This was the chief development of an all-day meeting of the committee of fifteen.

Old Resolution Lost Because Employers Could Not Accept It in Whole

The committee by unanimous vote decided to maintain strict secrecy regarding what transpired in the meeting. However, from unquestionably reliable sources the chief facts concerning what had been done were learned.

Group's Sentiment Changes

The present resolution, there is the belief, was not adopted because the public group in the committee it was believed had been taken on Friday. If that is true, at least one vote in that group was switched since that time. But it is regarded as highly probable that the opposition in that group to-day was based upon the belief that support of the resolution as it stands would be futile.

While no one would characterize it as such, there seems to be something in the nature of an understanding that the steel strike will be ended by the conference by the group of delegates representing the public. The resolution, it is said, will aim to achieve the same result as that accomplished in the resolution disposed of by the committee to-day.

It will, however, differ in two main respects. It will undergo changes in language and will employ the employers' group, and it will propose a different method of selecting the conciliators. It is possible that representatives of the steel industry, whether at work or on strike, may be sought in the new proposal.

Employers Get Protests

Opinions differ here to-night as to the outlook. Certainly something happened over Sunday that was not expected. It is known that some of the delegates have been deluged with telegrams, and it is not believed that conciliation found much favor in their country.

General opinion seems to be that hope need not be abandoned for an end of the steel strike. The employers will refer to a group of subjects including wages, hours, working conditions, women in industry and immigration.
