from gifts, to cards to treats from complete strangers really makes everyone feel appreciated.



Bailey's best advice during this time is to, "Wear a mask! Right now it is the best thing we can do."




HIGH SCHOOL



Joel, along with four other firefighters, are credited with saving a man who was trapped in a house fire in Perry back in April. Due to COVID-19, the annual ceremony has been postponed, but Gov. Kim Reynolds still plans to honor the five men for their heroism. The award is named for the five Sullivan brothers from Waterloo, who were all killed while serving on the USS Juneau when it was attacked by the Japanese during the Guadalcanal naval battle in World War II.
