



She wrote to the television station to tell them about the variety of fun and motivating activities that occur in eighth grade science. Maddie mentioned that one of her favorite lessons

is when Mrs. Krueger climbs into a dunk-tank each period to show the students how density works. Maddie shared that she looked forward to going to science every day because Mrs. Krueger made science interesting and fun!

Besides teaching eighth grade science, Mrs.
Krueger coaches cross country, creates the 8/9 yearbook, runs a voluntary summer running club, leads the positive climate team, and is a PLC Leader. Mrs. Krueger has dedicated her life to educating young adolescents, and we are extremely fortunate to have her in our district!



Professional Development

Professional development for staff is very important to advance our learning and practices and therefore, increase student learning.

For the 2015-2016 school year, the elementary is refocusing on effective reading instruction. The secondary is continuing the focus of learning additional strategies to increase complex reading and writing for our students. Authentic Literacy is the backbone, or spine, to increase our students' engagement in higher order thinking, including critical thinking and problem solving.

The science curriculum committees and English Language Arts (ELA) will be meeting throughout the year to align content and skills to the lowa Core as well as look at vertical alignment.

The state of Iowa has recently adopted the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS). There will be many changes in our science curriculum K-12 over the next few years. The biggest change will be in the elementary and middle school. Previously, the Iowa Core had science content organized by grade bands, i.e. K-2 and 3-5. The NGSS has specific content identified for each grade level. At the middle school, it was also grade bands (6-8) with Earth Science at sixth, Life Science at seventh, and Physical Science at eighth. With the adoption of NGSS, each grade will teach all three strands of Science in an integrated approach.

Iowa Assessment Social Studies

Dallas Center-Grimes completed the Iowa Assessments for the 2014-15 School year. In the charts below, the percent of students that scored in the proficient range has been determined. The light gray cells are where 80% or more of the students scored in the proficient range. The dark gray cells are where 90% or more of the students were considered proficient. Negotiating Your Way Towards Financial Peace

Have you ever tried to bargain, or negotiate, your way to a lower price? If you did, were you very successful? If you weren't, you probably didn't utilize Dave Ramsey's seven basic rules to negotiating.

Let's be honest, you aren't going to go out of your way to lower the price on your \$1.49 candy bar at the gas station. But when you are going for those big ticket items, such as a car or that brand-new La-Z-Boy you plan to watch Sunday Night Football in, it never hurts to try and talk the price down. The first rule to negotiating is to maintain your walk away power. The moment you get emotionally attached to the item, you have lost the deal. Secondly, use the power of cash to make the deal. Cash is a very visual tool, offering an immediate transaction while avoiding the threat of debt that credit cards bring. Always remember that silence is golden. When making a deal, just be quiet and shut up sometimes. You would be surprised at how the price will drop once the awkward silence sets in. Once the deal starts to lower, you can use our fourth tip and say, "That's not good enough." This phrase puts you in control and puts the seller in an uncomfortable position. If they refuse to lower the price, then you can use the take away technique in order to get the most out of the deal. For example, if the price of that TV won't come down any more, then you can say, "Throw in that TV stand and I'll buy it at this price." As a buyer, you should always be aware of negotiating techniques the seller will use against you. A very common one is the "good cop/bad cop" technique, where the salesman is usually the "good cop" and the manager is the "bad cop". Finally, always maintain integrity when making a deal. Lying your way towards a deal is not the ethical thing to do, and we want to make and maintain good relationships with those we do business with.

Using these tips to negotiating a deal will help bring you down the path to financial peace. Remember Mustangs and Fillies, "If you will live like no one else, later you can live like no one else!" - Dave Ramsey.

Current Economics students began the "Sifma Stock Market Game" on October 5. The Sifma Stock Market Game in conjunction with Dordt College allows DC-G students in Economics to begin to understand the process of investing in stocks and mutual funds.

It is free through a statewide grant and involves the chance to compete with high school students across the state of lowa. Students are given a hypothetical \$100,000 to invest over the course of a semester. The simulation is part of the lowa Core, under the study of economics, that aims at providing students with an understanding of different financial investments.

Students are encouraged to diversify their portfolio, invest in at least one mutual fund, and learn the beginning skills of looking at long term financial choices.



2015-2016 Drivers Education for Dallas-Center Grimes High School and Meadows

We will continue to offer four sessions of driver's education each year, if we have enough interest. Please call the Meadows school office at 986-0105 to sign up your child for any of these programs. Students must be at least 14 years old and have a permit to sign up, as well as a signed parent permission slip. 8th through 12 graders may sign up for each session. The cost at present time is \$320 for each session. Fees for out of district students are \$375. All payments and permission slips should be made or turned in before the first class. Payment plans may be arranged with the office. Usually the fall and spring session are the busiest. The Fall session is already underway. Below you will find information about the next session which begins in January.

Winter Session 2016---The winter program will begin in early January and

end before spring break in March. There will be a meeting in December to hand out information and collect payment. Classroom days are Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday from 6:45 to 8:00a.m. Most students will drive during their study hall times. If this can't be worked out, before or after school times may be



arranged. All students who drive during study halls will drive at least once on Saturday for 2 hours in downtown Des Moines. Shuttle bus service from Dallas Center will also be available in the morning to bring students to the classroom. Class size is limited to 40 students. Home school students are welcome. Classrooms are held in the Meadows media center. If we don't have at least 12 students sign up the session will be cancelled until spring session.

Infusing Technology Into Foods Classes

Students in high school Family and Consumer Sciences (FCS) Foods classes are using more than just kitchen technology during labs. As students prepare recipes, they are taking pictures of their Mise en Place – a French phrase for "putting in place" – to upload into the app Seesaw.

The Seesaw website says, "Seesaw empowers students to independently document what they are learning at school. They can "show what they know" using photos, videos, drawings, text, PDFs, and links. When students add to their Seesaw journal, content is uploaded, organized by student, and immediately accessible to teachers from any device. Seesaw makes it easy for students and teachers to review progress over time and demonstrate growth." We are looking forward to experimenting with the app a little more in the near future, possibly adding some audio to the uploaded material.

Technology is also used by students to document and keep track of recipes and actual photos of their completed food products. The Google app "Blogger" is used to organize recipes and write reflections of the learning that takes place in the foods lab. At the end of the semester, students will have a virtual recipe collection to access for years to come.


Our fourth grade social studies curriculum is based on the regions of the United States. In studying the Northeast, the South, the Midwest, and the West, each region is taught through the four themes of geography. The students are introduced to the history, the settling of the region, land and water features, wildlife and plants, weather and climate, ways to make a living, and how each region has changed to exist today. The students learn the location, name, capital, and abbreviation of all 50 states as they are presented in each region. Each region is enhanced by a special project where students are involved with research, performance, and/or creative final presentations. Social studies in fourth grade is a vital and interesting adventure through our 50 states!

Fifth Grade - History

In social studies, fifth grade students are completing their first history unit on the Age of Exploration and their study of the ancient cultures for the Maya, Aztec, and Inca. Their second major history unit will cover Colonial America and the American Revolution. In this unit we compare the three colonial regions and the developments that led to the Revolution, with a focus on the background, leadership, and strategy decisions of George Washington. Our final history unit, to finish up the year, will be on slavery and an introduction to the Civil War.

Students will also be preparing for and competing in the Geography Bee as part of our focus on world geography. In the classroom, students have been studying a new continent of the world each month. Geography connections are also found in the *Weekly Reader* periodical, which students regularly complete to keep up on current events.

2015 Elementary Mile Fitness Run

The 27th annual, mile fitness run was held on October 2 in Dallas Center. Over 400 elementary students from fourth and fifth grade participated. The fourth and fifth grade girls ran first, followed by the boys.

The run started at the middle school track before heading up 13th Street to Main Street. From there they went one block west and then came back to the track. They finished in front of the bleachers, where parents and students cheered them on to the finish line.

Prior to the fitness run, the students ran in P.E. class. They ran $\frac{1}{4}$ mile, $\frac{1}{2}$ mile, and $\frac{3}{4}$ mile before running a practice mile. That practice time determined where they started for the fitness run.

Fifth Grader Meredith McDermott ran the fastest time for the girls in 6:15. Ava Gannon was the fastest fourth grade girl with a time of 7:14. For the boys Tate McDermott, a fourth grader, ran a 5:49 time and was the fastest runner of all. Braeden Roberts ran the fastest fifth grade time with a 6:17.

Mr. Nihart, the fourth and fifth grade P.E. teacher, said, "I think the fitness run went very well again this year. I want to thank all the staff, administration, high school cross country coaches and runners, and any others who had a hand in helping put this on. The students really worked hard to do as well as they could."

Dallas Center Elementary Art

The year is getting off to a great start. Students in all grades are very involved with the Art Curriculum.

Kindergarten students have solidified their understanding of the Concept of Line and have been applying their skills to creating pictures using these types of line. The students have also had the fun of painting with a Q-tip as their art tool, while creating a fall landscape, as we discuss how the leaves change color during this season. Since this season includes pumpkins, we are discussing drawing and blending our pumpkins with watercolor, which is a product of our line types understanding and application.

First-graders reviewed the concept of line by creating an abstract similar to that of artist, Kandinsky. While learning the style of Kandinsky, the students used a variety of line types, added heavy color as the students desired, and completed the picture with a diluted tempera wash. They are presently completing their fall leaves project, which is a drawing of a variety of leaves, creating a collage look. They will consider how the changing leaves look and

blend the oil pastel colors to achieve the same. These will be finished with a blue tempera wash, implying the sky.

Second grade students have reviewed their understanding of line and how we can use line, but one area, which is always new to them, is how can we create line without the use of a writing/drawing utensil. If you can create a line with a pencil you should be able to problem-solve how to create a line using another medium. Students created a line collage by cutting their line types from construction paper and gluing them in a randomly planned manner on their paper. Learning to manipulate the scissors and or the paper to create a specific type of line is not as easy as one might think.



Third-graders have enjoyed the start of the color unit as they have blended



the primary color paint to achieve a specific end result. The students learned the method for using primary colors to create the secondary colors. They then had to problem solve the placement of the primary colors along a fold line, so when pressure was applied along the fold line the specific placement would force the colors in those specific locations to blend and create the secondary (and possibly the tertiary) colors. The outcomes are interesting, similar to the Rorschach Ink Blot Test.

Fourth grade students have reviewed the concept of line and are applying their understanding by drawing their fall fruits still life. During this project, perspective is an essential understanding that not everyone will be seeing the same thing from the same side or possibly height. Students are also using their foreground, middle ground, and background understanding to problem-solve the size and height of the objects. The students will learn and practice the blending of watercolor paints to create a more-realistic composition.

Fifth-graders have been pre-occupied with the mini graphic design project in which the students learn that a project has a purpose and the purpose influences the design. Lettering and symbols representing the purpose for the yearbook cover design has everyone trying to decide what to create for the elementary yearbook cover. Students are not allowed to trace or create on a computer, but rather learn by doing. We brainstorm the items necessary to create an informational as well as aesthetic piece of work. Observing previous samples helps students to think about what they want to do, as well as what each student thinks he/she can do. Students are assisted in how to draw what they envision, creating a more successful experience.

South Prairie Elementary Art

This month's highlight is on second grade art. Students have been learning about rural, urban, and suburban areas in their classrooms. In art they learned farming is an important part of their history as well as their community. They created a paper collage of a farm and then created a barn quilt square. They learned the meaning behind barn quilts and how to fold a square paper in different ways to get different designs.

Now, students are using nature as their inspiration to learn to draw from observation. They studied leaves and noticed how the leaf shape shows you the type of tree as well as the texture of the leaves. (They already knew that the veins carry water through the leaves as well as how to draw the tree from first grade). The second grade color focus is warm and cool colors. As small groups they looked at famous paintings and decided which ones looked warm and which looked cool and hung them in each category on the board and talked about how colors choices give different feelings or moods to each painting. They colored

their leaf drawings by blending warm colors with oil pastels and mixing cool colors with watercolors for the background. They had fun discussing the new colors they made by blending each material.






Meadow's Eighth-grader Jayme Augusma's Self Portrait
