2019-20 Online school registration will open March 1 for all students. Families With Students Currently Enrolled at DC-G. Please use your Campus Portal Account to access online registration. You will be able to add a student to your account if you have a child that will be entering the district preschool, kindergarten, or another grade level for the first time.

Current Families With New Preschool Student

Please register incoming preschool students March 1 – March 18. If you are not registered by March 18th, there is no guarantee that your child will have a spot.

- * If you have a child that will be 4 on or before September 15, 2019, register for Prek 4 (4 year old preschool will be taken until all spots are filled)
- * If you have a child that will be 3 on or before September 15, 2019, register for Prek 3 (3 year old preschool will be filled by a random drawing)

Please register incoming Kindergarten Students March 1 – March 18 for enrollment purposes.


* If you have a child that will be 5 on or before September 15, 2019, register for Kindergarten (full days) or Optional Kindergarten (1/2 days).

Drivers Education The spring program will begin after spring break in March and end in May. There will be a meeting before spring break to hand out information and collect payment. Classroom days are Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday from 6:45 a.m. to 8:00 a.m. Most students will drive during their study hall times. If this can't be worked out, before or after school driving may be arranged. All students who drive during study halls will drive at least once on a Saturday for 2 hours in downtown Des Moines. Shuttle bus service from Dallas Center will also be available in the morning to bring students in early for classroom work. Class size is limited to 40 students. Home school students are welcome. Classes will be held in the Meadows Media Center.

Our summer program is held during the months of June and July. Class time will begin Monday, June 3rd and end on Friday, June 21. Classes will be every day for the first three weeks from 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. Driving times will be (6) two-hour periods with a driving partner. (Example, a student might drive from 9-11:00 a.m. on a Monday). Driving times will be scheduled until 3:30 p.m. and may also be on a Saturday. If you live in Grimes, your child may be picked up at a central location such as; Casey's, True Value, or Kum and Go, and then be dropped off there when the driving lesson is over. This location must be prearranged with the instructor. Driving groups will be able to change times with other groups if necessary. Students will draw numbers for driving times the first day of class. They will choose their own driving partner and driving times. Class limit will be 48 students. Home school students are welcome.

*All payments and permission slips should be made or turned in before the first class. Payment plans may be arranged with the office.

Amplify is a new Science curriculum being used at the sixth grade level this year. Amplify Science integrates technology thoughtfully and intentionally, in a way to reflect how 21st-century scientists and engineers use technology to enable their investigations and explorations. It helps students to think and act like real scientists and engineers today by using state-of-the-art digital tools. In addition, students work on reading scientific text writings, discussing scientific arguments, and engaging in hands-on learning.

IOWA STATEWIDE ASSESMENTS

Iowa Statewide Assessment of Student Progress Update

Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) legislation requires that states annually assess all students on achievement of grade-level, state adopted standards in reading, mathematics and science. To meet the requirements of the legislation, lowa school districts and buildings must report assessment results for all students in reading and mathematics in grades 3 through 8 and one grade in high school.

The Iowa Statewide Assessment of Student Progress (ISASP) replaces the Iowa Assessments as the accountability test for all Iowa students. The test, developed by Iowa Testing Programs (ITP) at the University of Iowa as per the Iowa Legislature, will be given at Dallas Center-Grimes between April 1st - April 19th.

Unlike the previous assessment, the ISASP will not be timed. At DC-G, students in grades 3 - 5 will take the paper/pencil version of the test and students in grades 6 - 11 will take the test electronically. District training regarding the ISASP will be provided to all teachers and students. Both teachers and students will be able to review samples questions through the PearsonAccess Next website. Sample test questions for each subtest at each grade level can be found at http://iowa.pearsonaccessnext.com/test-prep/. We encourage parents to review sample test questions through this website to gain a better understanding of the expectations of our students. Test results will be available to districts sometime during the fall of 2019.

PTO NEWS




