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Austria Jews Split on Stand **Editorial Notes** For Rights

Leader's Resignation Throws Two Factions Into Furor

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) VIENNA, April 29.—The resig-nation of Dr. Jakob Orenstein, only non-Zionist on the board of the Vienna Jewish Community, from his post as vice-president of that body, and his resignation from the presidency of the Union of Austrian Jews, has created a furor in Jewish circles here.

Dr. Orenstein resigned because his group is determined not to conhis group is determined not to con-sent to any limitation of the citi-zenship rights of the Austrian Jews and is fearful that the Zion-ist majority will compromise with the Christian Socialist party. which is seeking to restrict Jew ish rights in Austria.

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency today received official statements from the Zionist majority group and from the Union of Austrian Jews explaining their position.

Mesko "analyzed" the Jewish question, declaring that he was against the use of force against native Hungarian Jews, asking only for the extension of numerus clausus against the Jews in all branches of intellectual and economic occupations.

Hofstadter Stresses Need of New | \$2,500 Given | Social Conscience at Meeting By Rockefeller

lewish Education Ass'n Holds Conference; Semel Speaks

Supreme Court Justice Samuel H. Hofstadter, in the principal ad-dress before yesterday's conference of the Jewish Education Association, held at the Jewish Club, 23 West Seventy-third street, stressed the need of a new social conscience called for by the economic changes now in progress.

"America needs not only a New Deal but a New Covenant," Judge Hofstadter declared. This New Covenant he envisaged in the words of the Prophet Jeremiah: "I will put my law in their inward parts, and in their hearts will I write it."

Referring to Fascism on the rampage in Germany, Judge Hof-stadter exclaimed: "The day will come when the historian will write down 'They sought to destroy the Jews because this people has be-come specially identified with free-dom and democracy.'

"But how can we secure responsibility with freedom? Not through the multiplication of laws, but through the elevation of the moral perceptions. We must instill into our children the sublime teachings of their faith. Then will they continue to be, in greater measure than ever, and in spite of all ene-mies, the guardians of liberty and democracy.

Rottenberg Presides

Samuel Rottenberg, vice president, presided as reports by the association's various committees were made to the members on their activities during the past year. In his opening remarks, Mr. Rotten-berg urged Jews to prepare themberg urged Jews to prepare them-selves and their children to meet the "challenge and menace" they are facing. "Our defense," he stated, "must be in terms of mind and spirit. We must take our stand on our own ground--the ground of our past, our achievements, our usefulness—on the justice of our

Jacob Werner, chairman of the shoop werner, chairman of the chairman committee, reported that during the past year scholar-ships were granted to 45 schools with an enrollment of 14,000 pupils. More than 25,000 free scholar to children of the poor, enabling them to attend Jewish religious ols, have been granted by the Jewish Education Association during its existence, Werner an-nounced. He declared that the committee felt "that where the parent is unable to provide his child with a Jewish education, he becomes the responsibility of the entire Jewish community.'

"I would not put it past this party," he said, "to try such non-sense. Neither my men nor I would besmear our reputations with despicable operations of this sort. I have neither written anti-Semitic circulars, authorized my following to write them, nor would I tolerate anything so contrary to our positive ideals."

Mr. Meyer, painting a picture of the Germans as not so emotional as are the Italians or the French, promised that once aroused they would let loose that "furor Teuwould let loose that "furor reu-tonicus," which crushes everything that stands in its path." He then stated that Jewish persecution in Germany is a lie. "A decent Jew." he declared.

In a ten point program for re-juvenation, Durant would have an intelligence and character test for immigrants, sterilization of the unfit and discouragement of breeding in the relatively incompetent, enlargement of the Civil Conservation Corps with compulsory one year service in the Corps for all youths, erection of special movies for children and their exclusion from the adults' cinema.

One day several years ago, said the good Doctor, a "non-Aryan" had the astounding temerity to attack a Nazi Storm Trooper in the street. The reason for the attack has been lost to historians, but even the most militant pro-Nazi will admit that the Jew's life wasn't worth very much when once the mob had its hands on him. Dr. Streicher, who happened to be present, waded through the crowd, like the American marines in the nickelodeon movies, and saved the man's life. He even took the Jew to his home, and had his

The Zionist statement concluded with an avowal that the Jewish nationalism of a large section of Austrian Jewry will never harm the Jews in the eyes of the non-Jewish world. in finding employment after arrival, it would be a violation of law to issue an immigration visa to an applicant who did not have sufficent resources to main-tain himself for an indefinite period without employment, or else satisfactory assurances of support which would make it unlikely that he would become a public charge. The result of this interpretation of law has been a drastic reduction of immigration from both quota and non-quota countries. For the first six years after the 1924 Act went into effect the excess of immigrants over emigrants averaged more over emigrants averaged more than 200,000 a year. In 1931 it fell to 35,257. In 1932 depart-ures exceeded arrivals by 67,719 and in 1933 by 57,013."

And the Committee, comment ing on these figures, adds:

"It is apparent that in one sense at least we have no 'immisense at least we have no 'immi-gration problem' today. While in the future immigration is likely again to exceed emigra-tion, restriction seems firmly esour American immigration pol-Thus the Committee, appoint-

by Secretary of Labor kins, practically approves of the so-called "Hoover Executive Order" with regard to immigration restriction during the period of depression But there is one constructive

recommendation which the Committee now makes concerning a problem that did not exist until Hitler came to power in Germany last year and instituted a ruthless policy of religious, pol-itical and racial discrimination and persecution.

The Committee, referring to he "group of aliens deserving pecial consideration at this time," says: "Asylum for those who flee

from religious, racial and polit-ical persecution, is one of the oldest and most valued of Amer-ican traditions. From the time of the Pilgrims, this country has been built up by immigrants who came here to escape oppression and to enjoy liberty. Our share of this unfortunate group can be of this unfortunate group can be taken care of within the present quotas and without amendment to the law. By doing so, we can meet their need, uphold our own traditions and fulfill the moral obligation that rests upon us." This recommendation is typical

of the finest spirit and tradi-tions of America, and should carry all the more weight beit is offered by a Committee of eminent Americans who believe that "restriction seems firmly established as the foundation of our American immigration policy."

The least that our Government can do is to liberalize the

interpretation of the immigralaws with regard to visa applicants who are seeking asylum from religious, racial and political persecution, without amending the immigration laws, for the unfortunate refugees can be taken care of within the present quotas.

The moral effect of such a return to one of America's noblest traditions would not only save some of the victims of religious and racial persecution. It would also strongthen America's moral leadership among the nations.
