# A Sensible Stand

IT IS reported that Repre-sentative Dickstein has de-clined the chairmanship of the Congressional Committee to in-vestigate Nazi activities in the United States and that a non-Jew will be appointed chairman. It is also understood that a Jew, a Catholic and a Protestant will be members of the committee. This is a wise plan. The Com-mittee must be representative. The investigation should be conducted with a thoroughness that will impress not only the Ameri-cian people but also public opin-tion abroad. There is a mass of cyidence to establish beyond the shadow of a doubt that the Nazi propagandists have been inciting race hatred in this country, villi-fying American Government fying American Government officials, including the President of the United States, and attack-ing American democratic insti-tutions. While the Jews are the greatest sufferers under the Hit-ler regime and while most of the Nazi propaganda in this country has been directed mainly against the Jews, the Congressional Committee will investigate the anti-American phases of the Nazi activities in the United States. The revelations of Nazi duplicity and arrogance are certain to startle American public

opinion. Congressman Dickstein. declining the chairmanship, is reported to have remarked: "I am working for the cause and not for the glory." He deserves congratulations and much credit for his splendid, sensible stand on this question.

### National Conference Sets Aside April 29 as Brotherhood Day'

Sunday, April 29, has been set aside as national "Brotherhood Day" by the National Conference of Jews and Christians. The day had been designated for this pose in response to widespread depose in response to wheespread de-mands on the part of leaders of all religious affiliations. The an-nouncement was made yesterday by Rev. Dr. S. Parkes Cadman, chairman of Brotherhood Day, who declared:

"In the past, perious of economic stress and social upheaval have been accompanied by suspicion and mistrust on the part of Protestants and Catholics, and Jews and Christians toward one another. At this particular period false rumors about minority groups are being circulated. Hatred, and suspicion of the intentions of those of opposite faiths, are foreign to the spirit of religion. Instead of learning to mistrust each other those of differing faiths should unite in a joint constructive campaign to further the interests of our coun-try socially, civicly, economically and in every other way. It will be the purpose of Brotherhood Day to stress to the American people the fact that our energy should be turned into the direction of joint constructive efforts among the various faiths, instead of antipathy and suspicion. The fundamental reason for doing away with prejudice is not because of any prejudice is not because of any sentimentalized theory, but be-cause the prejudice is irrational, obstructive and dangerous."

# INF to Honor Ussishkin in **Big Fund Drive**

Signatures Enrolled as Founders; Contest for Palestine Trip

Menahem Ussishkin, Zionist leader and world president of the Jewish National Fund, the Zionist agency for the acquisition and redemption of the soil of Pale as national Jewish property, will be honored by American Zio ists in a nation wide celebration here, according to plans of the Ussishkin Tribute Roll Committee of the Jewish National Fund of

Details of the program adopted by the Eighteenth Zionist Congress d resolutions voted at a recent national conference of all groups and parties held in Philadelphia, were made public by Dr. Israel Goldstein, president of the Jew-ish National Fund in America, who announced the appointment of Abraham Spicehandler, well known Hebraist and active Zionist worker, as chairman of the National Tribute Roll Committee,

The Tribute Roll, designed as a leaf, unfolding on a background a drawing depicting the contours n agricultural settlement in etine, provides space for twenty signatures of persons who will pay tribute to Ussishkin on the occasion of his seventieth birthday. Their contributions will go toward a sum of \$100,000 voted by the JNF national conference as Ameri-can Jewry's share in the establishment of Kfar Ussishkin. Con-tributors of sums from 70 cents or more have a right to afix their signatures on a Tribute Roll which automatically lists them as being among the founders of the new agricultural settlement in Pales-

Mr. Spicehandler said his committee was successful in securing the cooperation of 227 Zionist units in the metropolitan area. More than 5,000 Ussishkin Tribute Rolls have been distributed among se groups and the work of gath ering signatures accompanied by contributions is well under way. The drive will reach its climax on May 2nd, when the Ussishkin tribute dinner will be held in the grand ballroom of the Astor.

The Committee also announced

it will award a free trip to Palestine and return to the volunteer who will have obtained the highest number of signatures on the Ussishkin Tribute Rolls.

## Schlesinger Dead; Vienna Physician

World Famous in Medical Circles—Was Theodor Herzl's Doctor

VIENNA, April 1.—Professor Hermann Schlesinger, world fa-mous physician, is dead here at the age of sixty-eight.

Professor Schlesinger, who was the physician of Theodor Herzl, father of modern political Zionism, was born in Pressburg on June 2, 1866. Since 1905 he was head of the general hospital here.

Professor Schlesinger was the author of some 300 publications. of which were important contributions to modern medicine He was co-founder with Dr. Max Herz of the Vienna Medical Club. which gave rise to the Society for Internal Medicine and Pediatrics.

Specially known for his work on nervous diseases and senility, he had countless physicians study ing under him. Many of his works have been translated into six or more languages.



# Andersen Owed Much to His Jewish Friends in Denmark

By JULIUS MORITZEN . As the entire world is paying tribute to the memory of Hans Christian Andersen on this, the one hundred and twenty-ninth anniversary of his birth, it is well to recall at this time, when racial superiority has become an obsession with Denmark's neighbor to the south, that no people meant more to the famous Danish writer of the wonder stories in the latter period of his life than the Jewish families with whom he associated in Copenhagen.

As a matter of fact, the Mel-chiors of the Danish capital provided this perennial bachelor those home comforts that money those home comforts that money alone could never buy. Here he enjoyed associates who not only appreciated his genius, but who saw to it that nothing was wanting to give him that peace and restfulness that they and the villa ("Quietude") provided in such rich measure. The Melohior and Henriques families committees than riques families, occupying as they did prominent positions in Copen-hagen's financial and social life, nagen's mancial and social life, centered the artistic atmosphere of that city, and Andersen came to realize to what a degree Danish Jewry, through these representatives, was instrumental in aiding him indirectly in visualizing some of his captivating stories.

According to the new constitution, the Lord Mayor of Vienna is to be appointed by Chancellor Dollfuss. The new mayor will in turn appoint the councillors, including twelve to represent the autono-mous cultural corporations; three Roman Catholic representatives, one for the Protestants, and one for the Jews of Vienna. Thus the Jews, who constitute ten per cent of the population, will have only one representative.

# To Include Members Of Four Faiths

According to reliable information the committee will include besides Mr. Dickstein, a Catholic Protestant, a representative of

German origin and a free-thinker. Speaker Rainey will offer the appointment as chairman to Mr. Dickstein as a gesture of appreciation for his work, but it is ex-pected that he will refuse on the supposition that the work of the committee may be hampered with a Jewish representative at its

a hostile environment, to save them from a spiritual and material misery, and to enable them to grow up in happy and healthy surroundings.

It has been mostly in times of peril and need that great works of progress have come into being. Thus the work of emancipation Thus the work of emancipation and law-giving achieved by Moses was born of the oppression suffered by the Jewish people in Egypt. Thus, too, we, may hope that out of the military menace of our time shall grow a system of international law observed by all, that out of the collapse of economic organism a firmly secure, better directed eco-

nomic order shall develop.

Let me, finally, thank all those who have had a share in bringing about the sucess of this evening's entertainment."

# Buenos Aires Anti - Semitic Plot Revealed

6 Arrested After Bombs Are Thrown Into Synagogue

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) BUENOS AIRES, March 81. Police investigations of the throwing of three bombs in a synagogu during services Friday night have revealed what appears to be a well-organized anti-Semitic campaign here. A group of six men and boys have been arrested charged with complicity in throwing of the bombs,

throwing of the comps, Other rests are expected shortly.

No one was hurt when the bombs exploded, but the three loud explosions in rapid succession caused a panic and the congregation rushed into the street.

A few minutes later a group of

about fifty men assaulted and seri-ously injured a Jewish business man who was condemning before neighbors the incident he had just witnessed in the synagogue. The anti-Semitic hooligans rushed into his house shouting, "Death to the

The frequency of similar incidents in the past few weeks has led police to believe that they are part of an organized plan. part of an organized plan. Local newspapers accuse an organization called the Argentine Legion, a fascist militia organized by the late General Jose Uriburu.

A new synagogue was recently disfigured by tear bombs and movie theatres in Jewish neighborho have often been the scene of the throwing of tear gas bombs from the galleries accompanied by shouts of "Down With the Jews."
