### Joel Rankin Named Iowa Social Studies Teacher of the Year By: Lori Phillips

Congratulations to Joel Rankin who was recently recognized as the 2015 Iowa Social Studies Teacher of The Year! Below you will find a few excerpts from Joel's nomination:

"When one envisions a secondary social studies class, they typically think of names, dates, presidents and wars. Our eighth and ninth grade students at Dallas Center-Grimes, on the other hand, will tell you that social studies means suspense, intrigue, drama and discovery! They will share how they dress up with masks and wigs to role play significant historical events, how they visit far away people and places via Skype and YouTube videos, and how they are allowed to create their own alternative endings to consider how small factors such as friendships, the economy and even the weather have helped determine the results of significant historical events.

Joel is an exemplary educator, and even more importantly, a strong advocate for the young adolescent. He serves as a leader in planning advisory activities that meet the developmental needs of our students. He loves to act silly alongside the kids, willingly taking food in the face or participating in an ice bucket challenge. He plans every first day assembly, recruiting kids during the summer to help him create a rap that welcomes everyone back to school. Every single day thereafter, Joel consistently offers passion and enthusiasm for both his content and the students.



While Joel is highly creative and fun, he also understands the urgency to help our students reach the highest levels of learning. He collaborates with other social studies teachers to identify the essential learnings and to write common assessments. He holds our students to the highest expectations, while providing a variety of supports to help the kids reach them. He spends time before, after and even during breaks pulling students to reteach or retest. Joel maintains frequent parental communication, calling home when a student is lacking an understanding of the content. He also sends several positive notes to parents, encouraging their child's efforts and sharing fun things their child did in his classroom.

"It was not until I met Joel and observed his social studies classes that I saw the true value and purpose in learning about the past. Throughout my time working with him, I have come to understand that there are better ways to learn the stories of our ancestors other than pure drill and lecture."

Definition of Profession according to Merriam-Webster:

"a calling requiring specialized knowledge and often long and intensive academic preparation."

Teaching is a profession in every definition of the word. Teachers have intensive academic preparation and as important, ongoing learning. Many teachers pursue advanced degrees. 150/202 (74%) of our teachers have a degree over their Bachelor's degree.

Ongoing professional development to meet the needs of our students is of utmost importance. Staff members are given time to meet as Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) at least once a week for job embedded learning, data review, and planning. In addition, the early outs and full days provide time for staff to learn, collaborate and plan for the implementation of new research based strategies.

The elementary staff members are reflecting and thinking about how they can increase authentic reading, writing, and conversations across the school day. The focus of elementary professional development this school year is on effective whole group mini lessons and using data to form small group instruction.

The secondary staff members are learning how to align higher-level learning with higher-level assessments. The focus of secondary professional development this school year is on higher-level learning and assessment with increased rigorous reading and writing.

#### 2015-2016 Driver's Education for Dallas Center-Grimes High School and Meadows

We will continue to offer four sessions of driver's education each year, if we have enough interest. The cost at the present time is \$320 for each session. Fees for out of district students are \$375. Students must be at least 14 years old and have a permit to sign up, as well as a signed parent permission slip. Students in grades 8-12 may sign up for each session. Usually the fall and spring session are the busiest. Please call the Meadows school office at 986-0105 to sign up your child for any of these programs. All payments and permission slips should be made or turned in before the first classroom. Payment plans may be arranged with the office. Below you will find information about the next session.

Winter Session 2016---The winter program will begin in early January and end before spring break in March. There will be a meeting in December to hand out information and collect payment. Classroom days are Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday from 6:45 to 8:00 a.m. Most students will drive during their study hall times. If this can't be worked out, before or after school times may be arranged. All students who drive during study halls will drive at least once on Saturday for 2 hours downtown Des Moines. Shuttle bus service from Dallas Center will also be available in the morning to bring students to classroom. Class size is limited to 40 students. Home school students are welcome. Classrooms held in the Meadows media center. If we don't have at least 12 students sign up the session will be cancelled until spring session.

The Annual Progress Report is a report of our school district's achievement for the previous school year. These can be viewed on the Iowa DE website (educateiowa.gov). All reading programs and services will effectively and efficiently support and increase student learning, achievement, and performance.

#### 2014-2015 School Year Annual Goals: 281--IAC 12.8(3)(b)(4)

Trend data shows that the percentage of students that are proficient and above in 6th grade Reading is inconsistent and does not demonstrate continuous improvement In 2013-14 the data shows that the percent of students proficient and above in 6th grade in Reading comprehension is 82.1% or 121/172 as measured by the Iowa Assessments. For the 2014-15 school year, the total percentage of students who are proficient and above will increase.

#### Were the Annual Goals Met?

Yes

#### Supporting Data to demonstrate that the district has or has not met its goal:

In 2013-2014, 82.1% of our sixth grade students were proficient and above in reading comprehension according to the Iowa Assessments. In 2014 -2015, the percentage of sixth grade students proficient and above in reading comprehension on the Iowa Assessments increased to 85.9%.

#### 2015-2016 School Year Annual Goal: 281--IAC 12.8(3)(b)(4)

Trend data shows that the percentage of students that are proficient and above decrease as students move from 7th grade to 8th grade in reading comprehension. In 2014-15 the data shows that the percent of students proficient and above in 7th grade reading comprehension is 84.1% or 148/176 as measured by the Iowa Assessments. For the 2015-16 school year, the total percentage of students who are proficient and above in reading comprehension as measured by the Iowa Assessments for 8th grade will increase.

#### Reading 2nd Assessment: Elementary Level Reading Assessment

Reading comprehension is also measured in the elementary in grades K-5 by the Leveled Reading Assessments. The district determines an expected level of reading for each grade. During the 2011-12 school year the accuracy expectations for these assessments were raised for all students from 90% to 95%. For Kindergarten student the end of the year reading level was also raised to from Level B to C. Individualized reading assessments are given to each student. These assessments help teachers determine the level of text that a student should be using when working directly with the teacher, the instructional level. It also determines the independent reading level for each student. When a student reaches the grade level expectation, the student is considered to be proficient. In the 2014-2015 school year we gave the aReading portion of the Formative Assessment System for Teachers. This is a comprehension measure that we gave in grades 2-5. This is the data that is reported for 2014-2015.

The data provided help educators identify struggling readers, plan for instruction, gauge the effectiveness of the curriculum, and demonstrate accountability.


# **HIGH SCHOOL NEWS**

#### Mustangs and Fillies Cross Country Teams Finish Fourth at State

The DC-G Boys and Girls Cross Country teams finished their outstanding seasons with best ever fourth place finishes in the Class 3A State Cross Country Meet at Fort Dodge on Saturday October 31.

The Mustangs finished with 138 points, finishing behind first place Mount Vernon-Lisbon and conference rivals Grinnell and Pella. Sophomore Alex Thompson finished 14<sup>th</sup> overall and 11<sup>th</sup> in team qualifiers to earn a medal for DC-G. Tyler Borneman finished 26<sup>th</sup>, Ean Followill was 31<sup>st</sup>, Jacob Cline finished 33<sup>rd</sup> and Blake Schaben came in at 37<sup>th</sup>. Jackson Rude and Jared Bravard also ran for DC-G.

The Fillies finished with 158 points, with a fourth place medal winning performance from sophomore Lexi Smith. Also scoring for DC-G were Sami Sterbenz placing 16<sup>th</sup>, Kaitlyn Murano in 17<sup>th</sup>, Natalie Paulson finishing 58<sup>th</sup>, and Addie Dannewitz in 65<sup>th</sup>. Also running for the Fillies were Jessica Pugh and Grace Robbins. Davenport Assumption with 131 points was the team champ, followed by Pella with 145, Dubuque Wahlert with 146, and then DC-G.

of the Iowa Science Center while they met and talked to each other. The mentors also mingled with the girls. They were genuinely interested in what each girl wants to do with her life and what her interests are. The mentors also shared with the girls what they do in their careers in STEM.

After visiting, everyone was escorted to the dining area. At every table there were around six girls, one professional woman with a STEM career, and one woman in her senior year of college. Sitting with the mentors gave the girls the opportunity to talk to them and gain in depth knowledge of their jobs. The women who work so hard in STEM, told the girls about their own personal jobs as well as other related jobs, giving the girls a variety of careers to think about.

During dinner a guest speaker shared her story of how she got into a STEM career. This year's speaker was a gynecologist who works at the Methodist Hospital in Des Moines. She called her success story "The Road to Happiness." Her speech was very encouraging and informational.

After dinner, all the girls were put into new groups, allowing them the chance to meet and talk to more people, and were given a challenge. The group members were given a bucket of water and a shoebox full of random things. Sponges, pipe cleaners, paper clips and wood chips were just a few things in the box. Their challenge was to make something that was neutrally buoyant out of what they were given.

#### Meet our New Teacher







With the upcoming holidays, it is a great time to upgrade the mouthpiece or reed strength, allowing your student to create an even better sound on his/her instrument. Thanks to the folks at Rieman Music for supporting music throughout our state!



Please feel free to follow the DC-G middle school twitter account for information on what the kids are doing in the band classroom. Currently, the daily focus in band is tone quality and rhythm. Brass players are focused on spreading the teeth, dropping the jaw to get more air through their instrument. Notes should be started with a "tah" tongue/mindset to keep everything open. With woodwinds, playing with more mouthpiece in their mouth allowing a "thicker" sound is key. Getting the mouthpiece in the mouth more keeps more of the reed vibrating, thus creating that "warmer" more mellow sound. With our fine playing percussion students, the focus is being a "percussionist" not a drummer. Learning to play all their percussion equipment with correct hand position, correct striking point and hearing the correct sound is required for their success. Students are rotating on instruments in rehearsals, gaining knowledge of all things percussion everyday.

All students are challenged to focus on "toe-tapping" (softly) to keep steady rhythm. Playing his/her notes with the correct note length and at the correct time is key to all music. Lining up the musical parts in a rhythm spectrum make our songs come alive.

We have been busy in sixth grade choir! We have been focusing on practicing and reviewing our use of solfege, a musical language that assigns hand signs to notes on the staff. We use this musical language to aid us in our ability to sing music at sight, rather than wait to hear it first. This is a wonderful tool for our kinesthetic learners too as it allows them to move, as well as visually see the relationship of the pitch on the page and distance between hand signs.

In our lessons we are in the process of searching through songbooks for the perfect song to perform for our solo/small ensemble contest. Students choose a piece, analyze the song's form, learn, memorize and add dynamics and expression to create a finished product. The sixth grade students will be performing their contest on Thursday, January 21, 2016. The seventh grade students will be performing their contest on Tuesday, February 23, 2016. Both contests will take place at Dallas Center-Grimes Middle School in Dallas Center.

The seventh grade choir has been working hard on singing three-part music. They are working to sight-read and sing parts acapella. Singing without piano accompaniment is helping them boost confidence levels and really listen closely to each other, a skill necessary for building strong choirs. Reading music continues to be a focus in seventh grade choir. Students are becoming more independent; relying on the music to guide their singing rather than hearing it played or sung first.

During lessons, seventh grade students have been working through a systematic sight-singing method book. Currently, we are studying intervals and sight-singing spans of a second and thirds. We will quickly be moving to sight-singing spans of fourths, fifths, and octaves. Soon, we will be getting our music prepared for solo/small ensemble contest as well.



#### How is Our Reading Block Structured at DCG?

#### Readers' Workshop Model



The structure is as follows:

- Whole Group Mini-Lesson with explicit teaching by the teacher
- Students engaged in authentic reading and writing tasks (Daily 5 rounds).
  - Teacher confers 1-1 with students or meets with small groups while other students are engaged in authentic tasks.
- Teacher gathers students to reflect and share their learning.
- This process is then repeated.

#### DAILY 5

The **Daily 5** is the management structure used in your child's classroom to ensure students are engaged in meaningful, authentic literacy tasks. While the teacher is working with small groups or individual students to reinforce literacy skills and strategies taught in whole group lessons, students will be working on one of the **Daily 5** tasks—Read to Self, Read to Someone, Listen to Reading, Work on Writing, or Word Knowledge. These tasks are designed to help students practice their strategies.

#### How Can Families Help?

- Encourage your child to read at home.
- Ensure your child is reading good fit books.
   Good fit books are books in which your child can read all the words and are able to understand.
- Have your child read aloud to you or take turns reading to each other aloud.
- Have discussions with your child about their reading.

#### Whole Group Focus Lessons Are Focused On:

#### Comprehension

Elementary students study and read from the literature genres in fiction and nonfiction. During their reading, students learn and practice the comprehension strategies—monitor comprehension, activate and connect, ask questions, infer meaning, determine importance, and summarize and synthesize. The work we do with these strategies helps the students become more efficient readers and aides in the comprehension of information read in textbooks, newspapers, magazines, and Internet articles.

#### Phonics, Vocabulary & Spelling


Students in kindergarten through 5<sup>th</sup> grade are learning about letters, words and the way they work through a program called "Words Their Way." This program incorporates phonics, vocabulary, and spelling instruction. In this program students will explore word features that will get them thinking about patterns and connections of words. Words Their Way engages students in hands on, active learning that builds on what they know. This program utilizes words sorts and lessons that focus on the systematic progression of alphabet, pattern, and meaning.

Students in kindergarten through  $5^{\rm th}$  grade are area also expanding their vocabulary through rich literacy exposure. Teachers read aloud various picture and chapter books focusing in on key vocabulary.

#### Fluency

Students are working toward being able to read at a smooth pace and with appropriate expression. Fluency

work is focused on reading accurately, at an appropriate pace, with meaningful phrases, and with recognition of the different purposes for reading. Students work toward becoming fluent readers by listening to reading, choral reading, reading to someone, and reading to themselves in good fit books.

Please <u>read through the informational points below</u> to ensure that you understand the process and that your application is completed and returned by the indicated deadline.

- Applications will be available at all three elementary buildings in the district—North Ridge, South Prairie, and Dallas Center Elementary—as well as on the school website (<a href="www.dcgschools.com">www.dcgschools.com</a>)
- All applications must be <u>returned or postmarked by January 31, 2016</u>. No phone calls will be accepted in place of the application—no exceptions.
- When determining class rosters, resident special education and at-risk students are placed first. For the
  remaining applications, we will <u>randomly distribute students</u> in sections according to gender and the
  daycare center they attend (if applicable) using those applications that are returned or post marked by
  January 31, 2016.
- Resident students of the Dallas Center-Grimes School District and siblings of current open-enrolled students will be considered first for enrollment in the preschool program.
- Filling out this application does not guarantee you a spot in the preschool program.


