

DR. WILEY ENGAGES MUSEUM FOR SCENE OF BIG BEER INQUIRY

Expects Big Crowd of Brewers to Be Present at Hearing.

COUNSEL TO APPEAR FOR SOME OF THEM

Others Will Attend in Person, While Still Others Will Send Long Briefs.

Beer—what it is and isn't—is expected to draw such a crowd when it is discussed before Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, chief of the Agricultural Department's Bureau of Chemistry, that Dr. Wiley will not have the hearing in his office.

The persons who brew beer will appear before Dr. Wiley by counsel and in person, likewise some who can do either of these things, will send long briefs.

Dr. Wiley, it was announced today, will be very glad to have briefs submitted in writing by those who cannot attend the hearing. They are expected to tell what per cent of alcohol and what proportion of hops and the other things supposed to be in beer each particular brew contains.

The hearing will take place July 21. Dr. Wiley said today that every act will be a "headliner." It is expected to surpass that notable performance of the past, entitled, "What is Whisky?"

Ruling Questions. The following list of questions are submitted as a guide for discussion at this hearing:

What ingredients enter into the composition of beer, ale, porter, and stout, in the United States at the present day, and what are the processes of manufacture?

What ingredients were used and what were the processes of manufacture of beer, ale, porter, and stout in the United States prior to the enactment of the food and drugs act of June 30, 1906?

Are rice, corn, and brewer's sugar, molasses, etc., used at the present time in the manufacture of beer, ale, porter, and stout? If so, what purposes do they serve?

Do the proportions of the ingredients used in the manufacture of beer, ale, stout, and porter bear any fixed relation to each other?

What are the characteristics which differentiate beer, ale, porter, and stout? Are the differences due to materials used or to the processes of manufacture?

What are the densities of the worts from which beer, ale, porter, and stout are manufactured? Does the density of the wort used vary in each product? Within what limits?

Carbonation Problem. Have beer, ale, porter, and stout made in the United States been artificially carbonated? Are they artificially carbonated now? What is the purpose of artificial carbonation? Is artificial carbonation necessary?

Are domestic ales, beers, porters, and stouts artificially colored? Is artificial coloring used? What coloring materials are used? Have alkaline carbonates, such as bicarbonate of soda been used in the manufacture of beer, ale, porter, and stout in the United States? Are they used now? For what purpose are they used?

Are brewing waters being chemically treated in the United States? What is the purpose of the treatment? Is lupulin used in the manufacture of beers, ales, stouts, and porters? If so, for what purpose?

Different Kinds. Are there different kinds of beer, ale, porter, and stout, which should be distinguished by appropriate labeling? What are the meanings of the terms "lager" and "pilsener," as applied to beer? What are the meanings of the terms "malt" and "malt extract"?

Are names of foreign beers, ales, porters, and stouts applied to beers, ales, porters, and stouts made in the United States? How, if at all, may beers, ales, porters, and stouts bearing foreign names be labeled so as to meet the provisions of the law?

Fourth Fund Grows, But Still More Is Needed

Contributions of more than \$100 were made to the fund for the celebration of the Fourth of July yesterday, and the total this morning was \$2,228. ARMY CHIEFS SAY MAINE COFFERDAM IS HOLDING FIRM

Deny Rumors Circulated as to Stability of Big Caissons.

HAVANA, June 24.—Complete removal of the wreck of the Maine will not take place for many weeks yet, according to the statements of United States army engineers. But in the meantime, the gigantic cofferdam surrounding the wreck will hold firm.

Both of these officers assert that the caissons which compose the cofferdam, are fulfilling all expectations. Rumor of their instability, resulted, say the engineers, from the discontinuation of pumping on Tuesday. This discontinuation was merely for the purpose of letting the clay filling of the great cylinders adjust itself to new conditions as respects moisture and pressure from without.

A little seepage of water has been observed, but this was to have been expected, say the engineers. The interstices between the caissons will be caulked with quantities of crushed rock.

EDWARDS' CHARGES OF ENCROACHMENT STIRS ARMY CIRCLES

General Says Army Officers Are Interfering With Filipino Officials.

General Edwards, who spoke at a dinner at the University Club, in honor of Newton W. Gilbert, formerly vice governor of the islands, told those present that he was "compelled to keep two clerks steadily at work to prevent the usurpation of authority by subordinate officers."

"We find every day," continued General Edwards, "one or more instances where some subordinate has attempted to take from native officials the power rightfully belonging to them."

Manuel L. Quezon, resident commissioner of the islands, pleaded for better understanding between the American and Filipino peoples, and for a generally closer relationship. Gen. J. F. Smith, former governor, commended the commissioner's speech, and said a Congressional committee ought to visit the islands at least every two years.

C. H. Lamb, head of the Insular penal colony; Dr. A. Washburn, formerly director of the civil service, and G. A. O'Reilly, superintendent of schools at Manila, also spoke. Judge W. D. Norris presided at the dinner, which was given by the "Manilla contingent" in Washington.
