EDUCATION FOUNDATION EVENT SURPASSES EXPECTATIONS

The Dallas Center Grimes Education Foundation hosted the second annual Raising Education Dollars (RED) Dinner and Auction on Saturday, November 2, 2019. The Dallas Center and Grimes communities showed up to support and helped make the event an astounding success! Over 150 attendees sported their 'red' attire, and participated in both the silent and live auction along with other fundraisers throughout the night. The result was raising nearly \$55,000 for the evening! Proceeds from the event will be used to move forward with the mission of the Foundation, including funding scholarships and classroom grants. Included in the funds raised is \$25,000 that will be used to award two - \$3,000, four-year renewable RED scholarships designed to help ease the burden for students due to the rising cost of post-secondary education.

Attendees enjoyed an evening that began with a social hour followed by a delicious dinner catered by The Radish. Throughout the evening attendees monitored their bids on over 70 silent auction items. A variety of items were donated for the silent auction including a DC-G Cornhole Bags set, DC-G activities camp certificates donated by some of our high school coaches, home decor, DC-G Mustang and Fillie experiences, golf outings, date nights, and much more!

The evening continued with a great message from Kent Stock. He is most well known for being the coach of the 1991 Norway High School baseball team during their now-famous final season.

Under Kent's leadership in his first year as the head baseball coach, this team defied all odds to win Norway's 20th state title. Kent capped off his talk leaving everyone to reflect on a great question - How do you want to be remembered? In addition, Sonya Harwood, DC-G alumnus and a recipient of several scholarships spoke about how helpful having the education foundation scholarship has been as her time is drawing to a close at Iowa State. She shared the importance of education in preparing for a career and also expanding views about life! Sonya was able to have a variety of experiences, including traveling abroad and getting to experience new cultures, partially due to the scholarships she received.

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SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

An important component of maintaining a safe and secure learning environment is proactively practicing safety drills to ensure our students and staff understand what to do in the event an emergency situation arises during the school day. In addition to practicing fire drills and tornado drills, our schools also practice lockdown drills.

An emergency lockdown may be used in response to a potential or confirmed threat situation occurring inside or outside of a school building. A non-emergency lockdown may occur for a medical condition or as a precaution. Although I cannot share specifics of our lockdown procedures for security reasons, I can share that during an emergency lock down only law enforcement is allowed to enter the school and procedures are taken to ensure the safety and security of students and staff inside our building. In conjunction with our safety committee every school in our district conducts one lockdown drill per semester for a total of two lock down drills every school year. These drills are in addition to the four fire drills and four tornado drills we practice every school year in support of state regulations and safety protocols. DC-G has a safety committee and is comprised of school leaders, building representatives and school nurses.

What parents should do to prepare for a school emergency?

- Be sure your child's emergency contact information is correct on Infinite Campus. Notify your child's school promptly if this information changes. The people on this list are the only ones that can obtain your child during an emergency. Please contact your building secretary to update your emergency contact information.
- \cdot Talk with your child about the importance of remaining calm and following instructions in the event of an emergency.
- Have your child practice his or her full name, address, and phone numbers in order to contact you or other authorized adult in the event of an emergency.

What should parents do during an emergency?

- · Do not call the school until notified
- · Wait for communication via school communication system
- Tune in to local television or radio stations
- · Check district social media sites for possible updates. These include Facebook and Twitter.
- Understand that the district may require families to pick up their children at a reunification site other than their school. In this case, please bring your photo ID. The district will communicate the location of the reunification site through the channels provided above.

What should parents do following an emergency?

- · It is important to provide emotional support to a child in the aftermath of a crisis situation.
- · Watch for clues that your child might want to talk, but understand that not all children will want or need to talk about these events. Some children may not express their concerns verbally.
- Be aware of signs that children might be in distress, e.g. changes in behavior, anxiety, sleep problems, acting out, problems at school or with academic work.

The safety and emergency related issues confronting our schools and community are serious. We work closely with DC-G Kids Safety group, made up of parents and community members to help proactively keep dialog open between administration to increase awareness of social emotional behavior and mental health needs in our district. FFA Small Animal Barn

Corteva™ agriscience has generously partnered with the DC-G FFA and financially made it possible for our students to further their academic education through a hands-on learning experience provided by a small animal barn that is housed on school grounds. Mr. Reis, the Ag Science teacher and FFA advisor, reports that up until now they had been utilizing a small corner of the school's greenhouse as an

extension to his classroom to further educate about ag science classes. They have housed at different times, a small number of rabbits, turkeys, chickens, and ducks. This was a great success with the students, but took up some of the horticulture space so the idea to have their own small animal barn was born.

The FFA Barn, measuring 12 X 16 feet, arrived at the DC-G High School November fifth . It has been placed just west of the greenhouse behind the high school. The location is excellent as it is within easy walking distance from the Agricultural Science classroom. Mr. Reis states this barn will be used for small animals that he teaches about in his ag science classes. Students can also house small animals there for their FFA and SAE projects for the County and State Fair if they do not have space at their homes as many of the ag students reside in town. Mr. Reis wants to extend a special thank you for making this hands-on educational experience possible to Kevin Willey and Jenny Birchem, both with Corteva. Willey is the Global Sales Effectiveness Lead for Corteva and is also a member of the DC-G Ag Science advisory group and Birchem is the South Central lowa District Sales Lead for Corteva and additionally donates seed to the DC-G Ag Science test plot annually.

Wellness Wednesday

DC-G High School is launching a new program to promote mental health and wellness for students and teachers. Rates of stress, depression, anxiety, suicide are rising across the country. We believe that it is important that students can access resources and support within the school to identify and address these needs



early. During one Academic Opportunity time each month, teachers will offer different activities or opportunities to learn different strategies to de-stress and take care of their well being. Students experienced Wellness Wednesday for the first time in early November. Some of the different offerings included: free reading, coloring, positive self-talk, restorative yoga, zentangle drawings, Texas hold em, chess/board games, breathing to music, and many more.

On November 12, DC-G High School students participated in a Diversity and Inclusion Summit along with Jolie Morgan and Eric Mohlis. The Summit is a result of a partnership with Des Moines Public Schools and Wellmark to provide a space for conversations for schools to connect and be more inclusive. Topics included intersectionality, micro-agressions, the Ouch! protocol, and a panel of LGBTQ students from area colleges during lunch. Each school created action steps from their morning of learning.





On November 2nd Dance Team Senior members Emily Rutter and Briana Helleso traveled

with their teammates to Newton, lowa and competed in the State Solo Dance Competition. Emily Rutter was recognized and received a Division I Superior Rating. The seniors will compete with their teammates at the Group State Competition in December.

Large Group Speech rehearsals are underway and it is shaping up to be another banner year. DC-G has 130 kids participating in 30 groups - one of the largest Large Group Speech teams in southwest lowa. Students are currently rehearsing their pieces for District Contest held on January 25. At district contest, they will perform pieces in the categories of Musical Theater, Improvisation, Ensemble Acting, Radio News and many more. Students who receive a I rating from their judge will move on to perform again at State Contest on February 8.

Parent preview night will be held on Friday, January 10 at 6 PM in the auditorium. Come see the pieces the students have prepared for contest. Admission is free.

MIDDLE SCHOOL

Sixth and seventh grade Extended Learning Program (ELP) students went on a STEM field trip to Skateland in Des Moines. Throughout the day they had two STEM lessons about how everyday science, math, technology, and engineering affect skating.

The students started with a lesson about the physics of skating. They learned the different factors involved with skating, including velocity, angular motions, and force to name a few. The students then made a makeshift catapult out of popsicle sticks and rubber bands to throw cotton ball. This hands on activity was a favorite. There was a competition to see how far a group of students could launch their cotton balls using certain strategies with their catapult.

The final lesson involved the science of arcade games. This was a lesson about how science, math, and technology can affect how you play arcade games. First the students determined their own reaction times using a ruler drop. In order to do this experiment, they wired an LED light so when one wire touched another, the light would turn on. After some frustrating trial and error attempts, a few groups were able to light the LED light.

Addie Lane and Landon Anderson are being recognized for being the top girl finisher and boy finisher in the mile run assessment at North Ridge.





The Girls Cross Country team capped another successful season with their second straight class 3A State Runner Up finish at the State Championship Meet on November 2nd. The Fillies CC team was made up of 40 girls who together had one of the most successful seasons in school history. They were only beaten by one 3A team all season finishing second to the 3A State Champs Ballard at the Gilbert and Ballard Invitationals, while winning the DC-G and Grinnell Invitationals. The Fillies finished 5th in the large 26 team regional Heartland Invitational in Pella only being beat by schools from out of state and class 4A Johnston and Waukee beating six class 4A rated teams. The team finished 3rd at the Southeast Polk meet behind Waukee and SEP. The JV team continued to be one of the best JV teams in the state scoring a perfect score at three different meets this season.

The team won the Little Hawkeye Conference Championship meet for the second year in a row. All seven varsity runners placed in the top 15 earning them All Conference honors; 2nd place Megan S, 4th Hannah L, 6th Miranda M, 11th Kami S, 12th Lara K, 14th Meredith M, 15th Emma A. Following the Little Hawkeye win, the girls won the State Qualifying Meet for the second straight year. All seven varsity runners once again finished in the top 15 earning them Individual State Qualifier honors; 1st place Megan S, 3rd Miranda M, 5th Hannah L, 8th Emma A, 9th Meredith M, 11th Lara K, 14th Kami S. This qualified the team for the State Meet for the 5th consecutive season and 9th in the last 10. The second place finish at the State Meet this year capped a five year run at

state of 4th, 7th, 4th, 2nd and 2nd! At the State Meet Megan earned her second straight All State Honor finishing in 4th place, she was also recognized as Elite All State by having a top 15 time across all classes at the State Meet.

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
