#### **COGNITIVE ABILITIES TEST**

This notification provides information about the Cognitive Abilities Test and the uses for the results.

Who takes the Cognitive Abilities Test (CogAT)?

Third grade students in the Dallas Center-Grimes Community School District will take the Cognitive Abilities Test (CogAT) between October 7th - 11th. What does CogAT measure?

CogAT measures learned reasoning and problem-solving skills in three different areas: verbal, quantitative, and nonverbal. These skills develop gradually throughout a person's lifetime and at different rates for different individuals. They are good predictors of success in school and are important outcomes of good schooling. CogAT does not measure such factors as effort, attention, motivation, and work habits, which also contribute importantly to school achievement.

SECTION 1 - VERBAL TESTS: Measure flexibility, fluency, and adaptability in reasoning with verbal materials and in solving verbal problems. These reasoning abilities play an important role in reading comprehension, critical thinking, writing, and virtually all verbal learning tasks.

Test 1: Verbal Classification 10 minutes
Test 2: Sentence Completion 10 minutes
Test 3: Verbal Analogies 10 minutes

SECTION 2 - QUANTITATIVE TESTS: Measure quantitative reasoning skills; flexibility and fluency in working with quantitative symbols and concepts; and the ability to organize, structure, and give meaning to an unordered set of numerals and mathematical symbols. These reasoning skills are significantly related to problem solving in mathematics and other disciplines.

Test 4: Quantitative Results 10 minutes
Test 5: Number Series 10 minutes
Test 6: Equation Building 10 minutes

SECTION 3 - NONVERBAL TEST: Measure reasoning using geometric shapes and figures. To perform successfully, students must invent strategies for solving novel problems. They must be flexible in using these strategies and accurate in implementing them.

Test 7: Figure Classification 10 minutes
Test 8: Figure Analogies 10 minutes
Test 9: Figure Analysis 10 minutes

#### Why will the CogAT be administered?

Teachers will use CogAT scores to help students learn more effectively. For example, if a student's results show an uneven pattern of relative strength and weakness, the teacher can provide challenging opportunities for the student to do the kind of thinking he/she does best (building on the student's strengths). The teacher can also provide support for the development of a student's relative weaknesses.

The school district will also use the CogAT test results to help identify academically gifted students.

#### What will the results look like?

CogAT is nationally normed, which means a student's test performance will be compared with the test performances of other students throughout the nation who are the same age. Each student will be given results by national age percentile rank for verbal reasoning ability, quantitative reasoning ability, and nonverbal reasoning ability. A CogAT Composite score will be derived from the results on the Verbal, Quantitative, and Nonverbal tests. The Composite national age percentile rank is a general statement of a student's reasoning ability. A parent report will be sent home to each family. Two-hundredthirty-five high school seniors from 23 area high schools were selected by their schools to attend the National Council on Youth Leadership's (NCYL) 27th annual Youth Salute on

September 9, 2019, at Drake University.

NCYL is dedicated to recognizing, encouraging and developing the leadership skills of youth. The mission of NCYL is to create public awareness of the importance and power of youth leadership, provide information to help build advanced leadership skills, and encourage community involvement in recognition and support our youth. The Greater Des Moines chapter is facilitated by the Robert D. and Billie Ray Center at Drake University, which offers a variety of public awareness activities and programming, including CHARACTER COUNTS!, a widely used character education program.

Dallas Center-Grimes was represented by eight seniors who were selected by staff members for their leadership skills they have demonstrated both in and out of the classroom. They are Molly Cooney, Owen Curtis, Sarah Frett, Jaxon Gambrall, Cody Hall, Riley Hall, Dawson Lego, and Buddy Morris.


Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

On Monday, September 16, the team headed to the Ballard Invite where they were one of eight ranked 3A squads. The Mustangs finished third in a tight team battle, and had three medalists. The team has been lead by sophomore Aidan Ramsey, along with senior Bradley Ramsey, and sophomore Jacob Ewers. Other varsity contributors have

been sophomore Owen Pries, junior Dawson Assink, and seniors Gavin Petrak and Jacob Hochstetler. The JV team has only had one scored meet (Ballard) and trounced a tough field by scoring only 28 points, second place was Carlisle, socring 50 points. Leading the JV at Ballard were, sophomore, Jacob Storey, junior Blake Croushore, sophomore, Cael Wineland, junior Will Augspurger, sophomore Luke Herbsleb, senior Drew Bormann, and junior Harrison Stallman. The Mustangs have three more regular season meets, followed by the Little Hawkeye Conference meet in Norwalk on October 14.

The Mustangs have also enjoyed the chance to be out in the community this year. They assisted with the Grimes Parks and Recreation Run for Fun in the Sun program, and enjoyed bringing their

**Mustang Football** has been working hard this season. They came out strong in the first game, but ended up short with a loss to Pella in the season opener. The Mustangs beat Norwalk in double overtime for their first win of the season! They played their home opener against Ballard and came out on top. Zach Brand currently leads in Rushing Yards at 180 yards averaging 5.3 yards a carry with sitting out most of the game at Norwalk and the

entire game against Ballard due to an injury. Ty Walker has a 66 percent passing completion in the first three games for a total of 376 yards plus 36 rushing yards.
