The House was called to order by Speaker Brad Wilson at 10:45 a.m.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

The Chief Clerk, Megan Allen, read the following:

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, since the adjournment of the 2021 General Session of the Sixty-fourth Legislature of the State of Utah, certain matters have arisen which require immediate legislative attention; and

WHEREAS, Article VII, Section 6 of the Constitution of the State of Utah provides that the Governor may, by proclamation, convene the Legislature into Special Session;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Spencer J. Cox, Governor of the State of Utah, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Utah, do by this Proclamation call the Sixty-fourth Legislature of the State of Utah into a Second Special Session at the Utah State Capitol, in Salt Lake City, Utah, on the 9th day of November 2021, at 10:30 a.m., to consider the following:

- 1. to address redistricting and to divide the state into congressional, legislative and other districts pursuant to Utah Constitution Article IX, Section 1;
- 2. to consider amendments to the statutes governing the State Flag Task Force;

- 3. to consider changing the name of Dixie State University and to create a reporting requirement to the Legislature;
- 4. to consider modifying the deadlines for filing a declaration of candidacy, holding a convention, and signature gathering, and clarifying provisions of code that relate to the schedule for redistricting local school board districts;
- 5. to consider making changes in the pretrial process on issues related to bail, pretrial release, and indigent defense;
- 6. to consider modifying the Unemployment Insurance tax rate for calendar year 2022, 2023, and 2024;
 - 7. to consider provisions related to COVID-19 and the workplace;
 - 8. to consider amendments to the Interlocal Cooperation Act; and
- 9. to consider a resolution expressing the Legislature's opinion about certain banking and financial transaction reporting requirements under consideration by Congress and the federal government.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

Roll call showed all members present, except Representative Norm Thurston.

Speaker Wilson announced that pursuant to Joint Rule 2–1–101, the Rules adopted by the Legislature during the 2021 General Session apply to the conduct of the House during the 2021 Second Special Session.

On motion of Representative Kwan, the House voted to authorize the speaker to appoint a committee to meet with a like committee from the Senate to wait upon the Governor to inform him that the Legislature is organized and ready to receive any communication or message he may have to offer.

Speaker Wilson appointed Representatives Dunnigan, Snider, and Bennion to notify the Governor that the House is convened in the Second Special Session and is organized and ready to receive any communication or message he may have to offer.

On motion of Representative J. Moss, the House voted to authorize the Speaker to appoint a committee to notify the Senate to inform that honorable body that the House is organized and ready to do business.

Speaker Wilson appointed Representatives Acton, Hawkins, and Kwan to notify the Senate that the House is organized and ready to do business.

On motion of Representative Hawkes, as allowed by the Utah Constitution and the Joint Rules of the Legislature, the House voted to continue its practice of reading only the short title of bills and resolutions as they are introduced or considered on a House Calendar and not read the long title of the bills and resolutions unless two–thirds of the House directs the reading of the long title, short title, or both of any House or Senate bill or resolution.

On motion of Representative King, the House voted to suspend the rule requiring that bills and resolutions remain on a calendar for one legislative day between second and third readings.

On motion of Representative Schultz, the House voted that for the Second Special Session of the 64th Legislature, the House suspend the Rule requiring a favorable recommendation from a House Standing Committee prior to passage of bills and resolutions.

Senators Ipson, McKell, and Davis formally notified the House that the Senate is organized and ready to do business.

Representative Acton reported that the Senate has been notified that the House is organized and ready to do business.

Representative Dunnigan reported that Governor Cox has been notified that the Legislature is organized and ready to do business.

REMARKS BY SPEAKER BRAD R. WILSON

Welcome to another special session. Usually these sessions are special, in part, because they are rare or at least out of the ordinary. Unfortunately special sessions have become more of the norm. However, this one is particularly special in that we are here to fulfill a constitutional responsibility delegated to this body and our colleagues in the Senate once every decade.

Before we get to that... We have some preliminary business to conduct. Since we last met, three of our colleagues, Representatives Gibson, Hall, and Christiansen, have concluded their service as members of the House. We wish them the best in their next endeavors. We are pleased to welcome the newest members of our body. Rep. Stephen Whyte has been elected to represent district 65, taking over for Rep. Gibson. Rep. Judy Weeks–Rohner has been elected to represent district 33, taking over for Rep. Hall. I'm sure the whole House will join me in extending a warm welcome to our new representatives and stand ready to provide whatever help or advice we can as they hit the ground running.

With Representative Gibson's resignation, we have a change to the Majority Leadership team. Earlier this morning, the Majority caucus held leadership elections and I am pleased to announce:

Rep. Mike Schultz will now serve as House Majority Leader.

Rep. Jefferson Moss will now serve as House Whip.

We thank Rep. Val Peterson for his continued service as House Majority Assistant Whip.

Wherever we are elected to serve, we all do so only for a season and it is both a great honor and a tremendous responsibility for us to serve for that season. And it is an honor to serve with you all.

We have a fairly robust agenda ahead of us while we are in Special Session: From the state flag to the name of a university and a handful of other pressing issues, we have a full plate in front of us. As we open... I want to say a few words about the redistricting process and our role as a Legislature. I mentioned this is something we only do once every ten years and it is a significant responsibility because it relates to the most fundamental elements of a representative democracy: To ensure the democratic principle of one person – one vote.

As populations shift within our state, electoral districts have to change, as well. Both the U.S. Constitution and the Utah Constitution designate that authority to the State Legislature. As the elected representatives of the people, the legislature is best positioned to take on this responsibility. I want to thank the members of the Independent Redistricting Commission for their dedicated service over the past several months as they have worked to create maps with recommended boundaries. Those maps were submitted to the Legislative Redistricting Committee for review and consideration. I also want to thank Representative Paul Ray and Senator Scott Sandall for their leadership of that committee, as well as all the legislators and staff members who have toured the state to meet with hundreds of citizens and community leaders to understand their perspectives. This was not an easy assignment and they have conducted the process with dignity and transparency, and they deserve our gratitude. Our objective is to consider their recommendations, add our productive input and come to a consensus on boundaries for our four congressional districts, 29 Senate districts, 75 House districts, and 15 State School Board districts. I thank you all in advance for your attention to these important matters.

With that, let's get to work for the people of the Great State of Utah.

MORNING SESSION

The House was called to order by Speaker of the House of Representatives Brad R. Wilson at 10:00 a.m.

REMARKS BY SPEAKER BRAD R. WILSON

My fellow members of the Utah House of Representatives, welcome to the 2022 General Legislative Session.

I trust you are all excited to get to work and my best advice may be to take a 'before' photo of yourself today so you can compare how we'll all look and feel 45 days from now.

As we get underway, I want to extend a warm welcome to the new members of the House:

- Rep. Rohner
- Rep. Whyte
- Rep. Karen Peterson (not to be confused with Representative Peterson or Representative Petersen)
- And we welcome back Rep. Ken Ivory who for some reason wanted to come back to this place.

On behalf of the entire House, we look forward to working with you and we appreciate your willingness to serve.

I also want to remind the House that we will welcome Governor Spencer Cox and Lt. Governor Deidre Henderson for the State of the State address this Thursday. We appreciate the strong working relationship with the Cox Administration and look forward to hearing his remarks.

I think it's worth mentioning that the level of trust and cooperation between the Legislative and Executive branches is unique to our state and helps resolve emerging issues without turning them into nasty, unproductive, public squabbles. That is a relationship we appreciate and I am sure the people of Utah appreciate it as well.

We open our session this year amid real and persistent challenges:

- Depleted hospital capacity and exhausted health care workers.
- Supply chain interruptions and workforce shortages.
- Widespread disagreements over government mandates.

- The shrinking Great Salt Lake.
- Gas prices that spike up and trickle down (only if we're lucky).
- A loss of trust in cherished institutions.
- Inflation at a 40 year high.
- An ongoing drought that turns lawns brown and shortens the ski season.
- And, skyrocketing housing costs.

The list goes on and on – and, on top of it all... it's an election year!

We can all feel a real sense of fatigue setting in. It's enough to make even the biggest optimist among us – feel optimistic only about the *future of pessimism*. Now, at the risk of making you all feel worse, I'd like you to do me a favor. Think for a minute about the town or neighborhood where you live. Now, I'd like you to imagine adding 50,000 people, or roughly the population of Logan or Draper, to your town. Now, do that again for 30 other cities or neighborhoods across the state.

I ask you to do that because our best estimates say over the next 3 decades that's what is going to happen to the state of Utah – primarily from our own internal population growth.

Think about those challenges I just listed.

Are they better or worse?

Is our health better or worse?

Is our trust in each other and our institutions better or worse?

Is our quality of life better or worse?

A recent poll showed almost half of Utahns think our growth is making life more difficult for all of us. And its easy to see where they're coming from when you think about things like congested roads, crowded campgrounds and trails, and a strained water supply.

Now let's shift gears a little. Think about what Utah would look like today, if 20 years ago someone hadn't decided to enact an economic development strategy that fostered the growth of industry-leading companies in our state. Some might say "that would be great because we would still be an undiscovered gem," but would our kids and grandkids be able to put down roots here without the opportunities these companies have created?

Now think about what life would be like today if 25 years ago someone hadn't decided to bring the Olympics to Utah and invest in infrastructure for the games. If we hadn't built new roads, TRAX and FrontRunner, what would traveling across this valley be like?

Finally, imagine what it would be like if 175 years ago someone hadn't decided to plan a street grid with roads wide enough for a wagon team to be able to turn around without, as Brigham Young said, "resorting to profanity." Would our capital city be the prosperous place it is today?

I ask you to reflect about these elements of our success, because this isn't the first time our state, and its leaders have faced challenges. The reason we enjoy the life we do today is because Utahns came together and faced these challenges in "The Utah Way" laying a foundation for generations to come.

It's said,

The pessimist complains about the wind The optimist expects it to change The realist adjusts the sail

With deliberation, with cooperation, and with determination we can create a future we all want.

The phrase, "The Utah Way" has become shorthand for the way \underline{we} work together as a community and the way \underline{we} , as elected officials, work together to craft effective policies.

But what exactly is "The Utah Way" and why has it become our model for doing business?

I've given this some serious thought over the past year and there is no real concise answer. The Utah Way is the combination of many ingredients and I'd like to highlight four in particular.

First, the Utah Way is visionary and forward-thinking.

On the day the Pioneers entered the Salt Lake Valley, there wasn't much to see and there was little reason to think this was the right place at all.

Undaunted, these gritty pioneers went to work planting crops and laying the foundation for not only our capital city, but nearly all of present-day Utah.

As the old adage says, "a society grows great when old men (and women) plant trees in whose shade they shall never sit."

What would those early settlers think of how we have built upon their foundation? And what will future generations think of the legacy we are building today?

The Utah way is also principled.

Principles are a *North Star* that help us keep our bearings when forces align to drive us off course. Our principles enable us to see beyond *the challenge of the moment* to focus on the bigger picture.

The Utah Way is collaborative.

It values good policy over politics.

Taking time to listen to one another, to see an issue from a new perspective, and to build the relationships that find common ground has served Utah well.

A spirit of cooperation and collaboration must always eclipse our competitive nature.

In addition to being Visionary, Principled and Collaborative, The Utah Way is Responsible.

Those who called Utah home long before we were born, have left a legacy of responsible stewardship for us to continue. The Utah Way demands we exercise wisdom as we use the resources we have, to improve the lives of the people of our state.

Each of us has been elected by our neighbors and friends to represent them in making decisions that determine Utah's shared future. As I have worked with you over the years, I have seen how deeply you understand this responsibility and how hard you work to serve the communities and state you love.

I also want to add to the list some things that The Utah Way is not.

It is not government overreach

It is not a nanny state

It is not high taxes or burdensome regulation that saps the energy of an industrious people.

What we are, and what we are not, combine to produce results that <u>draw people</u>, businesses, and investment to our state. This has benefits and drawbacks, and for years, these tradeoffs have led to conversations about the importance of managing growth. But simply *managing* a challenge is not the goal nor is it The Utah Way.

We need to lead. And if we lead, we will create a promising and prosperous future for our children and grandchildren... and we will improve life for Utahns today.

It has been said that,

"Management is doing things right; leadership is doing the right things. Management is efficiency in climbing the ladder of success; leadership determines whether the ladder is leaning against the right wall."

We serve in a body meant for leadership.

Over the past two years, events have conspired to pull us away from a leadership role in order to manage through natural disasters, riots, political unrest, and a global pandemic. **You** rose to meet that unprecedented challenge and I want to express again my admiration for your devotion to the people of our state.

But representatives, Utah cannot afford for us to forget our leadership role. The people of our state did not send us here to jump from crisis to crisis on an ongoing basis.

We are the body closest to the people. And the people have entrusted us to provide bold leadership.

Let's work together to meet the challenges and seize the opportunities before us, because how we rise to this moment will determine what Utah will be – not just one year down the road, but ten, twenty, and even fifty years from now.

Let's commit to lead in The Utah Way. And together, let's chart **The Utah Way Forward**.

If history serves as an accurate measuring stick, over the next 45 days we will consider more than one thousand bills (most of which, I believe, are Rep. Eliason's) and somewhere in the neighborhood of 500 will become law (probably very few of which will be Representative King's).

Those are large numbers and you can see how easy it is for the work we do to lack focus and direction.

Might I suggest **five policy pillars** to help us channel our collective energy and over-caffeination during this session?

The first pillar is Water.

This past summer Utahns were asked to cut back on their water usage and dry lawns were (begrudgingly) en vogue during the long, hot, dry summer months.

The fact is, we live in one of the driest states in the nation. At one point this year, Weber Basin Water District levels were the lowest they've been in 75 years, leaving us nearly **70 billion gallons short**, in that district alone.

Conservation efforts can be greatly accelerated by implementing secondary water metering, which by itself could save enough water to completely fill Echo Reservoir. But conservation efforts alone are not enough. You may think most of our water is used to make Dirty Diet Coke but, in fact, seventy–five percent of our water is used for agriculture.

Now is the right time to **optimize** our water usage. Representative Ferry is leading an effort to help farmers and ranchers get the most out of every drop so we can produce more crops with less water.

Preservation is also key to our water strategy. This year, the Great Salt Lake shrank to levels never seen before. The Great Salt Lake is more than a namesake, it is a vital natural resource that provides significant benefits to our health, environment, economy, and our quality of life. It is almost impossible to overstate the devastation that losing the Great Salt Lake could bring.

Earlier this month, we brought together experts to help us better understand this challenge and potential solutions. We simply must work together to ensure the long-term vitality of the Great Salt Lake.

The second pillar is what I like to call Affordable Utah.

Life is getting more expensive here due to our state's rapid population and income growth. Buying a home, raising a family, or settling into retirement is a dream that is becoming out of reach for many. We must correct government policies that have exacerbated these challenges so our kids and grandkids can afford to establish a life in Utah.

The median home sales price in our state increased by <u>one hundred thousand dollars</u> last year. Our housing supply hasn't kept pace with our population growth. Short supply and high demand equal homes that many Utahns can't afford.

Let's work to align local economic development incentives to stop subsidizing land development that works against our housing needs.

The lack of available and affordable childcare is placing unnecessary stress on Utah families. Today, there are roughly three kids who need childcare for every available spot. Representative Pulsipher has a bill re–examining the regulations that limit the supply of affordable childcare. Let's work to ensure every Utah parent who needs childcare can access it.

We like to say we run the state like a business, but no business can survive without talented, dedicated employees. The average state-employee salary is 13 percent below market value, and more than 80 percent of all state employees are

being paid below-market wages. In order to continue to provide essential services like law enforcement, social work, infrastructure and education, we have to provide wages that keep pace with the economy.

One final note on crafting an Affordable Utah:

The best way Utahns can afford the cost of living is to leave more of their money in their pockets.

Over the past decade, our rapidly growing economy has brought in more and more income tax. And that's great. We've been able to put that tax revenue to good use for people across our state. And we've done it while maintaining a combined tax rate lower than 2/3 of the country.

However, a large portion of our revenue growth last year came from the reckless money-printing policies of the federal government, so we must be careful as we make plans for this income that will disappear just as fast as it arrived. But even stable revenue streams are growing quickly, and isn't it better for this money to end up in Utahns pockets rather than state coffers?

Now is the right time to cut taxes.

The third pillar is education modernization.

We are blessed with dedicated teachers, counselors, and others who support the work in the classroom honing the raw talent of our students and changing their lives.

Businesses are flocking to Utah to hire our graduates. But the world we live in is more dynamic than at any point in human history – so our schools must be as well.

We can foster innovation in Higher-Education and K-12 classrooms by allowing teachers, schools, districts, and institutions of higher education the flexibility to safely try new ideas and adopt those that are successful.

As we consider education funding, I want to make one thing clear. It is a non-negotiable priority of this House to ensure education resources for Utah students are not dependent on where they live. God-given talent is no respecter of geography and opportunities for success should not be either.

The fourth pillar is Maintaining the Utah Way.

For years we have been preparing for the rapid population growth that is now our reality. The challenge of maintaining the quality of life that draws so many to Utah is significant and must be kept at the forefront of our policy debates.

From our majestic mountains to our red rocks and everywhere in-between, our state's recreational opportunities are a fundamental part of what makes life here so great. Last year, we invested a record 145 million dollars into outdoor recreation to catch up to the incredible demand on our trails and in our parks. But there's more work to do. In our state, we love to be outdoors with our friends and loved ones so let's make sure the great outdoors are accessible to all Utahns.

Maintaining the Utah way also means we need to be on the cutting edge of technology and position ourselves to be a driving force in the Fourth Industrial Revolution, which is developing technologies that blur the lines between the physical, digital, and biological spheres.

Utah's entrepreneurs can play an important role in the creation and innovation of cutting-edge technologies, so let's act now to create policies that further align our workforce with targeted industries.

The final pillar of the Utah Way Forward is what I refer to as generational investments.

We are making large-scale, strategic investments in a few key opportunities that have the promise to provide generational impacts.

The Inland Port is more than a facility in the northwest corner of Salt Lake County, it is a statewide logistics system that will have a statewide economic impact. This hub-and-spokes model will drive economic growth to rural communities. We need to strategically align the Inland Port governing board to match its statewide mission.

The Point of the Mountain is a project with such potential, I daresay few people in our state truly appreciate what it can bring. Strategic state investments in the area will lead to billions of dollars in private investment and the creation of a community that will be a hub for innovation, culture, and recreation.

Representative Snow has been working to fulfill our promise to the people of Utah to use state land at the Point of the Mountain in a way that will provide statewide benefits and a return on investment for the taxpayer.

I also want to mention the importance of generational investment in rural Utah. Advancements in technology have made living and working in rural Utah practical for many, many more of our people. While the quality of life in small towns across our state is attractive, at least from what Representatives Albrecht and Watkins say, investments in infrastructure are necessary to make that life possible. (and maybe if we made those investments, Representative Chew

wouldn't have had to ride 7 hours on horseback with a broken leg before he could get some help).

With the same foresight shown by past leaders, we can invest a portion of our abundance today in generational projects to ensure Utahns continue to prosper for decades to come.

As I look around this chamber, I feel confident that not one of us came here to manage – we are here to lead.

To deliver for our constituents and for all the people of Utah, the House of Representatives cannot be driven by the talking heads on cable news or what is trending on Twitter. We cannot be distracted by the outrage of the day.

Our calling is nobler than that.

In his book, the Map of Time, Felix J. Palma wrote:

"We are the authors of our own fate – we write it each day with every one of our actions."

The trust given to us by the people we represent demands that **our actions** be directed at the most significant issues facing our state, those that will impact Utah long past our service here.

This body is meant to think big and do the extraordinary.

Now is the time to lead.

I am inspired by the work you do.

I am honored to serve as Speaker.

From today, through this session and through the years ahead...

Let's recommit to doing things The Utah Way... and let's be bold as we chart The Utah Way. **Forward**.

STATE OF THE JUDICIARY BY CHIEF JUSTICE MATTHEW DURRANT

President Adams, Speaker Wilson, and members of the Senate and House:

I'm honored by this opportunity to address you today. As I have mentioned to you before, I am fortunate to serve on the Supreme Court with four individuals who are not just brilliant and dedicated jurists, but wonderful colleagues—Associate Chief Justice Thomas Lee, and Justices Deno Himonas, John Pearce, and Paige Petersen. I'd like to take a moment to specifically acknowledge the contributions made by Justice Himonas. As you know, he has announced he will soon be retiring from the court.

Justice Himonas has devoted over seventeen years of his legal career to judicial service, first as a highly-respected district court judge for more than a decade, and then as a justice for the last seven years. In addition to his extraordinary contributions as a jurist, his vision and commitment to expanding access to justice have been a source of inspiration for many court initiatives initiatives that have dramatically improved the judiciary's ability to ensure justice for Utah's citizens. His thoughtful, careful, and intellectually-rigorous body of work will reverberate in the courtrooms of this state for many years to come.

The mission of the judiciary is to provide the people an open, fair, efficient, and independent system for the advancement of justice under the law. This mission is the focus and foundation for every decision we make. It has guided our response to the unprecedented challenges of the pandemic and has led us to innovate and adapt the way in which we provide access to justice. Nearly every aspect of our work has been impacted to some degree by the pandemic. Some changes have proven to be beneficial to the people and will continue in the future. Some remain temporary, at least until we can return to something similar to pre–pandemic operations. I'm pleased to report that the Judicial Council, the governing body of the judicial branch, is engaged in close study of the operational changes made over the last two years and is carefully evaluating their impacts on the people, on our partners, and on the courts. Permit me to describe some of what we have learned and accomplished over the last year.

Virtual Court Proceedings

It will come as no surprise that, like many organizations and individuals, the Utah judiciary has implemented and relied heavily on virtual meeting technology throughout the course of the pandemic. All our courts have made use of this technology to conduct virtual hearings in nearly every kind of proceeding other than jury trials (which, I should note, we have been actively conducting in person

since May 2021). Such hearings helped the courts provide continued access to justice during a critical time.

In fact, in many respects, virtual court has provided greater access to justice than ever before, bringing court to the people, rather than requiring people to come to a courthouse. Tens of thousands of individuals have been able to fully engage in their court cases by appearing in virtual court, without the need to take time off work or interrupt home responsibilities. Attorneys, parties, and witnesses have avoided travel time and expenses by appearing remotely. People located in rural areas were able to seek the help of a far–broader array of attorneys from all areas of the state without having to pay the often–prohibitive expense associated with travel.

Now, we are also aware that virtual court has brought new complications. Though remote appearances were usually efficient, they occasionally caused proceedings to slow, as some people encountered problems with their internet or with audio or video connections. On some occasions, background noise has impacted the quality of the court recordings. Solving such problems has resulted in increased judicial assistant work, many hours of IT staff work, and sometimes, delays in court proceedings.

The judiciary has worked to address issues relating to remote technology and appreciates the ARPA funding you authorized for these purposes. These are worthy investments, and we take seriously the responsibility to develop robust judicial systems that can see us through these, and any future, challenges. When this funding is combined with and informed by our careful study of what practices best provide access to justice, the judiciary is poised for a productive, responsive, and effective future. Virtual hearings for certain matters will almost certainly be part of the operation of the courts moving forward. We will continue to collaborate with our community partners, our urban and rural judicial districts, and the people to determine the best way to deploy virtual and in–person proceedings.

The Access to Justice Gap

I have spoken to you before about the access to justice gap the inability of low and middle income people to get the legal help they need. It is a modern reality that legal problems of all kinds are imbedded in our everyday lives. It's true of you; it's true of me; it's true of everyone. Whether it be a question about a lease, a dispute with a landlord, an issue with Medicare or other governmental benefits, a dispute over a boundary, an argument over a debt, or a problem with a divorce settlement, legal problems are as inevitable as death and taxes, which, of course, bring with them their own constellation of legal problems. The list goes on and on. But for most people, legal assistance is out of reach. Put in simple terms, our challenge is

this to bring more legal help to more people. Lawyers as a group are civic—minded people. They give of their time on a pro bono basis at admirable levels. But we cannot pro bono our way out of the access to justice crisis. Today, I'd like to tell you about our efforts in the judiciary to address this critical challenge. I'll begin by describing a number of programs we have implemented to make our courts more accessible, and then tell you about our efforts to allow the free market to work to bring more legal service to more people in a more affordable way.

My Case and the Self-Help Center

The first such program I'll touch on is called MyCase. It's a free online portal developed and maintained by the courts that allows parties in certain types of common cases to access information about their case easily, directly, and securely. Users can view the case history and most of the documents filed in their case from their own computer or device, and can make payments when applicable. In some case types, users can also file documents through the portal, a feature that will be expanded in the coming year. This is not only convenient, but allows for greater transparency into court operations.

Of course, court staff (including the experts at the Self-Help Center) remain available, assisting thousands of court patrons each year with any case-related questions for those who choose not to use MyCase or who need assistance beyond what is currently available through the application. For instance, the Self-Help Center responded to over 23,000 contacts from all across the state in 2021.

Online Dispute Resolution

I'll next report on our progress with an initiative I've mention to you before, our Online Dispute Resolution Program (ODR, or as some call it pajama court). ODR has now been operating for three years, and as you'll recall, this program allows litigants in small claims disputes to communicate asynchronously with each other and with an online facilitator to try to resolve their issues on mutually acceptable terms before they present their case to a judge. ODR started with a single justice court in 2018. By the end of January 2022, there will be 28 justice courts using the platform. We will continue to expand the service to additional justice courts with a goal of all small claims litigants having system access by mid–2022.

The Office of Fairness and Accountability

An even more important step forward in our effort to increase access to justice is a new office we launched this year, the Office of Fairness and Accountability. Access to justice is a crucial component of the work of the office as it works to

fulfill its mission of addressing any bias in the courts. It began its work by focusing on building public trust and confidence among the people of historically marginalized communities. Throughout the year, the office has been meeting with and engaging community partners in unprecedented ways, including involvement with community—based organizations and working with the people of these populations to better understand their needs and experiences. Because access to justice problems cannot be resolved without the trust of those affected by the work of the courts, these relationships and partnerships are of critical importance.

The Office of Legal Services Innovation

Finally, before I discuss our budget requests, I'd like to describe our efforts to revise some of the existing barriers to the practice of law. We are not seeking funds from the general fund to support these efforts, as they are almost entirely grant funded, but I think it's important to update you. This initiative is designed to invite more of a spirit of entrepreneurship into the legal profession, to allow the free market more room to work its magic, while at the same time ensuring that consumer protection remains high. To this end, we have created, under the supervision of the Supreme Court, the Office of Legal Services Innovation, which operates a sandbox a controlled environment that allows applicants to seek regulatory waivers so they might offer legal services in new and innovative ways.

To date we have approved 31 entities, some owned by non-lawyers in whole or in part, some offering services by trained non-lawyers under the supervision of lawyers. This kind of ownership by non-lawyers and the provision of legal services by non-lawyers could not be done absent regulatory waivers. Here are some examples of approved innovations:

- A group attorneys who serve domestic violence victims asked permission for their non-lawyer victim advocates to assist victims in obtaining protective orders and stalking injunctions. These advocates will receive training and be supervised by lawyers.
- A non-lawyer owned entity will offer legal assistance through small brick and mortar locations in traditionally underserved areas. These locations will have computer terminals with software to guide users through the completion of legal documents. Non-lawyer staff will answer informational questions and help with using the software. They will be trained and overseen by lawyers.
- A corporation will provide a Turbo Tax-like technology platform to generate legal documents in divorce and custody cases, eviction cases, and debt-related property seizure cases.

• Another organization will provide no-cost or low-cost legal services to assist clients in preparing various documents in employment and housing eviction cases. They will use chat bots, instant messaging, and automated interviews and will use trained non-lawyers under lawyer supervision. Much of what they do will be done remotely.

Other services we have approved include: assistance with those facing medical debt; software for real estate transactions; AI-enabled software for contract negotiation, drafting, and management; services related to veterans' benefits; services related to workers compensation benefits; and a software-based platform for connecting Utah lawyers and licensed legal practitioners to consumers. We even approved an application from a solo practitioner who wanted to give his paralegal a 10% ownership interest in his law firm to reward her years of dedicated service.

What I have described is only the beginning. Innovation and entrepreneurship offer the potential for making real progress in narrowing the access to justice gap. Budget Priorities

Now, to our budget requests. These many innovations in delivering court services to the people have been the result of careful planning and coordination. They have been accomplished only by the dedicated work of hundreds of individuals, devoted public servants committed to the judiciary's mission on behalf of the people. I want to make special mention of two noteworthy groups who, so much of the time, have collectively had their hands on the laboring oar during the last two years: our judicial assistants and our IT department.

Judicial Assistants' Critical Role Within the Courts

Judicial assistants make up 40% of all court employees and are critical to the courts' mission. They act under the authority of their assigned judicial officers to ensure that all administrative needs are met. I want to publicly acknowledge the critical importance of our judicial assistants and thank them for their dedication and service, particularly in the challenging times we've experienced in the last two years.

Currently, the average pay rate for judicial assistants is more than 20% below market value, more than double the 10% difference just five years ago. And a decade ago, the three-year average turnover rate for judicial assistants in Utah

was a manageable 8.65%. Over the past 10 years, that percentage has dramatically increased to where, at the end of 2021, our judicial assistant turnover rate is now at a completely unsustainable 25%. Continuing to pay our judicial assistants at rates so significantly below market value puts critical judicial branch functions at risk. Despite doing everything possible to address this issue internally, we need legislative assistance and budget prioritization. For this reason, the Judicial Council has made securing funding to increase judicial assistant compensation its number one budget request priority for FY2023. The Judicial Council is asking you to appropriate \$3.9M in ongoing funds to ensure we can recruit and retain well–trained, professional, and qualified judicial assistants. The people, including court patrons, attorneys, and so many others, deserve this from their judiciary.

Information Technology

The Judicial Council's second budget priority concerns our information technology needs. I am extremely proud of the innovative and dependable work our IT staff has consistently delivered over the last two years. Last session, you graciously appropriated \$802,000 in one–time funds to address several critical IT needs, from cybersecurity infrastructure to necessary software licensing to rural courthouse bandwidth. This session the Judicial Council asks that you readdress this one–time funding structural imbalance and convert this funding to an ongoing appropriation.

Other Requests

In addition to those requests, the Judicial Council has prioritized requests for the following:

- ongoing funding for a public outreach coordinator;
- a much-needed second juvenile court judge in the Sixth Judicial District, where the people of Sanpete, Sevier, Piute, Wayne, Garfield, and Kane Counties are presently served by a single juvenile court judge;
- ongoing funding for a coordinator to assist with providing judges detailed information in guardianship cases; and
 - ongoing funding for a statewide treatment court coordinator.

In the coming weeks, we will be presenting detailed information on these requests to our appropriations subcommittee and to the Executive Appropriations Committee. We hope to have your support when it is time to vote on these budget requests.

CONCLUSION

As with all the judiciary's efforts, each of these requests, and the underlying work this funding supports, is on behalf of the people. As I see the work that you accomplish each legislative session, I am firmly convinced that the legislature and the judiciary have a shared commitment to serve the people to the best of our abilities. We value our partnership with you in this solemn service to the people. Thank you for your interest in, and support of, the work of the courts. And may your efforts this session be efficient, productive, and rewarding.

JOINT CONVENTION

President J. Stuart Adams called the Joint Convention to order at 6:15 p.m. in the Chamber of the Utah House of Representatives and recognized Brad R. Wilson, Speaker of the House.

President Adams announced that a quorum of the House of Representatives and the Senate was present.

President Adams appointed a Joint Committee comprised of Senators Evan Vickers, Ann Millner, and Luz Escamilla, and Representatives Mike Schultz, Jefferson Moss, and Brian King to notify Governor Spencer J. Cox that the 2022 General Session of the Sixty–Fourth Legislature is in Joint Convention and ready to hear his State–of–the–State address.

President Adams acknowledged special guests and elected and appointed officials in attendance at the Joint Convention.

Senator Evan Vickers made a motion that the Legislature resolve into a Joint Convention and Committee of the Whole for the purpose of hearing Governor Cox's State-of-the-State address.

The Joint Committee escorted Governor Cox to the House rostrum.

STATE-OF-THE-STATE ADDRESS BY GOVERNOR SPENCER J. COX

To Utah's public servants gathered here tonight and my fellow Utahns: Welcome.

Our time together this evening is brief — indeed our time in public service is brief — so I will forgo many of the formalities of this setting. Although a departure from custom, I would ask you to hold applause until the end as we examine together the many critical issues facing our state. For some of you, I know that holding applause won't be hard.

You see, we have many important things to accomplish together. Real work. Hard work. And I don't want to waste a single moment.

It seems like nearly all we have talked about for the past two years is COVID. And while we, along with the rest of the world, find ourselves in the middle of record cases and hospitalizations, there are a few silver linings. I am encouraged that Utah currently has the 6th lowest hospitalization rate in the nation — and that our rate is less than half the national average. Experts also believe that Summit County has already started declining and assure me that the rest of the state will soon follow.

We have tremendous medical and public health workers in the state who deserve our deep respect, support, and thanks. That was true in early 2020 when the pandemic first began. It is even more true today.

To Utahns from all sides of the political spectrum, there has been and will undoubtedly continue to be disagreements on how best to respond to this ongoing pandemic. But may we all find common ground tonight on this one issue. Our children need us to be strong. They need us to point to a hopeful future. And they need to be in school, in person, face—to—face with their friends and teachers.

To those teachers with us tonight, I know that you are on mile 42 of what was promised to be a 26.2 mile COVID marathon. And while we can never thank you enough, I do believe that we can pay you better.

Thanks to the leadership of President Stuart Adams and many others, last year we made historic investments in our schools and teachers, \$510 million in all.

This year we can do even more.

That's why I am proposing more than \$970 million in education funding with a priority focus on at-risk and disadvantaged students. A child's zip code should never determine their future or their opportunities.

This session I am also proposing the elimination of all school fees for the basic coursework required for graduation. This legislation being drafted by Rep. Adam Robertson will save Utah parents \$55 million each year, with many of those dollars going to Utah families struggling to meet essential financial obligations.

But money alone is not enough. The data is clear — for far too many children an inability to read at grade level by 3rd grade means a life of struggle and disadvantages. And that is why I am asking you to join me in supporting Senator Ann Milner's bill to make sure every child has the reading foundation necessary for future success.

One of the greatest challenges Utah families are experiencing today is the booming tax of inflation, which just recently hit rates not seen since 1982. In Utah, we must be a bulwark against the bad decisions in Washington, DC that are harming our people.

Because of critical decisions we made together during the pandemic, and the incredible resilience of Utahns, our state is in its strongest fiscal condition ever with the largest rainy day fund, lowest unemployment and largest budget surplus in our state's history.

Last year we delivered nearly \$100 million in tax cuts for Utah seniors, military veterans and families. Tonight, I am proposing an additional \$160 million grocery tax credit for Utah families who are suffering the devastating impacts of inflation. With this year's surplus, I think we can all agree that it's time we gave some of that hard–earned money back to Utahns.

This past year was one of the driest on record, with 98% of the state experiencing extreme drought conditions. Utahns stepped up in a big way, conserving billions of gallons of water to help us through this crisis. Tonight, I encourage you to vote for bills carried by Representatives Robert Spendlove and Ray Ward to prioritize water storage and dramatically improve water conservation in our state.

And to Speaker Brad Wilson, you have always been a champion of thinking big and planning for the future. I am proud to say in front of this body and the entire state that I am 100% committed to helping you accomplish your vision of saving the Great Salt Lake.

While water is the greatest limiting factor to our growth, there are several other pressing issues we must address including air quality, transportation, housing affordability and other infrastructure needs. Our goal should never be to grow for growth's sake. We must prioritize a quality of life that all Utahns can enjoy.

To Utah's newest residents — and as the fastest-growing state in America there are many of you — welcome to our beautiful state. We are happy you have chosen to call this your new home. We have so much to learn from you.

But, if I may make one small request: Please don't attempt to change us into the place you just left. Utah has maintained a high quality of life and abundant opportunity for our residents through practical, common sense governance and it is absolutely critical that all of us do everything in our power to keep it that way.

Legislators, this session I ask for your support of new bills spearheaded by Representatives Joel Ferry, Steve Waldrip, Joel Briscoe and Senator Jake Anderegg to remove government regulations that needlessly increase Utah's housing prices.

We can increase supply without decreasing quality of life. This one will not be easy. But we cannot let our state become California.

For the first time ever, people on the Wasatch Front are experiencing something that those of us from rural Utah have felt for far too long: the terrible realization that our kids and grandkids might not be able to live near us. In rural Utah that happens because of a lack of jobs. Along the Wasatch Front, it's due to the unsustainable increase in housing prices.

We have to get this right. We must act now.

And with the strongest economy in the nation, we have a generational opportunity to invest in infrastructure. If the federal government is going to continue recklessly spending money borrowed from future generations, it is our duty to invest in projects that will benefit our children and grandchildren.

This session I ask for your support of a dramatic overhaul and removal of many state and local economic incentives under bills carried by Representatives Mike Schultz and Steve Handy. In fact, our Unified Economic Opportunity Commission will be presenting 26 new policy initiatives, including bills on workforce development, education alignment with industry, housing availability, a better start—up ecosystem, re–imagining rural economics, bolstering international trade, multicultural economic empowerment and bridging opportunity gaps.

I further encourage you to vote for legislation sponsored by Senator David Hinkins and Representative Carl Albrecht to help Utah become the nation's leader in sustainable energy development. We can no longer be reliant on foreign countries — some of whom actively seek to do us harm — to be the primary suppliers of our country's clean energy future. Twenty-eight of the world's 35 most critical minerals can be found right here in our state. We can show the country and the world how to responsibly harness the power of our precious natural resources while being wise and protective stewards of this land that we cherish.

I also need your support for the Utah Sustainable Health Collaborative, which I convened in November with the audacious goal of lowering the cost of healthcare AND improving health outcomes. The concept is simple but revolutionary: In Utah we can create a new system focused on health, not health care.

In a new Broadway show, one of the main characters says this line: "Happy families only exist in orange juice commercials and Utah."

Tonight, I am proposing a new position that will make Utah parents and children its singular priority. We currently have programs focused on providing necessities for families that are poor or in need, but we must do more to make sure families of all shapes and sizes and makeups are thriving, including parental leave, access to high-quality child care and mentoring opportunities for parents.

The purpose of this office is not to inject more government into families — it is the exact opposite: It is to make sure that government policies are not harming families and that we are coordinating government services to help parents and children succeed.

I firmly believe that Utah's success in recent years can be directly attributed to our family-centric identity — and yes, that includes our nation-leading marriage and birth rates. In fact, that has always been part of what makes Utah unique, strong, and resilient.

After decades of so-called experts warning the world about overpopulation, now the best and the brightest correctly cite a low and declining birth rate as a major risk facing human civilization.

But the risks to our society in abandoning the family are not just macro in scale. This issue touches on the things that matter most in the world. We know that the family, the basic and fundamental unit of our society, continues to be the most effective and least expensive place to solve problems. When families are healthy and happy, society benefits.

And finally a brief word on election integrity. Over the past seven years as your Lt. Governor, I championed bills every single session to improve and strengthen election integrity.

This year we will continue that trend with another bill from our good Lt. Gov. Deidre Henderson. Utah has been and will continue to be a model of election integrity.

Unfortunately, some in our country have found that unsubstantiated claims and flat-out lies are an effective way to destabilize our constitutional republic and

make it harder for their opponents to participate and vote. Voting security must never be about making it harder for legal voters to vote.

Please beware of false choices. As a conservative, I believe that we should always work to make constitutional rights more accessible, not less. I am very proud that voter participation has increased since I became Lt. Governor and now Governor. We can have safe and secure elections without making it harder to exercise our constitutional right to vote.

As I have traveled the state, I've heard some argue that the Constitution will someday, if not now, hang by a thread and need rescuing. I worry that what a few of them fail to see is that, they — just like those for whom they have so much disdain and contempt — are daily hacking away at those cords, recklessly believing that they will know exactly when to stop slicing and start saving. Tonight, I'm asking every one of us to do our part to start tying those "mystic c[h]ords of memory" back together again.

Now, to members of the Legislature, I want to thank you personally and sincerely for the sacrifices you make to leave families and employment for these 45 days to do the people's work. I want you to know that I respect you and I admire you. There are many other bills we are supporting together that I could have mentioned this evening, but due to time constraints I can't share them all. You will notice I have not mentioned any bills sponsored by my brother–in–law Sen. Mike McKell. You may recall that last year I vetoed one of his bills, something I hope we can make an annual tradition.

For about 85% of you, this might be it. As a citizen legislature, you are only guaranteed these final 45 days of legislative service. I would ask you how you want to spend these precious few days together. We have so much work to do. Real work. Hard work.

I sometimes worry that we waste too much valuable time on things that tear us apart and ultimately don't matter. You may have noticed last year that I have very little interest in fighting the so-called culture wars. Every good and worthy cause — taken to an extreme (and if there's one thing we are good at today, it's taking everything to extremes) — can become toxic and destructive.

It used to be said that all politics is local. I no longer believe that to be true. Today all politics is national. And that is bad. Very bad.

The easiest thing in the world is to watch MSNBC or Fox News and simply adopt all of their talking points and policies. It's certainly more entertaining than this speech. It's the most tried and true way to get likes on social media. It is also terribly destructive. And it certainly isn't leadership.

But that's not us. That's not Utah. At least it's not Utah at its best.

The good people of our state — and our country — are in desperate search for leadership. A desperate search for hope. In past generations as Americans, we dreamed big. Now, I'm afraid that our eyes are consistently in the gutter.

But not in Utah. Not yet anyway. In Utah, we still look up.

I firmly believe in my heart that if America is the last great hope of the world, then Utah is the last great hope of America.

But this is no guaranteed birthright. We have a choice, and we must make it every day. We can either become like every other state in the union or we can continue to be that quirky state out West that still believes in working together.

Cynics like to attack this concept of "the Utah Way." They say it's a useless slogan: overplayed, untrue, or trite. Some lose interest in the concept as soon as something happens that they disagree with, forgetting that, as Judge Learned Hand taught us, "the spirit of liberty is the spirit that is not too sure it is right."

We may not always get it right, but in Utah we reject false choices. Here in Utah, we proudly protect religious liberties and love and proudly protect our LGBTQ neighbors. We deeply love our refugees and immigrants from all parts of the world and deeply respect the rule of law.

In Utah, we wisely invest in the future, and wisely don't spend beyond our means, even saving for rainy days. We share a love of community while holding individual freedoms as sacred. We protect our unborn and support our single mothers and children facing poverty and trauma. And we fully stand behind our beloved people of color and our beloved people in law enforcement.

So, let's not be distracted for a second by cynics who fail to appreciate the Utah Way. Let's cheerfully and resolutely go about doing the people's work, the real work and the hard work of governance. Competently, and often quietly, lifting Utahns up and improving lives.

As a point of personal privilege, Mr. President and Mr. Speaker, I will conclude with a brief family story of mine (and yours, Mr. Speaker). My ancestor Orville Sutherland Cox moved to this state from Illinois where his home was burned to the ground by angry mobs. They lost everything.

Well, almost everything. When two men showed up with torches to burn the house, my pregnant grandmother refused to leave until those men helped remove her favorite piece of furniture. After ignoring their threats and realizing she was

serious, the two men put down their torches, carried the cabinet from the home and then burned the rest of the house to the ground. When my grandfather returned, they cooked dinner on the ashes of the home and soon made their way to the barren desert of Utah.

Upon his arrival in the Salt Lake Valley in 1847, Orville was immediately sent up the canyon to help bring back timber to help solve Utah's first housing crisis. Losing sight of his mission to bring back lumber to build new homes, Orville instead brought back a "magnificent specimen of a pine" for a Liberty Pole that was raised on Pioneer Square just a few blocks from where we sit tonight. This was the first pole to carry the American flag in the Salt Lake Valley.

You see, my great-great-great grandfather had every reason to hate the United States of America, a country that promised him his First Amendment right to a free exercise of religion only to see that same government stand aside when the mobs assembled.

But he never gave up on the IDEA of America. He believed in the promise of what America could be — not what it was at that moment.

To my friends of color: You may believe the immortal words of Martin Luther King Jr. that, "the arc of the moral universe bends towards justice ...," but you also know it sure takes a long time to get there. Let's walk together and do the work to make Utah a place where there is truly liberty and justice for all. Please don't give up on the idea of America.

To my friends in rural Utah, who for far too long have exported our kids away from home: I understand that you're hurting. We have seen far too many deaths of despair. Let's walk together and do the work to make Utah a place where the promise of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness is found in every community. Please don't give up on the idea of America.

To my Republican friends, who feel like the world is moving too quickly and the other side is trying to change our very way of life: I agree with George W. Bush who said, "Too often we judge other groups by their worst examples, while judging ourselves by our best intentions." Please don't give up on the idea of America.

And to my Democratic friends, who worry that our country is broken beyond repair because we are failing to take care of each other: I agree with Bill Clinton, "There is nothing wrong with America that cannot be cured by what is right with America." Please don't give up on the idea of America.

To you my fellow public servants, I pledge my hands and my heart in this work. It is our privilege to represent the great citizens of this state for but a moment in time.

Let's do the big things. Let's do the things that matter. Real work. Hard work.

May God bless you. And may God forever bless the great state of Utah.

Mr. Speaker: March 4, 2022

The Joint Conference Committee comprised of Senators S. D. Sandall, T. D. Weiler, and G. Davis, and Representatives J. Ferry, C. Snider, and A. Stoddard, recommends S.B. 203, TIRE RECYCLING FUND AMENDMENTS, by Senator S. D. Sandall, be replaced and recommends 1st Sub. S.B. 203, TIRE RECYCLING FUND AMENDMENTS, as amended by the House, with the following Joint Conference Committee amendments:

 - (c) that owns or operates a landfill that has its permitted boundary more than 10 miles from the municipality's jurisdictional boundaries.

 - 57 <u>shall pay to Division of Finance for deposit into the fund:</u>
 - 58 (a) all reimbursements that the municipality receives under Section 19–6–812; and
 - 59 (b) all revenue collected by the municipality in relation to the landfill.

 - 61 prescribed by the Division of Finance.
 - 62 { (3) } (4) The Division of Finance shall pay amounts received from a landfill under this
 - 63 <u>section quarterly to the county in whose jurisdictional boundaries</u> the landfill is located.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

The Chief Clerk, Megan Allen, read the following:

CALL OF LEGISLATIVE VETO OVERRIDE SESSION

Pursuant to Article VII, Section 8 of the Utah Constitution and Utah State Legislative Joint Rule Title Two, Chapter Two, its presiding officers, the Honorable J. Stuart Adams, President of the Utah Senate, and the Honorable Brad R. Wilson, Speaker of the Utah House of Representatives, have polled the members of the Senate and the House of Representatives, and do hereby call the 64th Utah State Legislature into a Legislative Veto Override Session to convene at the State Capitol on Friday, March 25, 2022 at 1:00 p.m.

At least two-thirds of the members of each house voted in favor of convening a Veto Override Session. Governor Spencer J. Cox vetoed the following bill passed by the Legislature which adjourned on March 4, 2022:

H.B. 11 Student Eligibility in Interscholastic Activities (Rep. Birkeland, K.)

The Utah State Legislature may address any additional vetoed items of appropriation from the 2022 General Session.

Roll call showed all members present.

Speaker Wilson announced that pursuant to Joint Rule 2–2–203, the Rules adopted by the Legislature during the 2022 General Session apply to the conduct of the House during the Veto Override Session.

Speaker Wilson appointed Representatives Ward, Stenquist, and Carol Moss to notify the Governor that the House is convened in a Veto Override Session and is

organized and ready to receive any communication or message he may have to offer.

Speaker Wilson appointed Representatives Maloy, Teuscher, and Briscoe to notify the Senate that the House is organized and ready to do business.

On motion of Representative J. Moss, the House voted to print the Governor's veto letter for **H.B. 11** upon the pages of the House Journal.

GOVERNOR'S VETO LETTER TO H.B. 11

Dear President Adams and Speaker Wilson:

March 22, 2022

I believe in fairness and protecting the integrity of women's sports. I know both of you are committed to these same ideals and that we have worked very hard together to resolve the many issues surrounding transgender student participation in sports. Unfortunately, HB11 has several fundamental flaws and should be reconsidered. Because the bill was substantially changed in the final hours of the legislative session with no public input and in a way that will likely bankrupt the Utah High School Athletic Association and result in millions of dollars in legal fees for local school districts with no state protection, and for several other reasons below, I have chosen to veto this bill.

The transgender sports participation issue is one of the most divisive of our time. Because there are logical and passionate arguments by many parties, finding compromise or common ground can be difficult. Sadly, there is very little room for nuance in this debate. But I hope you will permit me an opportunity to explain my reasons for vetoing HB11.

Utah has a history of trying to approach complicated issues in ways that bring collaboration and fairness. From immigration and criminal justice reform to LGBTQ protections and religious freedom, Utah has often shown an unusual willingness to find new and compassionate ways to solve the most toxic debates of our time. For this reason, I was heartened and encouraged to see legislators sitting down with LGBTQ advocates to work on a compromise that would both protect women's sports and allow some participation for our most marginalized transgendered youth. No other state has done this, and we hoped that Utah could be the first.

As you know, the negotiations centered around the potential compromise of a commission of experts that would help decide on an individual basis which kids would be able to participate. The concept was fairly simple. For the very small number of transgender kids who are looking to find a sense of connection and community—without posing any threat to women's sports—the commission would

allow participation. However, the committee would prohibit participation in the rare circumstance of an outlier who could pose a safety threat or dominate a sport in a way that would eliminate competitive opportunities for biological females.

Unfortunately, over time, the negotiations got bogged down debating the makeup of the commission and some of the language in the bill. While we were not able to reach an agreement on the commission, the bill sponsors did agree to remove some of the most troubling language. As the hallmark of a good compromise, neither side was thrilled, but there was a path forward. And while I admit it was not perfect, there was general agreement that we could pass the bill and continue tweaking the concept during the next year as necessary.

On the last day of the legislative session we began hearing rumors of a 4th substitute of the bill that would implement an all-out ban, with the new commission only coming into play if a court prohibited the ban. While it is not unusual to have legislators propose changes to bills, it is unusual to have major overhauls proposed at the last minute on significant policy issues that had been the subject of so much negotiation. It is even rarer to have these pass, especially with no communication with those who had been negotiating the issue. So, you can imagine my surprise when the 4th substitute was revealed late on the last day of the session and debated and passed just a few hours before midnight.

It is important to note that a complete ban was never discussed, never contemplated, never debated and never received any public input prior to the Legislature passing the bill on the 45th and final night of the session. For this reason, many legislators who might have otherwise supported the policy felt compelled to vote against it.

I believe in process. How we make policy matters almost as much as the policy itself. An opportunity to participate is a critical component of public trust. While changes are inevitable, this was more than just a cosmetic change. This was a complete reversal of every discussion, public or private. Every article written by the media on this issue was about the commission and a compromise. Every answer given during press availability was about the commission and a compromise.

Much of the debate that night centered around the difficulties of bad process and a lack of time to get constituent input. This lack of time and input has serious legal and financial implications as well (more on that below). And while I appreciate the apologies I have received from legislators involved in the truncated proceeding, I feel a veto is necessary to improve the process and to better allow the public an opportunity to weigh in.

One of the worst results of that process was the inability of legislators to understand the financial impacts that will be forced upon the Utah High School Athletic Association (UHSAA) and local Utah school districts that will inevitably get sued under this bill. The UHSAA is a private organization and runs the real risk of insolvency and bankruptcy, putting our entire state athletics program in danger. Having just completed a lengthy and very expensive lawsuit, the organization does not have significant reserves on hand. Furthermore, the UHSAA has been clear that if the state ever attempted a ban, the state would also need to provide indemnification to hold the organization harmless in the forthcoming lawsuit.

Unfortunately, HB11 provides no financial protection for the UHSAA, only an explicit invitation for a lawsuit. With several lawsuits already being litigated across the country, why would Utah insist — even encourage — expensive and debilitating legal action with no recourse for the organization that serves our own student athletes and schools? I hope you can agree that if we want to protect women's sports, bankrupting the institution that is responsible for their participation is a bad place to start.

To make matters worse, shortly after the introduction of the 4th substitute there was a hastily adopted amendment to explicitly exclude Utah's local schools from indemnification. Because the 4th substitute was so quickly introduced and at the very end of the session, there was significant confusion at the time about the reason such a clause was necessary and the impact it would have. Clearly, the reason for the amendment was to avoid a fiscal note that could not have been funded at such a late hour without nullifying the bill. However, during the discussion on the Senate floor it was incorrectly argued that government immunity would protect schools from a lawsuit based on the ban. Because these lawsuits would involve potential civil rights violations, they would not qualify for governmental immunity. This means that schools would inevitably face costly litigation and the potential for significant damages.

For this reason, many schools across the state of Utah have reached out expressing concern. Had they been aware of the language of the 4th substitute with enough time to comment, they undoubtedly would have shared a similar message with legislators who were forced to vote on the bill with no public input. Again, why would we risk significant legal exposure for some of our poorest schools with no financial support when other states are already funding identical legal defenses across the country? If the state insists on a policy that encourages significant litigation, I believe the state should pay for the litigation. It is my understanding that you have polled your members and that you have the sufficient two–thirds majority to override a veto. Should this occur, I will immediately call a special session to change this section of the bill in order to avoid bankrupting our athletic

association and local schools. A simple veto override will not resolve this fundamental issue.

I also think it's important to address some of the arguments that came up during the passing of the 4th substitute of the bill. Many legislators brought up the trans swimmer at the University of Pennsylvania, who has recently dominated women's swimming, setting records and lapping the field. I agree with those who are concerned with this egregious example. I believe this is terrible for women's sports. There are natural advantages that come from our birth sex, which is the very reason that we have men's and women's sports in the first place. Setting records and taking scholarships away from biological gendered women should give everyone pause. It's bad for women and it is bad for the LGBTQ community, as it turns allies and reasonable people into opponents. I don't believe that this type of participation is compelled by the Constitution, but that decision will be left to the courts in the months and years to come.

However, there are a few problems with this example being the reason for a complete ban in Utah. First, this bill would do nothing to prevent that example, as HB11 only applies to high school and middle school and does not impact collegiate athletes. And second, if there was a similar example in a Utah high school, the proposed commission would prevent it from happening. Indeed, that is the very purpose of the commission: it would attempt to both protect women sports and allow our most vulnerable an opportunity to participate. Interestingly, the very legislator who introduced the 4th substitute of the bill called the commission concept "brilliant." I do not know if the commission would completely solve this divisive issue, but I appreciate the innovative and respectful approach that it offers.

I also believe there is broad misunderstanding around the current rules regarding transgender participation in sports. In particular, from the testimony of many, there seems to be a belief that any biologically-born male could simply say he was transgender and begin participating in women's sports. This is incorrect. For many years now, the UHSAA has had in place a rule that only allows male—to—female transgender participation in women's sports after a full year of difficult transition hormone therapy and in consultation with a health care professional. This has likely prevented some participation and helped to even the playing field. As a representative of the UHSAA stated: "As we read the science right now, we like our policy. This year we have four students who have gone through our paperwork and we have not had any complaints from any other students or families or school administrators." I should note that while I have some reservations about a policy that requires or incentivizes these transitions, it is the policy in place.

Finally, there is one more important reason for this veto. I must admit, I am not an expert on transgenderism. I struggle to understand so much of it and the science is conflicting. When in doubt however, I always try to err on the side of kindness, mercy and compassion. I also try to get proximate and I am learning so much from our transgender community. They are great kids who face enormous struggles. Here are the numbers that have most impacted my decision: 75,000, 4, 1, 86 and 56.

- 75,000 high school kids participating in high school sports in Utah.
- 4 transgender kids playing high school sports in Utah.
- 1 transgender student playing girls sports.
- 86% of trans youth reporting suicidality.
- 56% of trans youth having attempted suicide 1

Four kids and only one of them playing girls sports. That's what all of this is about. Four kids who aren't dominating or winning trophies or taking scholarships. Four kids who are just trying to find some friends and feel like they are a part of something. Four kids trying to get through each day. Rarely has so much fear and anger been directed at so few. I don't understand what they are going through or why they feel the way they do. But I want them to live. And all the research shows that even a little acceptance and connection can reduce suicidality significantly. For that reason, as much as any other, I have taken this action in the hope that we can continue to work together and find a better way. If a veto override occurs, I hope we can work to find ways to show these four kids that we love them and they have a place in our state.

I recognize the political realities of my decision. Politically, it would be much easier and better for me to simply sign the bill. I have always tried to do what I feel is the right thing regardless of the consequences. Sometimes I don't get it right, and I do not fault those who disagree with me. But even if you disagree with me, I hope this letter helps you understand the reasons for my decision.
