## **Letter from the Superintendent**

Dear DC-G Family,

With the recent events throughout our nation, I would like to take time to reassure the DC-G families of the security procedures and protocols in place throughout our district. Whenever students or staff report an incident, we collaborate with principals and if necessary, law enforcement to assess the threat level and determine the best course of action to keep students and staff safe.

Our district has taken steps in the past few years to enhance our safety provisions. We have contracted with Employee Family Resources (EFR) for additional counseling. We have also made changes to our facilities that increase security. Building doors remain locked during school hours, and our schools utilize a buzz-in system for visitors. Three of our elementaries have magnetic strips, which can be used in a situation when a door needs to be locked quickly. Other buildings have doors that can be locked from the inside. We have updated the security cameras at Meadows and High School, providing us multiple views of inside and outside the buildings.

The district's safety committee meets on a regular basis throughout the year. This year the group reviewed and updated our crisis plan. They have also assured that each staff member and substitute teacher were given an ID Badge that they are expected to wear regularly, and made sure that each building was completing their emergency drills in a timely manner.

The crisis plan is frequently reviewed and amended through the district's safety committee and administrative team. In addition, safety drills are implemented at each building to allow students and staff to practice response time and processes in the event of an emergency.

The best strategy for safety is to remain vigilant in our classrooms, schools, and community. We encourage our staff and students to communicate any suspicious activity. The answers to this problem are complex as they seem to be a societal problem. Mental health, emotional dysfunction, anger, and isolation are part of our world today. The safety our students and staff in the DC-G District is our primary concern; therefore, it is important that we continue to have dialogue, practice our safety procedures, and communicate to parents about the extensive measure our school has in place to address the needs of all children. In the April issue of the Mustang Monthly we will be reviewing our safety procedures with families and community members. ## **DC-G Students Win National Competition**

Adam Koch and Tyler Cooney will receive \$5,000 from C-SPAN for their Grand Prize documentary, "Old Enough to Fight, Old Enough to Vote."

C-SPAN announced the winners of the national 2018 StudentCam documentary competition awarding a total of \$100,000 in cash prizes to winning documentaries. Each year since 2006, C-SPAN partners with its local cable television providers in communities nationwide to invite middle and high school students to produce short documentaries about a subject of national importance. This year students addressed the theme, "The Constitution & You: Choose a provision of the U.S. Constitution and create a video illustrating why it's important to you."

C-SPAN received a record 2,985 video submissions from over 5,700 students in 46 states and Washington, D.C. Students across the country engaged in conversation on the local level with elected officials, experts, community leaders and educators to explore how national issues impact their daily lives.

The annual competition is sponsored by the C-SPAN Education Foundation. ## DC-G Student Named Iowa's National Geographic State Bee

DC-G Middle school student, Dante' Chittenden, has been notified by the National Geographic Society that he is one of the semifinalists eligible to compete in the 2018 Iowa's National Geographic State Bee. The contest will be held at the campus of University of Northern Iowa on Friday, April 6, 2018.

This is the second level of the National Geographic Bee competition, which is now in its 30th year. School Bees were held in schools with fourth- through eighth-grade students throughout the state to determine each school champion. School champions then took a qualifying test, which they submitted to the National Geographic Society. The National Geographic Society has invited up to 100 of the top-scoring students in each of the 50 states, the District of Columbia, Department of Defense Dependents Schools and U.S. territories to compete in the State Bees.

To celebrate the 30th annual National Geographic Bee, the cash prize for the top three students in each state has doubled. Each state champion will receive \$200, the National Geographic Visual Atlas of the World, 2nd Edition and a trip to Washington, D.C., to represent their state in the National Geographic Bee Championship May 20-23, 2018. Students that come in second place will receive \$150, and those that come in third will receive \$100. The first-place national champion will receive a \$50,000 college scholarship, a lifetime membership in the Society, including a subscription to National Geographic magazine, and an all-expenses-paid Lindblad expedition to the Galápagos Islands aboard the new National Geographic Endeavour II. Second and third-place finishers will receive \$25,000 and \$10,000 college scholarships, respectively.

Congratulations to Dante' for making it this far in the competition and goodluck as he continues! National Geographic will stream the final round of the National Geographic Bee Championship starting May 24, 2018, at www.natgeobee.org.

## **ISU Field Trip**

Sixth and seventh grade ELP students recently attended STEM Day at Iowa State University as part of Engineering Week. The students were greeted by college students upon arrival and were introduced to a variety of design challenges. Accompanied by Ms. Kluender, they went straight into Design Challenge One, which was to build the tallest tower they could with a limited amount of paper and tape.

Our ELP students then saw a presentation using ISU's Virtual Reality program. This included a demo of a John Deere combine and a Boeing airplane on an aircraft carrier. The students especially enjoyed being able to experience the presentation in a college lecture hall.

Design Challenge Two was to build a bridge out of straws and tape. DC-G students excelled, taking first and second place. Students were then shown science experiments performed by a professor and ISU chemistry students. All demonstrations showed different chemical reactions.

Design Challenge Three required students to think about acceleration and problem solving by making a rocket with a balloon and a plastic bag. Lastly, the students were able to build a helicopter out of paper and predict how long it would take to get to the ground. DC-G students had a great time learning about the many STEM programs ISU has to offer!

### **Next Generation Science Standards**

DC-G Middle School science teachers have been working on implementing Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS) in class and in professional development this year.

While students in Mr. Jaspering's and Ms. Scott's 7th grade science classes were learning about the nervous system, an interesting headline appeared in the news stating that despite their different colors, Skittles actually are all flavored the same. Some articles suggested that the Skittles are actually scented differently, but contain the same flavor. Other headlines went on to say that although most gummy candies have different colors, they are also all flavored the same. Since we were learning about the senses, we decided to have the students test out this theory.

Students were given skittles, gummy bears, and a blindfold. They designed and conducted their own experiments. After completing the experiment, the results were compiled. Based on of their data, 25% of 7th grade students believe all Skittles taste the same while 75% believe they taste differently. On the other hand, the gummy bears produced different results; 49.7% of the students believe gummy bears are flavored the same while 50.3% believe they are different. The students had a great time doing this NGSS inquiry lab. Try it out yourself and see what your results are!

### **Science Curriculum**

The Elementary Science Curriculum Team has been working through the New Generation Science Standards (NGSS) and what this looks like in the classroom. The NGSS identify scientific and engineering practices, crosscutting concepts, and core ideas in science that students should master in order to prepare for success in college and 21st century careers.

These standards allow teachers to teach how students learn best—in a hands-on, collaborative, and integrated environment that focuses on inquiry and student discovery. Teaching based on the NGSS calls for more student-centered learning that enables kids to think on their own, problem solve, communicate, and collaborate with their peers—in addition to learning important scientific concepts. Science committee members are taking these new standards and trying out lessons in their classrooms. Teachers are doing less whole class lecture and providing of information. Instead, students are conducting investigations, solving problems, and participating in class discussions with teachers' guidance.



#### **DECA Goes International**

On February 25th and 26th, DC-G DECA competed in the Iowa DECA State competition. DC-G DECA qualified 33 members to compete with over 550 other Iowa DECA members for the honor to compete in the International DECA competition, April 21st-24th in Atlanta, Georgia with over 18,000 students.

A DECA competition consists of each student taking a 100 question marketing related exam. Students then completed two role plays in which they read a case study and present their solutions to a judge. The role play results are combined with the test score to establish the final rankings. DC-G placed 10 students in the top five in their competition with two students qualifying for the International conference by receiving a top 3 finish in their event. Here are the results:

## DC-G eBackpack

Can't find the bottom of the backpack for handouts? When are the athletic and fine arts camps? We have the answer!

A new link on the school website is DCG eBackpack. No longer will you wonder if your child has lost an important handout! All information regarding upcoming fundraisers, camp registrations, library programs, youth sports camps, and much more can be found by visiting the DCG eBackpack page for your child's specific school building. You can access the direct link from the right side menu or by clicking the "Parent Info" tab along the top of this page. You can subscribe to the eBackpack for your child's school to get automatic email updates every time new information is published.

### **Driver's Education**

We will continue to offer four sessions of driver's education each year, if we have enough interest. The cost at present time is \$325 for each session. Students must be at least 14 years old



and have a permit to sign up, as well as a signed parent permission slip. Eighth through twelfth graders may sign up for each session. Usually the fall and spring session are the busiest. Below you will find information regarding the fall and winter sessions. Fee's for out-of-district students are \$375.

Spring Session 2018- The spring session will begin after spring break and end in May. There will be a meeting before spring break to hand out information and collect payment. Classroom days are Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday from 6:45 a.m. to 8:00 a.m. Most students will drive during their study hall times. If this can't be worked out, before or after school driving may be arranged. All students who drive during study halls will drive at least once on Saturday for 2 hours in downtown Des Moines. Shuttle bus service from Dallas Center will also be available in the morning to bring students in early for classroom work. Class size is limited to 40 students. Home school students are welcome. Classrooms will be held in the Meadows Media Center.

Summer Session 2018- The summer session is held during the months of June and July. Class time will begin Monday, June 5 and end on Friday, June 23. Classes will be every day for the first three weeks from 7:00-9:00 a.m. Driving times will be 6 two-hour periods with a driving partner. Driving times will be scheduled until 3:30 p.m. and may be on a Saturday. If you live in Grimes, your child may be picked up at a central location such as Casey's, True Value, or Kum and Go, and be dropped off there when the driving lesson is over. This needs to be prearranged with the instructor. Driving groups will be able to change times with other groups if necessary. Students will draw numbers for driving times the first day of class. They will choose their own driving partner and driving times. The class limit will be 48 students. Home school students are welcome.

## 2018-2019 Regstration Information Kindergarten & Optional Kindergarten FAQ

#### WHAT DOES THE PRESCHOOL PROGRAM CONSIST OF?

Our curriculum offers a balance of individual, small group, and large group activities with an emphasis on learning centers and child self-selection. The classrooms are planned to stimulate aspects of development by acknowledging each child's individual development, age-related development, and cultural background. Your child will learn by doing, imitating, observing, exploring, examining, experimenting, and questioning in activities and experiences planned according to his or her interests and home experiences. Language and literacy experiences, storytelling and story sharing, creative dramatics, and music are integrated throughout the program as well as numbers, science, and outdoor activities. We also focus on social emotional learning with an emphasis placed upon sharing, belonging to a group, and forming friendships with other children and adults.

#### HOW OLD DOES MY CHILD NEED TO BE TO ATTEND PRESCHOOL?

For the 3 year old preschool program, your child must be three by September 15th, 2018.

For the 4 year old preschool program, your child must be four by September 15th, 2018.

#### WHEN SHOULD I REGISTER MY CHILD FOR PRESCHOOL?

The preschool registration window is open between March 1st and March 18th, 2018. Registration will still be available after March 18th, but we cannot guarantee a spot for your child if registered after the March 18th deadline. Please note that for the 3 year old program only, limited spots are available and a random drawing will be used for placement.

#### WHICH SCHOOL BUILDINGS OFFER PRESCHOOL CLASSES?

Heritage Elementary in Grimes, Grimes Child Development Center (Brighter Beginnings), and Kids Korner in Dallas Center will be the locations for the 4 year old preschool program. Heritage Elementary will be the only location for the 3 year old preschool program.

#### WHICH BUILDING WILL MY CHILD WILL BE IN?

Most Grimes students will be placed at Heritage Elementary, with a few being placed at the Grimes Child Development Center (Brighter Beginnings) along with the students who attend daycare there. Dallas Center students will be placed at Kids Korner in Dallas Center. Once the building and section decisions are finalized, families will be contacted by email, letter, or phone regarding their assigned location and section.

#### IF I LIVE OUTSIDE OF THE DC-G SCHOOL DISTRICT, CAN I STILL REGISTER MY CHILD FOR PRESCHOOL?

Resident students of the Dallas Center-Grimes School District and siblings of current open-enrolled students will be considered first for enrollment into the preschool program. If there is room available when school starts, we may fill the openings with out-of-district students. Please call the Heritage Elementary office at (515) 300-9627 in the meantime to be put on a waiting list, but please do not register online.

#### WHEN ARE PRESCHOOL CLASSES HELD?

4 days per week – Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday

Morning Class (AM) meets from 8:10-11:10 AM. (3 year olds and 4 year olds)

Afternoon Class (PM) meets from 12:15-3:15 PM. (4 year olds)

The preschool calendar runs on the same schedule as the Dallas Center-Grimes Community School district calendar regarding vacation days, early outs, and snow days. However, preschoolers will start school one week later than K-12 students. Home visits by the preschool teachers will be conducted during the week prior to the first day. Teachers will contact you to set up a time and/or there will be a sign-up sheet at the open house prior to school starting.

#### CAN I CHOOSE WHICH SECTION MY CHILD WILL BE IN (AM/PM)?

Since we always have more interest for the morning sections, and we need to balance the classes, you are not able to choose a preference at this time. Students attending the major daycare centers such as First Steps, Imagine Learning Center, Tender Years, Traditions, Learning Tree, Tender Hearts, etc. will automatically be placed in the afternoon section.

#### HOW DO I REGISTER MY CHILD FOR PRESCHOOL?

Please refer to the Registration Webpage and follow the process for either an existing family or a new family to the district.

#### HOW DO I REGISTER MY CHILD IF I DON'T HAVE ACCESS TO A COMPUTER OR HAVE AN EMAIL ADDRESS?

There will be registration kiosks available at South Prairie Elementary, North Ridge Elementary, Heritage Elementary, Dallas Center Elementary, Middle School, Meadows, and DC-G High School. Please come between 9:00 AM – 3:00 PM starting on March 2nd, 2018.

## Kindergarten & Optional Kindergarten FAQ Continued

## I HAVE OLDER CHILDREN ALREADY ENROLLED AT DC-G SCHOOLS. CAN I REGISTER THEM ALL AT ONCE WITH MY PRESCHOOLER?

Yes! Please refer to the Registration Webpage and follow the process for an existing family. Just be sure to add your preschool-aged child to the list of students you're registering for the upcoming school year.

#### WHAT PAPERWORK SHOULD I HAVE READY BEFORE REGISTERING MY CHILD FOR PRESCHOOL?

Existing families with Parent Portal accounts will need a digital copy of your child's birth certificate and your child's immunization record. New families will need the paperwork listed above, as well as a digital copy showing proof of residency (example: a scanned copy of a utility bill with your name and address).

#### WHAT IS THE COST FOR MY CHILD TO ATTEND PRESCHOOL?

The current cost for the 3 year old program is \$175/month. However, this amount could be subject to change. At this time, the Statewide Voluntary Preschool Program funds our district's 4 year old program, and there is no cost to register for preschool. We are unable to fully guarantee this funding for next year.

#### WHEN WILL I KNOW THE LOCATION AND CLASSROOM ASSIGNMENT FOR MY PRESCHOOLER?

Due to increasing enrollment within our district, you will not find out until mid-July at the earliest. You will receive an email, letter, or a phone call once the decisions have been made.

#### IS MY CHILD GUARANTEED A PRESCHOOL SLOT IF I REGISTER BEFORE MARCH 18TH?

As long as you register online before the deadline, you should be fine for the 4 year old classes. If we have more registrations than anticipated, however, we will create a wait list that will allow us to fill the spots when available. The 3 year old classes are filled by a random drawing system only, so your child is not guaranteed a slot.

#### I JUST REGISTERED MY PRESCHOOLER. WHY DON'T I SEE THEM IN MY PARENT PORTAL?

Your preschooler will not be visible in your Parent Portal until the 2018-19 school year begins on July 1, 2018. You will not be able to pay monthly tuition fees (3 year old program) until this time either.
