

TAFT WILL VOTE EARLY

Qualifies in Cincinnati to Support Party Ticket.

WOMAN AMONG CANDIDATES

Will Pass the Night in Home City, and Go to Kentucky Tomorrow.

Cincinnati, Nov. 6.—President Taft qualified as a voter in Cincinnati to-day. He appeared personally before the Cincinnati Election Board and afterward before the election judges in his own precinct and went through the steps required by law to insure his casting a ballot to-morrow.

Mr. Taft, accompanied by Mrs. Taft, Miss Helen Taft and Mrs. Thomas McK. Laughlin, of Pittsburgh, a sister of Mrs. Taft, arrived in Cincinnati early to-day. Shortly after breakfast the President took up the duties of a citizen who has been out of town, but who wants to register and who wishes to vote.

Richard Murphy, a Democrat, and one of the election judges, questioned the President. "What is your occupation?" asked Murphy, "President of the United States."

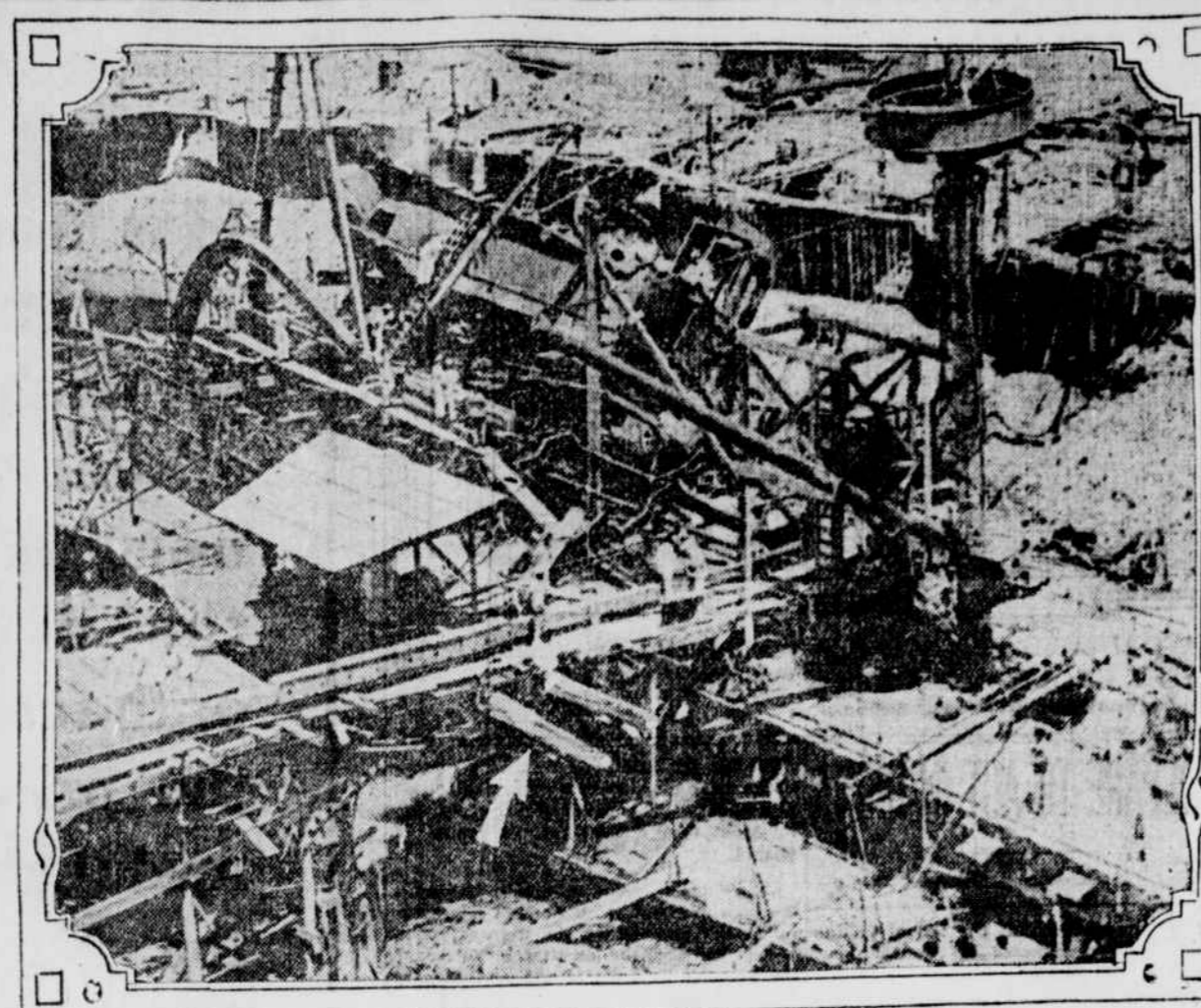

DIX LETS REFEREE BILL DIE

BOSTON HOTELS BAR BIBLES.

FISH PIRATES COME TO GRIEF

Two Fined After Taking Breeding Trout from State Hatchery.

Saranac Lake, N. Y., Nov. 6.—A sensational raid on the spawning beds for brook trout, operated by the state in connection with the Saranac Inn fish hatchery, resulted to-day in Eugene Sullivan, of Lake Clear, and John Ryan, of Malone, being fined \$100 each. The charge was brought by Byron Cameron, state game protector, of Saranac Lake.

SHORT SHOWER OF \$100 BILLS

Treasury Notes Fell Into Hands of Anazed Watchman.

Philadelphia, Nov. 6.—Charles Dunston, doorkeeper of the Hotel Walton here, this morning went out in a shower of \$100 bills. He got to his post at about 11 o'clock, took a squint at the sky and predicted rain. Just as he was turning away he noticed a big green spot coming, apparently from the clouds, toward him. He grabbed it. The green spot was a \$100 bill. Dunston continued to look skyward for more "drops," and, sure enough, another one came his way.

WOMEN IN TEARS, DEFEAT MOVE TO ACCEPT RESIGNATION.

Richeson Still Pastor Women, in Tears, Defeat Move to Accept Resignation.

Cambridge, Mass., Nov. 6.—While women cried and pleaded that nothing prejudicial to the interests of their pastor be done, the Immanuel Baptist Church Society, at a special meeting to-night, voted not to accept at this time the resignation of the Rev. Clarence V. T. Richeson, pastor of the church, charged with the murder of Avis Linnell. By another vote they decided to lay the matter on the table until November 21.

MESSENGER BOYS ON STRIKE

It began in the main office of the Western Union Telegraph Company, at Broadway and Dey street. "Joe" Rosenblatt was strike leader and organizer in chief of the new movement. HORSES IN PERIL BY FIRE

Blaze Destroys Factory, Doing Damage of \$50,000.

For more than two hours firemen fought a blaze which destroyed the five-story brick factory building of the Century Gas and Electric Fixture Company, at Nos. 419 and 421 East 8th street, last night. Three alarms were turned in, and the fire had done about \$50,000 damage before it was put out.

Directly in the rear of the burning building was the livery stable owned by A. Wilson, from which there was a stampede of more than a hundred horses. There was also a rush of tenants from tenement houses on each side of the stable.

\$20,000 GONE FROM MAILS

Pouch, Routed Raleigh to New York, Disappears.

Greensboro, N. C., Nov. 6.—It became known here to-day that a United States mail pouch, routed from Raleigh to New York and containing \$20,000, disappeared two weeks ago under circumstances similar to those of the theft recently reported of the pouch with \$20,000 in it at Lynchburg, Va. Beyond admitting the loss of the package, officials refuse to discuss the matter.

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BATTLESHIP SQUADRON SAILS

Newport, R. I., Nov. 6.—The first squadron of the Atlantic battleship fleet, consisting of the battleships Connecticut and the battleships North Dakota, Michigan, Louisiana, Vermont, South Carolina and New Hampshire, left Newport to-day for sea, to remain until Thursday night or Friday morning. The squadron will engage in all kinds of drills and evolutions, including torpedo practice at full speed.
