\$1.5 million/year will fund a 10-person statewide unit focused on organized retail crime, including:

- 2 prosecutors
- 4 criminal investigators
- Data analyst
- Professional support staff

The Organized Retail Crimes Unit will be able to assist local, state, and federal law enforcement investigations, including coordinating them across multiple jurisdictions. The unit will also be able to

prosecute cases referred the office by county prosecutors. Without such a referral, the Attorney General's Office has no jurisdiction over criminal matters.

This Unit will focus exclusively on organized crimes involving a group of individuals that steal products not for their own personal use, but to resell them for a profit. This does not include general retail crimes like petty theft, shoplifting or poverty-driven crimes.

Organized Retail Crime is a statewide, cross-jurisdictional problem that demands a statewide unit. Arizona, Illinois, and Michigan recently created similar units in the Attorney General's Office.
