1. Name the two biggest challenges facing Maryland, and briefly explain how you would work to solve them.

Increasing crime rates and declining educational standards are the biggest challenges. In 2007, Prince George's County had 140 murders and a 33% high school dropout rate. To reduce crime, I propose ending the prohibition on drugs. The prohibition on drugs is similar to prohibition on alcohol during the 1920s. Alcohol prohibition caused increased crime rates. The problem is that the war on drugs has created economic incentive for gangs to exist. I also propose creating a school voucher system to improve education. Under my plan, poor and middle-class students would be fully subsidized to attend private schools for free.

2. Name the two biggest challenges facing the United States, and briefly explain how you would work to solve them. (Maximum 100 words)

The economy and Iraq war are huge problems. Increasing oil prices and demand from the war are producing inflationary pressures. The U.S. dollar has also become dangerously devalued. Without major economic changes, a terrorist attack might cause foreign investors to flee U.S. assets and trigger America's economic collapse by causing further erosion of the dollar. I propose switching to alternative energy sources and withdrawing troops from Iraq to curtail inflation. I would also push legislation requiring China to float its currency on the open market. This would increase demand for U.S. goods, appreciate the dollar's value, and offset inflationary pressures.

1. Name the two biggest challenges facing Maryland, and briefly explain how you would work to solve them. (Maximum 100 words)

The local economy and educational outcomes are the biggest challenges facing Maryland. For the local economy, I would work to reverse the outsourcing of government jobs to private entities, expand workforce training opportunities to replace the retiring baby boomers, and fix the alternative minimum tax.

Maryland's long-term economic prospects are threatened by the increasing number of undereducated students. For low performing districts and neighborhoods, this complex problem would require at least 10 years of concerted federal, state, local and community efforts for tutoring, mentoring, social services, financial aid, vocational training, as well as remedial education for adults and the incarcerated.

2. Name the two biggest challenges facing the United States, and briefly explain how you would work to solve them. (Maximum 100 words)

Our **national debt** affects our ability to address other problems. I would work to balance the federal budget by reducing spending; eliminating most corporate subsidies, tax breaks, credits, including the farm bill; banning earmarks if the budget is not balanced; eliminating wasteful social and weapons programs, and fighting lopsided trade agreements.

For **congressional ethics**, I would work increase the time to lobby for ex-members of congress from 2 years to 5 years, ban family members from lobbying their relatives, ban the naming of federally funded projects after sitting members, and create an independent ethics committee with subpoena powers.
