#### **EDUCATION FOUNDATION EVENT HAS OUTSTANDING SUCCESS**



The Dallas Center Grimes Education Foundation hosted the fourth annual Raising Education Dollars (RED) Dinner and Auction on Saturday, November 13, 2021. The Dallas Center and Grimes communities showed up to support and made the event an astounding success! Over 130 attendees sported their 'red' attire, and participated in both the silent and live auction along with other fundraisers throughout the

night. The event raised \$66,000 for the evening, the most successful fundraising event for the Education Foundation to date! Proceeds from the event will be used to move forward with the mission of the Education Foundation, including funding scholarships for DCG students and teacher classroom grants. Included in the funds raised is \$25,000 that will be used to award two - \$3,000, four-year renewable RED scholarships, designed to help ease the burden for students due to the rising cost of post-secondary education.

Attendees enjoyed an evening that began with a social hour followed by a delicious dinner catered by, Chef Joe Weisz. Throughout the evening, attendees monitored their bids on over 70 silent auction items. A variety of items were donated for the silent auction including a DCG Cribbage Board, DCG activities camp certificates donated by many of our high school coaches, home decor, DCG Mustang experiences, dog walking, date nights, and much more!

Part of the evenings fun festivities was the live auction, which was run by Auctioneer Jared Chambers, commanding the attention and bids on everything from a dinner catered by Chef Joe to a beach vacation! Some lucky bidders went home with an Apple Electronics Package, and others will be working on their golf game at several local golf courses throughout the Des Moines area.

Like Jasper and Fog, Eureka was trained by the same program, CARES - Canine, Assistance, Rehabilitation, Education and Services located in Concordia, Kansas. Guidance Counselor Megann Schultz is Eureka's handler. Eureka went through extensive training that is tailored especially for assistance dogs. During this time the dogs in class learn everything

from basic to more complex commands. Ms. Schultz had to complete a one week training class in order to prepare to pass the Public Access Test and skills training to continue as a certified assistance team handler. Eureka got her name from the family that volunteered to raise the puppies from her litter for the first eight weeks of their life. The family has boys who love to fish, so Eureka's littler is all named after fishing lakes in Kansas.

Eureka and Ms. Schultz graduated on November 5th and she has been working at the Middle School since. Ms. Schultz applied for a successor dog when she noticed Jasper slowing down some. "The wait list is a couple of years long, and I knew it could take a while to be placed with the right dog," said Schultz. Jasper will continue to come to work for as

long as he wants to. He is slowing down and may spend more time in the office, instead of out and about in the building. "When I get ready in the morning and tell him to 'get dressed' he wags his tail and puts his head through his vest, so that tells me he isn't quite ready to retire yet." Schultz added.

**Boys Cross County** Be Light. Be light and quick on your feet. Let the heaviness and outside noise fall away. Be light for others at all times, especially difficult ones. This message was the focus for the DCG Boys Cross Country Team this year. The team became a very close-knit bunch and their efforts to "Be Light" in all phases of life carried them this season. The Mustangs celebrated their season at a banquet on November 9. The Mustangs finished second in the Little Hawkeye Conference, won their fifth District Title, and earned their third straight State Championship! They are the only team in Class 3A to finish in the top seven at State each of the last eight years. Their three-peat is only the 17th ever in lowa, the 6th since 1980, and the first in Class 3A since going to four classes in 2003. Their score of 60 points showed their depth and is the second lowest total ever in Class 3A. The JV team finished second at Conference, as well! JV maintains an impressive 95% winning percentage over eight years, and Varsity has a 91% winning percentage over the same time span. Additionally, there were 33 additions to the record board, including a new school record set for total team time and a new school record in the 5K set by senior Aidan Ramsey; Ramsey also won the Class 3A individual title!

Girls Cross Country The 2021 Girls Cross Country team continued their successful ways this season. After not returning five of the team's top 10

runners from last season, the squad of 45 runners returned to the podium at the State Championship meet. With a third place finish the Mustangs\_\_\_\_

have finished in the top three for the fourth year in row. This marked the team's seventh consecutive year qualifying for the state meet. The varsity squad finished second in the Little Hawkeye Conference and first at the State Qualifying Meet. The Junior Varsity squad won the Little Hawkeye Conference Meet for the fifth consecutive year with a perfect score of 15 points. Ava Gannon was the JV conference champion. Earning varsity All Conference honors were Maddy Stevens 5th, Hannah Little 8th, and Skyler Blessman in 14th place. There were five individual state qualifiers at the State Qualifying Meet, Hannah Little 8th, Meredith McDermott 9th, Maddy Stevens 10th, Skyler Blessman 14th, and Abbey Angus 15th. Maddy Stevens was the team's highest finisher at the state meet in 23rd place. Skyler Blessman earned the prestigious honor of Academic All State as a senior state meet participant with a minimum GPA of 3.8 and minimum ACT of 28. The team was also involved in the community, volunteering to package meals for Meals From the Heartland and hosting a water station at the Des Moines Marathon. The team would like to thank Mr Buttjer, Mrs Melchert, the office staff, Booster Club, and the team's parents for all their support throughout the season. The 16 graduating seniors will be greatly missed, we wish them luck as they finish out their senior year. They had a major impact on the team over the last four years and that will carry forward for many years to come.

Chase Behnkendorf (11), NaTasha Bruck (12), Eli Forbes (11), Aaron Fuentez (11), Alex Pries (10), Madison Stone (11), Campbell Valline (11) and Josh Ward (12) These students spent Thursday, November 18 through Saturday, November 20th at Iowa State University with 600 students from across the state to rehearse with Dr. Edith Copely, Professor Emeritus from Northern Arizona

University. The festival concluded with a concert held in Hilton Coliseum on Saturday, November 20th in conjunction with

the All-

State Band and

All-State Orchestra.
