Dear DC-G Family,

As we begin 2018, I am excited to see all that it has in store for DC-G. Many great things happened at DC-G throughout 2017, and I would like to provide you with some highlights.

This year, we opened our fourth elementary school, Heritage Elementary. This allowed us to comfortably serve our students in the midst of our rapid growth. Furthermore, it created the opportunity to move to neighborhood elementaries that serve students kindergarten through fifth grade.

Our graduation rate this past year was ninety seven percent, which is higher than the Iowa graduation rate of ninety one percent in 2016. Seventy seven percent of that graduating class is college bound, attending a four year public or private school or a community college. Our students are Eagle Scouts, National Merit scholars, state champion athletes, and Character Counts award winners.

This has been a school year filled with teachers providing students with a variety of engaging learning opportunities that push our learners toward higher levels of thinking. As we look to the future, we will continue to strive toward maintaining a strong K-12 system that produces high quality graduates who are college and career ready.

Looking at Writing in a New Way

Maus, A Survivor's Tale: My Father Bleeds History (1991) by Art Spiegelman

Seniors in AP Composition I classes will experience reading and studying Art Spiegelman's Pulitzer Prize (1992) winning graphic novel *Maus*. Instructor Mrs. Berkley attended a class this summer, Teaching the Graphic Novel, which was based on current best practice and research on integrating graphic novels into the secondary curriculum. Research shows that graphic novels may be used to teach complex concepts, visual rhetoric, literary analysis, and critical approaches to literature. The novel is integrated into a pop culture unit that examines the challenge of defining literacy in a 21st century way, including the learning opportunities that multimodal texts provide. Students are excited to explore the graphic novel as a genre and to work toward a discourse on the subject of why certain works enter into the canon.

Literature Circles in English 2

Literature circles engage students in rich conversations about shared readings. Students can express their opinions, predictions, and questions about a text in a productive, structured way. The teacher may ask students to take on specific group roles, which are designed to develop reading, speaking, and thinking abilities. As the students become more skilled in literature circle conversations, they can move beyond specific role assignments. Second semester, sophomores will be implementing a Non-Fiction Literature Circle Strategy encompassing the following texts:

- -The Glass Castle by Jeannette Walls
- -Hidden Figures by Margot Lee Shetterly
- -Tuesdays with Morrie by Mitch Albom
- -The Red Bandana by Tom Rinaldi

Working on Literacy Skills Together

Students in Mrs. Rosenbury's third period English 1 class have been working collaboratively with Mrs. Peters's fourth grade class on literacy skills this semester. This November, the fourth graders visited Meadows to review the elements of literature. The ninth grade students shared a favorite children's book and then worked on completing a story map. After reading their stories, the students tried writing their own creative piece with the roll-a-story activity. Both classes look forward to future meetings with engaging conversations and learning!





Romeo and Juliet

Students in ninth grade English 1 class have been working on a Musical Interlude project for the Romeo and Juliet unit. In this project, the students use contextual clues to relate the Shakespeare text with current songs. The students have a choice to either create a playlist of song titles and artists for each scene in the play or to create an IMovie, which includes song choice and artist, copyright free pictures and an audio clip for ten scenes in the play. No matter which option is chosen, all students will write explanations that draw evidence from the literary text to support analysis and reflection.

Course Registration

Meadows students will begin the process of next year's course registration immediately following winter break. Students will be meeting during advisory to gain an overview of the registration process. We will be holding a ninth grade course information meeting on January 9, 2018 at 5:30 p.m. for parents of students currently in eighth grade. More information on the registration process will be available as the date gets closer. The Course Description Book for ninth grade will be available on the Meadows website after winter break. Students will begin selecting courses following the parent meeting. Please make time to discuss, review, and sign off on your child's course planning by January 19, 2018.

Extended Learning Program (ELP)

As part of her internship for her ELP endorsement, Mrs. Rosenbury, ELP teacher at Meadows, has been working with Mrs. Degnan, ELP teacher for North Ridge, South Prairie, and Heritage, to discuss gifted programming at the elementary level. Mrs. Rosenbury planned an independent study for a student gifted in both reading and writing. This project included an extension menu of literacy learning activities for Marley E., fifth grader at North Ridge. The extensions menu gives Marley many challenging choices to enhance her learning. At least once a month, Mrs. Rosenbury has visited Marley to discuss ideas, share resources, guide her planning, and celebrate her success. Although the requirements for the internship are complete, both Mrs. Rosenbury and Marley plan to continue their mentorship and meet throughout the rest of the school year.

MIDDLE SCHOOL NEWS

The Secret of Writing

We are dedicated to helping students continue to grow as writers at the middle school. Increasing student engagement in authentic literacy and intensive writing is a primary focus across disciplines. In English classes, students have a continual focus on the Six Traits of Writing. Students focus on improving their writing in the following six areas: ideas, word choice, voice, organization, sentence fluency, and conventions.

In sixth grade English and reading, the students will focus on how the use of figurative language enhances the writing in the classic novel, Tuck Everlasting. Students will also explore the theme of mortality verses immortality. As modern medicine and living standards improve, so does our life expectancy, but will the day soon come when life has no cap? This dilemma will be explored as the students respond through writing. The students at the middle school continue to write for a variety of purposes. As Ken MacLeod wrote, "The secret of becoming a writer is to write, write, and keep on writing."

National History Day

National History Day (NHD) is an annual competition that has students conduct original research on historical topics of interest. Students present projects at the local and affiliate levels. Each year has a different theme. This year's theme is Conflict and Compromise.

The sixth grade social studies students are working on projects in class for the National History Day competition. Although the students are not required to go to competition for their grade, it is recommended. The competition will allow students to grow individually and get additional exposure to the importance of history. The Regional Competition will be on March 31, 2018 at Grandview University. Breaking Ranks in the Middle

According to Breaking Ranks in the Middle, there are five dimensions of advisory at the middle school: purpose, organization, content, assessment and leadership.

At the middle school, advisory is used to monitor academic achievement, foster communication between home and school, promote relationships, teambuilding and employability skills, prepare students for life transitions, promote character development and have fun.

Advisory is organized into small communities of approximately 14 students. Each group meets daily for 25 minutes with their grade-level advisor. Advisors are the advocates for their students throughout the year and meet with families at conference time twice each year.

Activities during advisory are designed by the building, grade-level teams and by the individual advisors, while giving students in the group ownership of this team. Each week the advisories at the middle school visit goal setting, teambuilding, new learning or mini-courses, CHARACTER COUNTS! and team challenges.

Goal setting involves planning the week. This will include writing down assignments for the week, checking missing assignments, checking grades on Infinite Campus, cleaning lockers and determining weekly and quarterly goals.

Teambuilding bonds the advisory around an issue. The group builds relationships as they work together on employability skills stressing group dynamics and problem solving.

New learning and mini courses involved the advisories in new exploration of a topic or task. Groups may learn more about line dancing, songwriting, graphic design, calligraphy, chess, fitness or service learning.

CHARACTER COUNTS! is a constant presence in the building that includes pillar activities, ethical decision-making, bullying and harassment and behavior expectations.

Team Challenge allows advisory groups to work together for a common goal. These activities may be physical, academic or just plain fun.

The advisees, advisors, grade-level PLC's and the building as a whole assess the advisory on a weekly, quarterly and yearly basis.

Middle school advisory has many facets. Although the main focus is relationship building, groups strive to assist students in growth in academics, social/emotional and employability skills.

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ELEMENTARY NEWS

Jump Rope for Heart

We are excited to announce that all Dallas Center-Grimes first through fifth grade students will be participating in Jump Rope for Heart during their physical education classes this winter. Jump Rope for Heart is a nationwide event in which students learn about the benefits of regular physical activity and heart health while they raise funds to support vital research and educational programs. The money we raise will help people in our community learn how to avoid heart disease and stroke and live longer, healthier lives. Students will receive thank-you gifts based on the amount of money they collect. The school will also receive a gift certificate to purchase physical education equipment for each elementary building. More information and details will be sent home with your child. If you have any questions, please contact your child's Physical Education teacher.

Second Grade Writing

During second quarter, South Prairie second graders worked on writing narratives. They used a graphic organizer to put their thoughts down on paper using BME-B stands for the beginning, M stands for the middle, and E stands for the end of the story. They used this format to get their ideas down on paper. From there, they could create their story. Second graders then used blue pens to revise their narrative story. We are now working on writing two paragraphs about a topic we know a lot about!

Fourth Grade Writing

The writing program in fourth grade is based on the belief that students become better writers through practice. The Write Steps program, which we adopted last year, is a K-5 program that focuses on Common Core Standards. Write Steps uses the educational practices of Writer's Workshop and 6 Traits of Quality Writing as a framework for instruction. Lessons are scaffolded and provide a gradual release of responsibility through instruction, modeling, guided practice and independent practice. Fourth graders will write a real-life narrative, an informational piece about their school, a persuasive essay, and will complete a research project. They will also practice learning how to respond to reading. Technology will be infused into writing when producing and researching our projects. Student are practicing keyboarding skills using Typing Club, which was first taught in third grade. Students in fourth grade are being taught cursive handwriting.



Fifth Grade WOW- Work on Writing

Fifth grade authors have learned from mentor text examples that author's write for a variety of reasons. This is called having an author's purpose. Students have completed their own PIE writings over a topic of choice to work on writing with the purpose to P-Persuade, I-Inform, and E-Entertain. Students presented these to their class to work on their speaking and listening skills.

After reviewing the six traits of writing, students have been hard at work completing a personal narrative that describes a disappointing experience. This writing piece emphasized several important writing skills: dialogue, interjections, conjunctions, prepositions, figurative language, and the use of commas.

Our new writing series, Write Steps, introduces students to the craft of responding to text. Students will read various articles as they learn how to use text to support their thinking when responding to a prompt. The Common Core places an emphasis on students learning to write successfully about their reading. In order to do that, students need to be able to write well-defined pieces in which they make and support claims, analyze text, and incorporate evidence. This work, which is central to the Common Core in fifth grade, integrates reading

Writing in Kindergarten

As we transition into the new year, kindergartners will move into learning about informative writing. This is a fun time of year because students spend a lot of time learning about the Polar regions. Students read non-fiction stories about the Polar regions and discuss facts that were in the books. They are able to use IPads and PebbleGo to learn about the animals that live in each region. The students enjoy writing facts about these regions and "teaching" the teacher about what they are learning. They share their writing on the elmo so other students can give "glows" (something positive about their writing) and "grows" (a convention the child could include in their next piece) about the writing.

First Grade Writing

First graders are working hard on authentic writing this year! We have spent the first quarter focusing on what good writers do. Some of those good writing traits include: re-reading writing, using capitalization, punctuation, spacing, and phonetic spelling.

Through Common Core Writing Standards, students and teachers focus on several types of writing throughout the year. So far, they have focused on narrative writing. They are working on sequencing their writing with a beginning, middle, and end.

First graders will continue to work on different types of writing thoughout the year as well as organization of their writing. First graders are working on becoming better writers!

Driver's Education

We will continue to offer four sessions of driver's education each year, if we have enough interest. The cost at present time is \$325 for each session. Students must be at least 14 years old



and have a permit to sign up, as well as a signed parent permission slip. Eighth through twelfth graders may sign up for each session. Usually the fall and spring session are the busiest. Below you will find information regarding the fall and winter sessions. Fee's for out-of-district students are \$375.

Winter Session 2018: The winter program will begin in early January and end before spring break in March. There will be a meeting in December to hand out information and collect payment. Classroom days are Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday from 6:45 a.m. to 8:00 a.m. Most students will drive during their study hall times. If this can't be worked out, before or after school times may be arranged. All students who drive during study halls will drive at least once on Saturday for two hours downtown Des Moines. A shuttle bus service from Dallas Center will also be available in the morning to bring students to classroom. Class size is limited to 40 students. Home school students are welcome. Classrooms held in the Meadows media center. If we don't have at least 12 students sign up the session will be cancelled until spring session.

Spring Session 2018- The spring session will begin after spring break and end in May. There will be a meeting before spring break to hand out information and collect payment. Classroom days are Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday from 6:45 a.m. to 8:00 a.m. Most students will drive during their study hall times. If this can't be worked out, before or after school driving may be arranged. All students who drive during study halls will drive at least once on Saturday for 2 hours in downtown Des Moines. Shuttle bus service from Dallas Center will also be available in the morning to bring students in early for classroom work. Class size is limited to 40 students. Home school students are welcome. Classrooms will be held in the Meadows Media Center.
