# **Canadian Section Working Group Reports**

# 1. NALPConnect Working Group (formerly the Collaboration and Information Exchange Working Group)

This Working Group has put forward three more NALP Bulletin articles. Each of the articles being submitted is being authored by a member of this Working Group. The three articles include:

1. May issue – Erin Wilcott will submit an article on "Practice What You Teach" as that may relate to time management, soft and business skills, etc.

2. June – Robyn Marttila will submit an article on the articling process in Ontario.

3. July – Emily Finn will submit an article to follow up on the presentation she is delivering at the annual NALP Conference. The topic is "Upwards and 360 Degree Reviews in the Law Firm Context".

The Working Group is nearing completion of creating a Canadian recruitment chart. The chart will contain relevant recruitment dates for the various Canadian regions. Once finalized, the chart will be posted to NALPConnect as a resource to all NALP members and more specifically for all Canadian NALP members.

The Working Group continues to discussed and execute on ideas to promote and increase traffic on NALPConnect by Canadian members.

The Summer and Articling Recruitment Working Group continues to review recruitment activities and issues across the country.

## Toronto Summer and Articling Recruitment Best Practices Discussion

The Working Group has scheduled a meeting for February 5 to discuss some feedback arising from the Fall 2012 recruitment cycle and to further review the Law Society of Upper Canada recruitment procedures and the Best Practices Guide that was developed. Members of the Working Group (which includes both school and firm representatives) will meet to propose concrete suggestions and/or changes in conduct which will then be shared with the wider recruitment group as a whole. Subject to the outcome of the Working Group meeting, a subsequent facilitated discussion may also be organized which will be open to any interested Canadian NALP members.

## viDesktop Portal

The viDesktop portal is currently being used to collect articling and summering applications in Toronto, Montreal, Calgary, Vancouver, and Ottawa. The Ottawa market used viDesktop for the first time this year to collect Summer 2013 applications and feedback is being collected.

## Implications of Law Society of Upper Canada Taskforce on Articling

The Law Society of Upper Canada recently released its final Articling Taskforce Report. The LSUC's recommendation is as follows:

The majority of the Task Force recommends that Convocation approve a pilot project that will allow articling and a new Law Practice Program (LPP) to operate side by side for five years. While articling would continue to be the route through which most candidates become licensed, the LPP, which would include both a skills-training program and a co-operative work placement, would provide an alternative path to licensing.

The Working Group will meet in the near future to discuss the Report and whether it has any implications on summer and articling recruitment.

# 3. Canadian Directory of Legal Employers Working Group

The Working Group recently held meetings on November 8, 2012 and January 28, 2013. The focus of recent discussions has been around the potential change of the CDLE form to the U.S. based platform. This topic was also discussed in November at the NALP Winter Meeting and included a consultation meeting held on November 29<sup>th</sup> where the Working Group & Lisa Quirk outlined options for consideration regarding the CDLE platform. In these meetings the Working Group reviewed the benefits/impacts of the U.S. platform or enhancing the current system, the information received from NALP regarding the cost of implementing the options, and feedback from NALP members. As a result of these meetings, and a number of broader requests for feedback from Canadian NALP members, the Working Group has voted in favour of proposing to move to the new platform. A final call for member feedback will be sent to the NALP membership this week and the Working Group's formal recommendation will be communicated to Lisa Quirk no later than February 15, 2013.
