much of our lives from the real world to the virtual world. Small things that we took for granted—a warm embrace, a casual meal with friends, a family vacation, and so many more—have been made much more precious to us, things to be longed for, dreamed about.

We've all been witness to the terrible toll this virus has taken in lives, health, and treasure. But amid the devastation wrought by the pandemic, heroes have emerged—health workers, first responders, police officers, delivery people, and many others who risk their health to see that basic needs are met.

The virus has presented an unprecedented challenge to businesses of all sizes, but small business owners have borne the brunt of its effects. Our hearts go out to all who've lost businesses, lost jobs, and, of course, especially to those who have lost family members or friends.

The public sector, too, has been presented with unprecedented and unimagined challenges. Our Utah state government plays a critical role in the lives of every Utah citizen. Each of our three branches of government has faced the daunting challenge of how to continue to deliver essential services to the people of Utah without unduly endangering the lives of those who serve in government or the lives of the citizens they serve.

You, our legislature, under the strong leadership of President Adams and Speaker Wilson, acted with alacrity and foresight in scaling back our state budget and in allocating the federal funds that have been made available to our state. You have played a critical role in leading our state through this crisis.

Our executive branch, too, has provided much-needed leadership. Governor Herbert and now Governor Cox have faced daunting and difficult decisions, the kinds of decisions that will never leave everyone happy, but I'm confident they have made each of them with the state's best interests at heart.

We in the judiciary have faced our own set of daunting and difficult decisions. Any report on the state of our judiciary in the year of the pandemic will, of course, be primarily about how we as a branch have responded to this earthshaking event. So I will begin with this—I am deeply and unreservedly proud of how our judges and staff have acquitted themselves during this turbulent time. They have risen to the challenge and more. I am especially grateful for the yeoman work done by our judicial council, our supreme court, and our state court administrator, Judge Mary Noonan, in leading us through this crisis.

By mid-April, we were able to move almost all of the court system online, with all of our courts holding virtual hearings and trials, a herculean task accomplished with breakneck speed by our IT department under the able leadership of Heidi Anderson. To give you some sense of the scope of this effort, these virtual hearings and trials have involved over 400,000 individual participants.¹

And even more remarkably, we have been able to largely keep pace, at all court levels, with our pre-pandemic caseload. The appellate courts haven't missed a step. And our juvenile courts are functioning at near 100% of our pre-pandemic standard. We've also seen our district courts largely keep pace with pre-pandemic metrics, with two significant exceptions: the age of pending cases and the conducting of jury trials. While we continue to see the vast majority of cases resolve within established case processing timelines, those cases are still taking longer to resolve and we are setting dates that extend further into the future than was typical of our pre-pandemic calendaring practices. And more significantly, the inability to safely conduct jury trials—especially in criminal and tort cases—is creating a considerable backlog. This is a source of great concern to me and to all our judges.

We have held trials to the bench throughout the pandemic. But jury trials pose significant challenges not attendant to judge trials. On the one hand, individuals are constitutionally entitled to jury trials, and, in criminal trials, their very freedom may be at stake. On the other hand, we as a court system, have an obligation to ensure that the public and our employees are not put at undue risk. This obligation is heightened by the fact that we as judges have the power to force potential jurors to come to our courthouses, potentially putting themselves at risk of illness or even death. To provide some sense of the number of individuals involved, in fiscal year 2019, more than 42,000 people reported to courthouses across the state to be considered for jury service in the district courts. Sitting shoulder-to-shoulder for several hours during the jury selection process, over 2,900 of those individuals were ultimately selected and deliberated as jurors. Many of these people were members of vulnerable demographic groups. As an additional complicating factor, holding jury trials virtually presents technical and constitutional problems that are not presented by judge trials.

Our judicial council continually monitors the state of the virus on a county by county basis. We have been working for some time in conjunction with the chief medical officer and the chief epidemiologist at the University of Utah to find ways that we can safely resume jury trials. I want to publicly thank them for their assistance. I also want to thank the professionals at our state Department of Health, and those working at local health departments all across Utah, for providing us invaluable data and guidance. We are committed to resuming trials in a way that takes every precaution to protect the health of jurors, and all other participants in the trial process.

As you might expect in the year of the virus, the bulk of our budget requests are for investment in technology. As difficult as it has been to move a state-wide court system from a real to a virtual environment, that transition will no doubt have long-term benefits for both the court and the public. During the last

legislative session, you funded our IT requests. This funding was understandably reversed as part of the June special session budget reductions. We are now renewing our request for funds to hire additional IT developers, as well as funds to enhance our online court assistance program. We also seek funds to firm up our cybersecurity infrastructure and increase the network bandwidth in our rural courthouses.

In addition to these technology funding requests, we are asking for funding for our new Public Outreach Coordinator (something I'll speak about shortly), funding to enable our judges to receive and consider information regarding out-of-state criminal history when making their bail decisions, funding to assist us in retaining and recruiting court commissioners, and funding to educate our employees so they can take on leadership roles in the court system. Our requests amount to \$1,935,000 in ongoing funding and \$10,000 in one-time funding. We are always careful as a branch not to overreach in our budget requests. This is why we have limited our requests to only those that we believe truly justify the expenditure of sacred tax-payer funds. I hope you will see fit to fund these requests.

During this past year, we have all had occasion to think deeply about the critical need for fairness in our society. I commend those responsible for preparing and supporting the Utah Compact on Racial Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion, which has been endorsed by many government and community leaders. The judiciary shares this commitment. We are devoted to ensuring that all who seek justice in our judicial system are treated with respect, fairness, and impartiality. We recognize that many Utahans are intimidated by the judicial process. In fact, many feel they have been left behind by government generally. And they lack confidence in governmental institutions. This is especially true of those from marginalized communities. Many worry they will be disadvantaged in the court system by their race, gender, socioeconomic status, or some combination of these or other inappropriate factors. We feel a compelling need to communicate to those who feel they have been left behind by society that they will not be left behind by our court system. We want them to know that a court is a sanctuary, a place where they can go to seek remedy for wrongs done them, to seek vindication of their rights, and to seek justice; a place where they will be on equal footing with every other Utah citizen; a place where they will find a judge who is committed to treating them with dignity and respect, and to ensuring that their basic rights are protected.

And those are the kinds of judges we have in Utah's judiciary. I believe that all of our judges are committed to discharging their duties in a fair and impartial way devoid of bias. But we have come to understand as judges that bias can work its way into our decision-making even at a subconscious level. We are, after all, the

product of our own lived experiences and environments. We must have the humility as judges to acknowledge this and endeavor to identify any potential biases, even subliminal or implicit ones, so that we might root them out of our judgment process. The same is true for all employees of the judicial branch, from judicial assistants, to juvenile probation officers, to administrators. Each of us, no matter our position with the courts, must recognize the need to eliminate potential bias as we strive, consistent with our mission statement, to deliver “an open, fair, efficient, and independent system for the advancement of justice under the law.” As a result of our deeply-held desire to ensure that our judges and employees are as impartial as is humanly possible and to assure the public, especially marginalized communities, that this is the case, we have created a new office in the judiciary—an Office of Fairness and Accountability and, within that office, the position of Public Outreach Coordinator. We, as a judicial branch, are committed to holding ourselves accountable, and to reaching out to the public with a message that in Utah’s court system everyone will be treated with the respect and dignity that is owed them as citizens and as human beings. Public trust is the currency of the judiciary. We are committed to being worthy of that trust.

At this difficult time, many of our public institutions are viewed with suspicion and skepticism. But when I look around me, I see public servants, whether in your branch, the executive branch, or the judicial branch, who are hard-working and committed to serving the public. We are now, more than ever, all in this together. It is my hope and my prayer that we can work together to honor the sacred trust placed in us by the citizens of our great state. I wish you the very best in the important work you will do this session. Thank you for your dedicated service.

JOINT CONVENTION

President J. Stuart Adams called the Joint Convention to order at 6:15 p.m. in the Chamber of the Utah House of Representatives and recognized Brad R. Wilson, Speaker of the House.

President Adams announced that a quorum of the House of Representatives and the Senate was present.

President Adams appointed a Joint Committee comprised of Senators Evan Vickers, Kirk Cullimore, and Karen Mayne, and Representatives Francis Gibson,

Mike Schultz, and Brian King to notify Governor Spencer J. Cox that the 2021 General Session of the Sixty-Fourth Legislature is in Joint Convention and ready to hear his State-of-the-State address.

President Adams acknowledged special guests and elected and appointed officials in attendance at the Joint Convention.

Senator Evan Vickers made a motion that the Legislature resolve into a Joint Convention and Committee of the Whole for the purpose of hearing Governor Cox's State-of-the-State address.

The Joint Committee escorted Governor Cox to the House rostrum.

**STATE-OF-THE-STATE ADDRESS
BY GOVERNOR SPENCER J. COX**

Speaker Wilson, President Adams, legislators, justices of the Utah Supreme Court, Lt. Governor and Gabe Henderson, First Lady Abby and my fellow Utahns: Thank you for giving me this opportunity to address you this evening.

Not far from where we are seated tonight sits one of Utah's most recognizable landmarks: the Salt Lake Temple. Construction began in 1853 with progress agonizingly slow as the large granite blocks had to be quarried 20 miles away. It took four days to haul each individual stone to the construction site.

And then the unthinkable. After 10 years of painstaking labor, workers noticed that the foundation stones were cracking.

I can't even begin to imagine how devastated those settlers felt. I'm sure they desperately wanted to just move forward. Surely there had to be another way. But they knew that such an important building for them would never stand the test of time if the foundation was not sure.

And so, with grit and renewed determination they did what they knew they had to do. They made the gut-wrenching decision to start over. It took another 30 years to complete, but 130 years later that building still stands as a tribute to their sacrifice and tenacity.

Today, if you drive by that iconic building you can actually see some of those stones, because that foundation is once again under construction. Even though the building and structure are in perfect condition, the decision was made to use new technology to fortify the foundation against a catastrophic earthquake. This building where we meet tonight has gone through a similar renovation. You see, here in Utah, we build things to last. And when we learn a better way to do the job, we start back over and we build it again.

Tonight, we find ourselves in a similar period of building and rebuilding. We meet in an extraordinary place in extraordinary times. So much has changed because of this pandemic.

Even the nature of this speech has changed to keep people safe. Every one of you has been tested for a virus we knew little to nothing about one year ago. You are wearing masks. The galleries are empty. Your spouses and guests and staff are all watching from home.

I've also significantly shortened this speech from its usual length, making it, we believe, the shortest State of the State speech in Utah history (something most of you will see as a rare silver lining of the pandemic and worthy of a Norm Thurston standing ovation in better times). And in the name of brevity, I've even removed the carefully orchestrated applause lines – which probably wouldn't work anyway without some strategically placed staffers — Mike Mower — to remind you when to clap.

But of course, these modifications pale in comparison to the incredible changes and innovations and sacrifices made by the people of Utah over the past year. More than 1,500 Utahns are not with us tonight because of this insidious disease.

Our healthcare professionals, public health servants, first responders, businesses, workers, seniors and children ... truly every single citizen of this state has made enormous sacrifices to save lives and keep our economy open.

Tonight we salute you and say to all Utahns that help is on the way. Vaccines are being administered as we speak. The changes we have made to vaccine distribution are working and the end to this pandemic is in sight.

And as we speak of sacrifices made, can I say a word about our teachers? Never in the history of our state have we felt your influence or needed you more than right now. You have pivoted on a dime and figured out ways to do what seemed impossible.

In one school — with an extremely high-risk teacher — school officials actually figured out a way to repurpose a classroom that had a room within a room...one with glass windows, to keep the teacher safe. Every day that teacher enters his room and stands behind those glass windows with a microphone and speakers so he can see his students — including my son — through that glass and teach them in person...while his own children have to take classes online at home to protect their Dad.

That teacher is my brother. And he represents every one of our teachers who has worked themselves to the bone to keep our kids safe and keep them from falling behind.

They deserve our respect. And they deserve a raise. I'm grateful to you legislators who agree and have pledged historic education funding this year, including \$112 million dollars in bonuses for our teachers. In addition, I have proposed a nearly 6% increase in our state's education funding — more than \$400 million in all.

And while I just referred to these investments as “historic,” I'm looking forward to them becoming routine.

Now, it would be easy — and I can tell you it is very tempting — to stand here tonight and talk about all the good things that are happening in Utah and the accolades that continue to come our way. There is certainly plenty to share. I mean, our economy is far better off than anyone expected as we continue to lead the nation in job and population growth. Having the highest rate of upward mobility and the second lowest rate of poverty are definitely things to celebrate.

But I don't believe the people of Utah elected us to pat ourselves on the back.

A wise person once said that we should go into government “to do,” not “to be.” And this pandemic has shown us that, after celebrating 125 years of statehood, there may be some cracks in our foundation that need attention.

The Constitution of our state guarantees a high quality education, and yet, I fear, that is not happening in every corner of our state. We all agree that it is better to teach a man to fish than to give him a fish. There is nothing controversial there. However, in many of our more affluent neighborhoods we teach kids how to fish and give them a speedboat, a graphite rod and a Fish Finder. And you know what? Those kids can fish.

But in too many of our rural communities and communities of color we give kids a stick and a string...and then we can't figure out why they don't catch as many fish.

Education has always been called the great equalizer, but it can't be that way if our kids are not treated equally.

Ladies and gentlemen, I truly believe that this concept of educational equity is at the heart of so much of the pain and division in our country right now. A high-quality education can change everything.

It's the key to unlocking intergenerational poverty. It's the key to disrupting the criminal justice pipeline. It's the key to unlocking the American Dream. And it's the right thing to do.

But it's hard. It means replacing some of those foundation stones that are cracking. It means changing the way we fund schools. It means challenging some of our long-held assumptions and setting aside what may be good for your own individual school and district to instead support the best interests of the entire state.

Those are tough choices.

Over the past year we have had some critical conversations around race and justice. And if I can be so bold, putting up a sign or joining a rally isn't enough. The best way we can bring to life the American promise — of liberty and justice for all — is to make sure that every single child, brown or Black, rural or urban has the same opportunity as every other child.

You see, in Utah it shouldn't matter what side of I-15 you were born on — or in my case, on what side of the Payson-Dixon line you happen to live — every child in this state deserves a great education from a high-quality, well-compensated teacher. I ask you to join me in this effort.

Now, our state continues to grow at an unprecedented rate. With this growth comes additional challenges. Air quality, transportation, water and the cost of housing are all the types of foundational cracks that could derail our success and the opportunities for future generations. In the spirit of brevity tonight, I would encourage each of you to read our recently published One Utah Roadmap, a Plan for the First 500 Days of the Cox-Henderson Administration with detailed goals and initiatives to deal with these issues and strengthen our foundation.

And like those past leaders, we have a duty to make the hard and smart decisions that will improve our future. In fact, thanks to the past actions of many in this room and my predecessor Governor Gary Herbert, this legislative session we have the most unique of opportunities: a chance to reduce taxes AND provide historic investments for infrastructure.

By providing an \$80 million tax cut targeted at senior citizens and Utah families, we can improve the quality of life for scores of Utahns, while simultaneously investing significant new funding for transportation, water, recreation and broadband infrastructure that will benefit every Utahn on and off the Wasatch Front for generations to come.

These investments will finally make it possible to stop exporting our kids to other places — from rural Utah because we lack jobs, and from the Wasatch Front because they can't afford to live here.

But the greatest infrastructure investment of all, is investing in our people. All the jobs in the world are meaningless if our people aren't qualified for those jobs. Job growth or GDP growth must never be seen as an end in itself. Economic growth is merely a means to an end ... and that end is that the people of Utah can achieve the American dream.

To help accomplish that goal, I have proposed significant increases in job training, up-skilling and more money for our trade and technical educational institutions. We must overcome once and for all this terrible idea that every child needs a bachelor's degree to be successful. It's bad for our kids and it's bad for our economy. Helping our children — and adults — find the pathway that is right for them will strengthen families and our economy.

The last foundational crack I want to address is that of contempt, tribalism and discord that has rocked our nation over the past few weeks. I have spoken of it often, but tonight only offer up a reminder of the oaths which those of us in this room have taken — to uphold the Constitution of the United States.

The Preamble of that sacred document announces that the purpose of the Constitution is “to form a more perfect Union.” Judge Thomas Griffith has wisely stated that, “When politicians and judges like us take an oath to uphold the Constitution, we commit to work for unity; we make a solemn pledge that we will not be agents of division. This vow to work for unity,” he concluded, “is more than gauzy sentimentality or merely a call for civility in our public discourse. Instead, it is a studied and determined choice to work at union.”

That, of course, does not mean that we should never disagree. I'm going to veto some of your bills. Probably more than my predecessors. Please don't take it personally.

You are going to override some of those vetoes. I promise not to take that personally. It doesn't mean that I'm bad or you're weak. It is simply part of a process. A gloriously messy and inspired process.

But there must be no room for contempt or hate. We are friends. We must always be friends.

Now, I've spent a great deal of time talking about fixing the cracks in our foundation. But let me be clear. Government was never designed to solve all of our

problems. I don't mean that as a partisan or political statement, but as something I have seen up close and personal for many years.

The founders of our state and nation understood this. It's not government that makes our country special. It's volunteer organizations and churches and philanthropists and neighbors taking care of each other and solving problems so government doesn't have to.

In short, if we want smaller government, we need bigger people.

Instead of protesting at a healthcare leader's personal residence, consider taking some time to volunteer at the local food bank. Instead of posting on Facebook, walk across the street to check on your neighbor. Instead of listening to another talking (screaming) head on cable news, try listening to a new friend who looks or thinks a little differently than you.

My fellow Utahns let me conclude with one more brief story from those early rugged settlers of our state. As a group of pioneers on their way to Utah were crossing a particularly difficult patch of land, the wagon of the first Territorial Governor Brigham Young and several others got stuck in a sandbar. PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, since the adjournment of the 2021 General Session of the Sixty-third Legislature of the State of Utah, certain matters have arisen which require immediate legislative attention; and

WHEREAS, Article VII, Section 6 of the Constitution of the State of Utah provides that the Governor may, by proclamation, convene the Legislature into Special Session;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Spencer J. Cox, Governor of the State of Utah, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Utah, do by this Proclamation call the Sixty-fourth Legislature of the State of Utah into a First Special Session at the Utah State Capitol, in Salt Lake City, Utah, on the 19th day of May 2021, at 9:30 a.m., to consider the following:

1. authorizing the state to accept certain federal funds made available to Utah by the federal government through the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021;
2. appropriating federal funds made available to Utah by the federal government through the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021;
3. making changes to fiscal year 2021 and 2022 budgets and appropriations intent language;
4. amending local government building regulations;
5. amending industrial hemp regulations;

14. extending the state of emergency for drought conditions;

15. amending the eligibility criteria for peace officers;

16. modifying deadlines relating to the Independent Redistricting Commission;

17. prohibiting certain face mask requirements in K-12 schools;

18. modifying certain grant programs established in response to COVID-19 pandemic and creating a grant program for local government to enhance the use of federal funds made available by the federal government through American Rescue Plan Act of 2021;

19. authorizing sheriffs and bail commissioners to release individuals detained in jail before trial on their own recognizance in certain circumstances;

20. amend provisions relating to the sale of electronic cigarette products and nicotine products;

21. to modify or enact statutes to provide mechanisms, policies, and standards to deliver American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 monies; and

22. consenting to appointments made by the Governor.

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, since the adjournment of the 2021 General Session of the Sixty-fourth Legislature of the State of Utah, matters have arisen that require the immediate attention of the House of Representatives;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Brad R. Wilson, Speaker of the House of the Utah House of Representatives, do by this Proclamation call the members of the House of Representatives into a First Extraordinary House Session at the Utah State Capitol, in Salt Lake City, Utah, on the 19th day of May 2021, at 3:15 p.m., to consider:

(1) a resolution that identifies the need for support in Utah statutes of the Second Amendment rights of Utah citizens and encourages continued discussion of how to strengthen state statutes, including the discussion of designating Utah as a sanctuary state; and

(2) a resolution that strongly recommends that the Utah State Board of Education review standards for curriculum and prohibit the inclusion of critical race theory in curriculum.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

Speaker Wilson announced that pursuant to Joint Rule 2–1–101, the Rules adopted by the Legislature during the 2021 General Session apply to the conduct of the House during the 2021 First House Extraordinary Session.

On motion of Representative Hawkes, as allowed by the Utah Constitution and the Joint Rules of the Legislature, the House voted to continue its practice of reading only the short title of bills and resolutions as they are introduced or considered on a House Calendar and not read the long title of the bills and resolutions unless two–thirds of the House directs the reading of the long title, short title, or both of any House or Senate bill or resolution.

On motion of Representative King, the House voted to suspend the rule requiring that bills and resolutions remain on a calendar for one legislative day between second and third readings.

On motion of Representative Gibson, the House voted that for the First House Extraordinary Session of the 64th Legislature, the House suspend the Rule requiring a favorable recommendation from a House Standing Committee prior to passage of bills and resolutions.
