Match Highlights

France – Croatia

- ⚽ Didier Deschamps became the third person to win the FIFA World Cup™ as player and coach, after Mario Zagallo and Franz Beckenbauer.
- ⚽ Mario Mandzukic netted the first own-goal in a World Cup Final and the 12th in this tournament.
- ⚽ Mandzukic is also the second player to score a goal and an own-goal in the same World Cup match, after the Netherlands' Ernie Brandts in 1978.
- ⚽ Every World Cup Final since 1982 has featured at least one Inter Milan player, including Croatians Marcelo Brozovic and Ivan Perisic in this year's deciding match. Bayern Munich equalled Inter's record when their player Corentin Tolisso came off the bench for France.
- ⚽ Antoine Griezmann converted the fifth penalty out of six awarded in World Cup Finals. It was France's 13th penalty goal in 14 attempts in the global showpiece and their second in a Final, after Zinedine Zidane scored from the spot in the 2006 decider.
- ⚽ Luka Modric became the highest-placed Croat in the World Cup appearance ranking with 12 games played, one more than Dario Simic.
- ⚽ Kylian Mbappe is the second-youngest scorer in a World Cup Final, behind Pele in 1958.
- ⚽ The only higher-scoring World Cup Final was Brazil-Sweden in 1958, which ended 5-2. France's 4-2 win over Croatia follows identical results in Uruguay-Argentina in 1930, Italy-Hungary in 1938 and England-Germany in 1966.
- ⚽ The most frequent scoreline in World Cup Finals is now 4-2, with four occurrences, followed by 1-0, 2-1 and 3-1, which have each occurred three times.
- ⚽ Harry Kane is the second England player to become top goalscorer of the tournament after Gary Lineker in 1986 - coincidentally they both scored six goals.

1		<p>France (FRA)</p> <p>Kylian Mbappe is the fifth teenager to score multiple goals in a World Cup match, following Manuel Rosas (MEX, with two goals v. Argentina in 1930), Edmund Conen (GER, with three v. Belgium in 1934), José Altafani (BRA, with two v. Austria in 1958), and Pelé (BRA, scoring three v. France and two v. Sweden in 1958).</p>
2		<p>Croatia (CRO), Danijel Subasic became the third goalkeeper to save four penalties in World Cup shoot-outs after Harald Schumacher (1982-1986) and Sergio Goycochea (1990). Coincidentally, all three have saved at least one penalty against the host team and advanced from that tie (Mexico-Germany FR in 1986, Italy-Argentina in 1990, Russia-Croatia in 2018).</p>
3		<p>Belgium (BEL)</p> <p>Belgium won the third-place playoff to record their best finish at a World Cup, surpassing their fourth-place achievement of Mexico 1986.</p>
4		<p>England (ENG)</p> <p>Against Colombia England won their first World Cup penalty shootout after three defeats.</p>

5		<p>Uruguay (URU)</p> <p>Oscar Tabarez went joint-fourth on the list of coaches with the most World Cup appearances, alongside Bora Milutinovic and Mario Zagallo (all 20 matches).</p>
6		<p>Brazil (BRA)</p> <p>Brazil scored their 229th World Cup goals to regain the distinction of being its highest-scoring team from Germany (226).</p>
7		<p>Sweden (SWE)</p> <p>Sweden won an opening match at the World Cup for the first time in 60 years. They beat Mexico 3-0 in 1958, before failing to win their next seven curtain-raisers.</p>
8		<p>Russia (RUS) – host</p> <p>Russia sending Aleksander Erokhin on for Daler Kuzaiev in the 97th minute against Spain was the first fourth-substitution in a World Cup match.</p>

9		Colombia (COL) Yerry Mina became the first defender to score in three successive World Cup appearances.
10		Spain (ESP) Against Russia, Sergio Ramos made his 17th World Cup appearance, tying Iker Casillas's Spanish record.
11		Denmark (DEN) Both penalties awarded against Denmark at this World Cup have been spurned.
12		Mexico (MEX) Rafael Marquez became the third player to play at five World Cups after fellow Mexican Antonio Carbajal and German Lothar Matthaeus.
13		Portugal (POR) Cristiano Ronaldo became the fourth player to score in four World Cups after Uwe Seeler, Pele and Miroslav Klose.
14		Switzerland (SUI) Valon Behrami became the first Swiss to play in four World Cups.
15		Japan (JPN) Japan became the first Asian team to beat South American opposition in what was its 19th attempt (15 losses, three draws previously).
16		Argentina (ARG) Javier Mascherano and Lionel Messi joined Diego Maradona as the only Argentinians to have played in four World Cups.

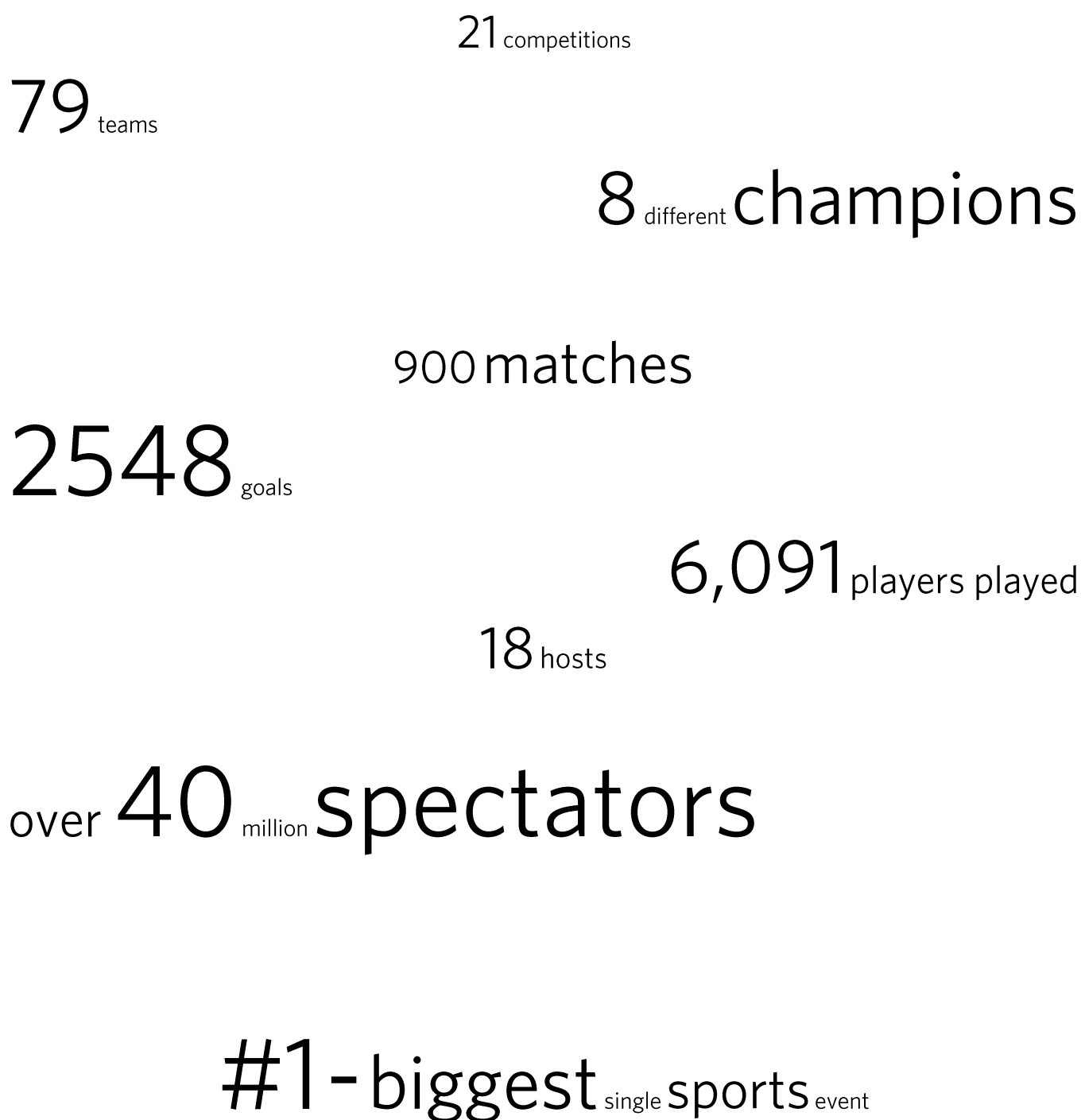
17		<p>Senegal (SEN) Against Colombia, Senegal lost in the group stage of a World Cup for the first time after 5 matches.</p>
18		<p>IR Iran (IRN) Masoud Shojaei became the first Iranian to play in three World Cups (2006, 2014 & 2018).</p>
19		<p>Korea Republic (KOR) Five of Korea Republic's six World Cup wins have been against European opposition: Poland, Portugal and Italy in 2002, Greece in 2010, and Germany in 2018. The other victory was against Togo in 2006.</p>
20		<p>Peru (PER) Against Australia, Peru won at the World Cup for the first time in 40 years and nine outings. Their last victory had been 4-1 against IR Iran in 1978.</p>
21		<p>Nigeria (NGA) Ahmed Musa is now Nigeria's outright leading marksman in the World Cup (four goals). He had previously shared that distinction with Daniel Amokachi, Emmanuel Amunike and Kalu Uche (two goals apiece).</p>
22		<p>Germany (GER) Germany became the sixth defending champions - and the third in succession - to fall at the group stage. The others were Italy in 1950, Brazil in 1966, France in 2002, Italy in 2010 and Spain in 2014.</p>
22		<p>Serbia (SRB) For the third consecutive participation (previously in 2006 as Serbia and Montenegro, 2010) Serbia were eliminated in the group stage.</p>
24		<p>Tunisia (TUN) Fakhreddine Ben Youssef scored landmark goal number 2,500 in the World Cup.</p>
25		<p>Poland (POL) Poland gave Europe its 1,000th appearance at the World Cup</p>
26		<p>Saudi Arabia (KSA) Saudi Arabia were the first Asian side to participate in the Opening Match of a World Cup.</p>
27		<p>Morocco (MAR) Morocco's Sofyan Amrabat came on for his brother Noureddine - the first substitution between siblings in World Cup history.</p>

28		<p>Australia (AUS) Tim Cahill became the first Australian to play in four World Cups. At 38 years and 202 days, Cahill also became the oldest Socceroo to play in the competition, eclipsing Mark Schwarzer, who was 37 years and 260 days against Serbia in 2010.</p>
28		<p>Costa Rica (CRC) Christian Bolanos became the first Costa Rican to play in the three World Cups and their most-capped player in it on nine appearances.</p>
28		<p>Iceland (ISL) Alfred Finnbogason scored Iceland's first World Cup goal.</p>
31		<p>Egypt (EGY) Essam El Hadary, at 45 years and 161 days, outranked Faryd Mondragon to become the oldest player in World Cup history. Fifty-four players in a Russia 2018 squad weren't even born when the goalkeeper made his Egypt debut in 1996.</p>
32		<p>Panama (PAN) Felipe Baloy netted Panama's maiden World Cup goal. Now only five nations have participated but failed to score in the competition, including two from CONCACAF in Canada and Trinidad and Tobago.</p>
