

Drivers Education for Dallas-Center Grimes High School and Middle School for 2016-2017

We will continue to offer four sessions of driver's education each year, if we have enough interest. The cost at the present time is \$320 for each session. Fees for out of district students are \$375. Students must be at least 14 years old and have a permit to sign up, as well as a signed parent permission slip. Students in grades 8-12 may sign up for each session. Usually the fall and spring session are the busiest. Please call the Meadows school office at 986-0105 to sign up your child for any of these programs. All payments and permission slips should be made or turned in before the first classroom. Payment plans may be arranged with the office. The Fall session is already underway. Below you will find information about the Winter, Spring, and Summer sessions.

Winter Session 2017- The winter program will begin in early January and end before spring break in March. There will be a meeting in December to hand out information and collect payment. Classroom days are Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday from 6:45 to 8:00 a.m. Most students will drive during their study hall times. If this can't be worked out, before or after school times may be arranged. All students who drive during study halls will drive at least once on Saturday for 2 hours in downtown Des Moines. Shuttle bus service from Dallas Center will also be available in the morning to bring students to classroom. Class size is limited to 40 students. Home school students are welcome. Classrooms are held in the Meadows media center. If we don't have at least 12 students sign up the session will be cancelled and the next session will be the spring session.

Spring Session 2017- The spring session will begin after spring break and end in May. There will be a meeting before spring break to hand out information and collect payment. Classroom days are Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday from 6:45 to 8:00 a.m. Most students will drive during their study hall times. If this can't be worked out, before or after school driving may be arranged. All students who drive during study halls will drive at least once on Saturday for 2 hours in downtown Des Moines. Shuttle bus service from Dallas Center will also be available in the morning to bring students in early for classroom work. Class size is limited to 40 students. Home school students are welcome. Classrooms will be held in the Meadows Media Center.

Summer Session 2017- Our summer program is held during the months of June and July. Class time will begin Monday, June 5 and end on Friday, June 23. Classes will be every day for the first three weeks from 7:00-9:00 a.m. Driving times will be (6) two-hour periods with a driving partner (example: a student might drive from 9:00-11:00 a.m. on a Monday). Driving times will be scheduled until 3:30p.m. and may also be on a Saturday. If you live in Grimes, your child may be picked up at a central location such as Casey's, True Value, or Kum and Go, and then be dropped off there when the driving lesson is over. This needs to be prearranged with the instructor. Driving groups will be able to change times with other groups if necessary. Students will draw numbers for driving times the first day of class. They will choose their own driving partner and driving times. Class size is limited to 48 students. Home school students are welcome.

High School Drama Department Presents Bye Bye Birdie

The high school drama department will present the hit musical <u>Bye Bye Birdie</u> on Thursday, November 10, Friday, November 11, and Saturday, November 12 in the DCG high school auditorium at 7:00 p.m. each evening.

Tickets for the musical went on sale on Monday, October 31 in the high school office. Tickets are also available during Parent/Teacher Conferences on Tuesday, November 1 and Thursday, November 3.

There will be 300 reserved seats and 300 general admission seats available each night. Cost for reserved seats is \$7.00 for adults and \$5.00 for students (grades 1-12). General admission seats are \$5.00 for adults and \$3.00 for students. DCG activity passes are accepted. If you buy reserved tickets and have an activity pass you will have to pay the \$2.00 upcharge per ticket.

This popular show is based on the book by Michael Stewart with lyrics by Lee Adams and music by Charles Strouse. The story was inspired by the media circus that ensued when rock and roll legend Elvis Presley was drafted into the Army in 1957. The entire world was swept into the media blitz that included Elvis giving "one last kiss" to a selected member of the Women's Army Corp.

A satire on American teen culture, Bye Bye Birdie has been entertaining audiences for decades on Broadway, in movie theaters and has even been a television production.

Over 50 students will work together to bring this show to the DCG Stage and hopefully to a spot in the Iowa High School Musical Theater's annual awards program in June.

Professional Development In The DCG District!

As I write this article, it is approaching the middle of October and our change to fall weather is in the air. Fall can only mean one thing...that the school year is well under way, the end of the first quarter is near, and soon it will be time for Parent-Teacher Conferences. With all of these changes that fall brings, one thing is consistent: For teachers in the Dallas Center-Grimes CSD, we are constantly involved in professional learning opportunities all at levels in our district. Read to find out about our district professional development opportunities this past month.

Wednesday, September 28, 2016

Teachers in the elementary grades received a refresher training around Running Records in Reading and how to score and analyze the record to inform teacher instruction in reading. Our K-2 teachers met at South Prairie and were led by Rebecca Vaske and Kellee Andrews, while our 3-5 teachers met at North Ridge and were led by Dr. Greg Carenza and Lynne Rinehart. Staff will receive additional professional development time in the coming weeks to analyze their students' running records.

Secondary staff have been working to learn more about the use of essential learnings to guide instruction, digital citizenship, and working collaboratively in their PLC teams to ensure high levels of learning for our students. Much of our focus has been on providing differentiated professional development by building and our secondary buildings staff development have been led by our Instructional Coaches and building principals.

Monday, October 3, 2016

At our in-service day on October 3rd, all district teaching staff and building administrators viewed the movie "Most Likely To Succeed", a film by Greg Whiteley and Ted Dintersmith, which discusses the history of education and the world of the future. The film provides a thoughtful and artful approach to thinking about the best way to support our students in their learning and in preparing them for the future. After viewing the film, staff worked in their building teams to reflect upon both current successes we see in our district related to best practice and to identify small steps that could be taken to continue our focus on excellence in teaching and learning.

In the afternoon, staff at the elementary level participated in grade level technology training that demonstrated how to successfully integrate technology into our new writing program, Write Steps, in order to deepen and enhance student learning. I want to thank both our elementary writing curriculum and technology integration teams for their leadership in this training. As this is the first year of implementation of our new writing program, we continue to seek new learning opportunities wherever possible.

Our secondary staff, in the afternoon, received training in the area of technology, digital citizenship, and the use of the Professional Learning Community framework. Instructional Coaches and teachers from each building led the professional development and engaged staff collaborative work around technology and assessment.

Wednesday, October 12, 2016

Our last professional development training for Strand 1 took place on October 12th. At the elementary level, staff were provided additional training and work time related to the use of Running Records in reading. Teachers worked in the buildings to finish analyzing and review completed running records for their students and to identify the next instructional steps to take in class. Teachers were able to work in their PLC teams to determine how best to support students in their classrooms.

At the secondary level, teachers continued their building level work with essential learnings, technology integration, and assessment. Teachers worked in their PLC teams to address this work and tailor their learning to their content areas.

In closing, I would like to thank our building principals, Instructional Coaches, and Curriculum Facilitators for their assistance in planning and preparing for our professional development. Because of the efforts of these individuals, we are able to provide high quality and differentiated professional development in our district. And, as always, thank you for your support as a community!



It is a goal district-wide that students learn higher order thinking skills. This means that students are challenged to explore, research, and infer in order to come to conclusions. The social studies teachers at Meadows have been working hard to create opportunities for students to improve higher order thinking skills. One way this is being done is through the use of document-based learning in which students are asked to develop an answer to a "big idea" question by using a series of sources. Students work in groups to find text-based evidence to support their final answer. These responses are presented through discussion, debate, or in a written format. Incorporating reading, writing, and speaking in order to answer a "big idea" question is an example of authentic literacy, the topic of Mrs. Hutt's presentation at this year's Iowa Council for the Social Studies conference. By practicing authentic literacy, students have the opportunity to develop skills that will benefit them as they continue through school and into their future careers.

- Network Technology / Telecommunications
- ITNA (Information Technology Network Administration)
- Health Information Technology

In each session, students learned what that career area involves including jobs, starting salaries, some examples of the work involved, and a few hands-on activities. It was surprising to hear that many of these jobs had a \$30-40,000 starting salary with a two-year degree. Some even went as high as \$80-100,000!

In the afternoon, the students visited Zirous, a company that provides IT solutions such as identity management, integration, infrastructure, big data, and cloud services to other businesses. Four employees described their jobs including what they entailed, and the employees shared their passion for their careers.




Sixth and seventh grade students are doing amazing things in the Art room at DCG Middle School! Sixth grade





Kindergarten Social Studies: Community Helpers






First grade has been learning about primary colors and the artist Piet Mondrian. They used red, yellow, blue, black
