OUR MISSION

The Wheeler Centre exists to drive the development and celebration of literature in Melbourne and beyond and to foster broad public engagement in books, writing and ideas. We aspire to be nationally and internationally renowned as a leading institution for the art of conversation, and champions of the transformative power of informed public discussion and debate.

OUR HISTORY

In its four years of existence, the Wheeler Centre has established a reputation for ambition, variety, and quality.

We never stop: Since our first public programme in February 2010, we've curated three seasonal programmes – with over 200 events – each year.

There's nothing we're not

interested in: Our events have fostered conversations on a broad range of topics, including literature, art, social responsibility, politics, ethics, copyright, urban planning, sports, Indigenous storytelling and public affairs.

Our audiences are voracious:

over 40,000 audience members attend our annual events, 33,000+ readers subscribe to our electronic newsletter, and 18,000 people connect with us on social media.

We attract leading writers and

thinkers: over 1300 speakers have participated in 900 public conversations since 2010. Our guests have included Tim Winton, Germaine Greer, Richard Flanagan, Tara Moss, George Megalogenis, Anita Desai, Malcolm Fraser, Hannah Kent, Michael Pollan, Sally Warhaft, Peter Goldsworthy, Anna Krien, Alain de Botton, and Peter Singer.

We want everyone to participate, in whichever way suits them: over

80% of our events are free and 70% are made available online, after the live event.

PUBLIC PROGRAMME

Our annual programme of events aims to be stimulating, challenging, inspiring and entertaining in equal measure.

In 2013, the Wheeler Centre presented a range of significant writers and thinkers as standalone speakers, in conversation or interviews, and as participants in panel discussions or debates.

Our guests included: iconic New York cartoonist Art Spiegelman; major Australian writers Christos Tsiolkas, Tim Winton, Helen Garner, John Safran, Richard Flanagan and Alexis Wright; international writers Edward St Aubyn, Chika Unigwe, J.M. Coetzee, Patrick Ness, George R.R. Martin, William Dalrymple, Carlos Ruiz Zafón, Sylvia Nasar, and Kate Atkinson; and many, many (many) more.

The Wheeler Centre couldn't be more proud of its ability to namedrop the list of extraordinary guests featured in the 2013 programme; it speaks of our audience's – and the city's – appetite for the world of books, writing, and ideas. FIFTH ESTATE

The Fifth Estate is the Wheeler Centre's fortnightly political interview series, hosted by the inestimable Sally Warhaft, Melbourne broadcaster, anthropologist and writer. Given that 2013 was a highly eventful year in Australian politics, there was a wealth of material and viewpoints to cover.

Guests in what was the second year of this series included sitting and former politicians: the Hon. Alison Anderson, Amanda Vanstone, Kristina Keneally, John Hewson, Peter Reith, Tim Fischer and Senator Kim Carr. Political analysts Michelle Grattan and Kerry O'Brien each appeared in spotlight sessions on the federal election among a range of other speakers, from Nobel Laureate Peter Doherty to Tim Lane and Deborra-lee Furness. Topics ranged from foreign policy, climate policy and international adoption to asylum seekers and Christianity in Australia today.

The Fifth Estate was by far the Wheeler Centre's most downloaded podcast and a regularly booked-out event throughout the year. "The event last night was excellent. INTELLIGENCE SQUARED DEBATES

Across 2013, we presented five IQ2 debates, in partnership with Sydney's St James Ethics Centre. These events take the form of traditional Cambridge and Oxford Unions-style debates – with two sides proposing and opposing a sharply formed motion – followed by comments and questions for the audience. The year's range of motions were that:

- Our Food Obsession Has Gone Too Far
- Anzac Day is More Puff Than Substance
- Our Children are Over Diagnosed
- Copyright is Dead, Long Live the Pirates
- True Reconciliation Requires a Treaty

With the ABC's ongoing commitment to filming and broadcasting many of these debates, the IQ2 series reaches a significant broadcast audience, as well as those present at the live events.

NEW INITIATIVES

The Wheeler Centre is an ambitious organisation and our audience's appetite spans a diverse range of formats and topics. In 2013, we undertook a range of new initiatives aimed at remaining fresh and vibrant, while connecting to new audiences through new event types.

Our season-launching **Gala Night** of Storytelling was dedicated to the fiftieth anniversary of Maurice Sendak's Where the Wild Things Are. Eleven Australian poets, dramatists, essayists, fiction writers, lyricists, and journalists took inspiration from this much-loved classic in developing and performing new pieces for an audience of 1330 at Melbourne's Town Hall. The Centre presented a dedicated Indigenous oral storytelling programme: **Country Sky Water Fire**. These events were curated and hosted by Tony Birch and Genevieve Grieves, with each night focused on one of the four elements. Guests included Alexis Wright, Bruce Pascoe, Ellen van Neerven, Vicki Couzens, Daniel Browning, Dylan Coleman, Lionel Fogarty, and many others. To farewell 2013, the Centre presented The Show of the Year, a cabaret variety show, celebrating and critiquing key moments of the year. Featuring a range of writers, comedians, and musicians (including George Megalogenis, Tony Birch, Alan Brough, Maude Davey, Catherine Deveny, Lally Katz, Maxine Beneba Clarke, Henry Wagons, Sammy J, Hannah Gadsby, Chloe Hooper and Tripod), the night was hosted by inimitable Wheeler Centre regular Casey Bennetto.

INCLUSIVE & ACCESSIBLE

ON THE ROAD

In 2013, the Wheeler Centre visited nine regional locations with our **On the Road** series supported by the Sidney Myer Fund.

Events in this series included Anne Summers on equality for women (at the Clunes Booktown Festival) and Elliot Perlman interviewed by Toni Jordan in a packed-out Aireys Pub, as part of the Words in Winter series.

Wherever possible, these events are presented free to the public, and take place as part of local festivals, and in partnership with community venues and local government agencies. "I went to the Aireys Inlet pub to hear Elliot Perlman in conversation. I was so pleased to learn that the Wheeler Centre is holding sessions in regional areas, and found it to be a fascinating hour. He is a great communicator, and very interesting to listen to." – Audience member





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DIGITAL ACTIVITIES

The Wheeler Centre expanded the depth and reach of its digital activities in 2013 part of a key strategic interest in engaging online audiences.

High-profile events and speakers – including **Game of Thrones** with author George R.R. Martin and actor Michelle Fairley, and the **Pop Up Festival of Dangerous Ideas** – saw our website receive literally twice as many page-views on the day of the programme's launch than it did the previous year.

Beyond the simple growth in traffic, our digital activities have begun a trend that's so far continued unabated: as awareness of the Wheeler Centre expands, the positive sentiment and regard from our audience has remained strong (and vocal). Our online publishing activities include video, audio, and written works. We commissioned a diverse range of established and emerging writers for our Dailies series. with articles on: the business and practice of publishing, writing and editing; investigative reports on sustainability and racism in the police force; and opinion pieces on feminism, disability rights and education. The Centre also produced and published its first

work in Auslan, and filmed several international authors appearing at the Melbourne Writers Festival in exclusive 'green room' interviews and readings.

Digital activities expanded in tandem with events programming, to deepen and broaden the opportunities for audiences to experience the Wheeler Centre. Alongside the **Criticism Now** events, we produced a solid suite of digital-first content that will serve as a valuable resource – including an aggregation of quotes about criticism's value, five highquality podcasts, and an extended panel discussion video.

FREE EVENTS

Our commitment to accessibility means the Wheeler Centre presents 80% of its public programme for free. Just some of the writers and thinkers who appeared at our free events in 2013 include:

SUPPORTING ARTISTS & THE LITERARY SECTOR

VICTORIAN PREMIER'S LITERARY AWARDS

Awards play an important part in profiling and supporting Australian writers. On behalf of Arts Victoria, the Wheeler Centre administers the annual Victorian Premier's Literary Awards (VPLAs).

There are eight award categories: Fiction, Non Fiction, Writing for Young Adults, Drama, Poetry, Unpublished Manuscript, Indigenous Writing, and the overall Prize for Literature, which is the single richest prize for writing in Australia.

Following an extensive review of the VPLAs in 2013, the timing of the awards was adjusted, making the VPLAs now the first major prize to be awarded in the annual cycle, rather than the last.

Before this adjustment, the Unpublished Manuscript prize was awarded to Maxine Beneba Clarke for her first collection of short fiction, *Foreign Soil*, in May. Clarke has since gone on to sign with Hachette for a three-book deal.

HOT DESK FELLOWS

The Wheeler Centre continued our support for local writers through the increasingly popular Wheeler Centre Hot Desk Fellowships, supported by the Readings Foundation.

These residencies offer time, space, a stipend, and unparalleled opportunity to the fellows to dedicate themselves to their creative practice. Alongside this, the Centre connects fellows with the hub of sector organisations in the building, and the writing and publishing community more broadly, through formal and informal meetings, and events.

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DEBUT MONDAYS

The **Debut Mondays** series showcases the work of emerging writers in an intimate cafe environment. In 2013, 36 writers presented their work for an appreciative public audience (for many of them, for the first time). Speakers included:

- Kate Belle, an erotic fiction writer whose book *Being Jade* has been critically acclaimed

- Laura Jean McKay, whose new work *Holiday in Cambodia* has been shortlisted for the New South Wales Premier's Literary Awards 2014
- Mel Campbell, a noted cultural critic whose book *Out of Shape* was published in 2013 and received broad national coverage
- Graeme Simsion, whose international bestseller The Rosie Project has gone on to be one of the biggest sellers of 2013
- Johannes Jakob, a former editor of Voiceworks magazine and current fiction editor of *The Lifted Brow*.

YOUNG PEOPLE

CHILDREN'S BOOK FESTIVAL

A major moment on the Melbourne family calendar, the Children's Book Festival is a day-long programme of books, writing and ideas events for young audiences aged 5 – 12 years. On the last Sunday in March, the Children's Book Festival took over the entire city block of the State Library of Victoria and the Wheeler Centre combined. Extensive outdoor activities occurred on the front lawns of the Library and along Little Lonsdale Street, with additional events inside the Wheeler Centre and State Library public spaces.

The **Children's Book Festival** is a co-presentation of the State Library of Victoria and the Wheeler Centre. The Festival reached new heights in 2013, with an at-capacity audience of 15,000 children and families.

Authors included: Jackie French, Lynley Dodd, Justine Clarke, Rhys Muldoon and Asphyxia.

Other artists and activities included: 100 Story Building, Kids Own Publishing, Tracey and Steve's Mobile Farm, Let's Read, Two Friends Productions, Tony Bones, The List Operators, Nikki Ashby, Ron Murray, The Mudcakes, and Story Thieves (roving performers).

The Children's Book Festival

is a key element of the Wheeler Centre's vision for the young citizens of our City of Literature. 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TEXTS IN THE CITY

Our series of afternoon events exploring texts from the VCE English and Literature lists brought 1435 students to the Wheeler Centre.

Texts in the City delivered 18 author interviews and panel conversations, with regular hosts including Tony Birch and Lili Wilkinson. The series included:

Laura Carroll on Jane Austen's Persuasion


Phil Zachariah on Charles Dickens' A Christmas Carol

Kevin Brophy on Gwen Harwood's Selected Poems


Ailsa Piper on Ray Lawler's Summer of the Seventeenth Doll

Chris Mead on Reginald Rose's Twelve Angry Men All talks had an extensive period for Q&A, giving students the opportunity to examine key issues within the texts in detail. The events were filmed, with video available online for subsequent viewing (i.e. at exam preparation time). Such videos ensure that the ephemeral **Texts in the City** events continue to be available to. and an effective resource for, an ongoing audience of young people and their educators into the future. 

FESTIVAL OF DANGEROUS IDEAS

In a major partnership with key interstate partners – the Sydney Opera House and St James Ethics Centre – the Wheeler Centre brought the Festival of Dangerous Ideas to Melbourne for the first time.

In a Wheeler Centre first, we presented the **Pop-Up Festival of Dangerous Ideas** as a back-toback day of sessions MCed by our Director, Michael Williams. For our five international speakers, this was their only Melbourne appearance.

SCHOOL OF LIFE SECULAR SERMON SERIES

The **Secular Sermon** series – a School of Life initiative co-presented with the City of Melbourne's *Melbourne Conversations* programme – saw maverick cultural figures deliver passionate polemics on cultural values ranging from vengeance, to lying, humour to unrest.

Whimsically pitched, but with a serious purpose, the Secular Sermons were expertly curated by Stephen Armstrong.

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE


OVERVIEW

The Wheeler Centre has an annual turnover of \$2.5 – 3.9M. The endof-year result was a better-thanbudget surplus, representing 5% of turnover.


FINANCIAL BREAKDOWN
