KFF Survey of Women Voters

Early Summer 2024



METHODOLOGY

This KFF Survey of Women Voters was designed and analyzed by public opinion researchers at KFF. The survey was conducted May 23 – June 5, 2024, online and by telephone among a nationally representative sample of 3,102 U.S. women registered voters in English (3,062) and Spanish (40). The project includes separate samples of 928 women registered voters in Arizona and 876 women registered voters in Michigan. Sampling, data collection, weighting, and tabulation were managed by SSRS of Glenn Mills, Pennsylvania in collaboration with public opinion researchers at KFF.

The national sample as well as the samples in Arizona and Michigan were from L2, one of the major providers of voter list samples. Respondents were randomly selected among registered voters identified as female in the L2 voter file and were stratified based on race/ethnicity (African American, Hispanic, Other), 2020 general election vote (voted, did not vote), age of voter (under 30, 30 or older), and party identification (Democrat, Republican, Other), as identified in the sample file. Sampled voters were sent a letter via USPS First-Class Mail with an enclosed \$1 non-contingent incentive. The letter asked the named registered voter to go online or call a toll-free number to complete the survey. Email invitations and up to four reminders were sent to those with a matched email address on file. An SMS (text message) invitation with a link to the web survey was sent to sample with a cell phone number on file. Up to 4 call attempts were made to those with a matched phone number who did not respond to the letter, email, or text invitations. In total, 2,787 completed the survey online and 315 completed the survey via telephone interviewer.

Respondents whose sample information indicated they were Hispanic or a race other than White or younger than 50 years old were offered a \$10 incentive via an electronic gift card if they completed the survey online or via check if they completed the survey by phone. To qualify for the survey, respondents were required to confirm they were the registered voter named in the sample and to provide their gender. Respondents who did not identify as a woman were removed. To ensure data quality, cases were removed if they failed two or more of these quality checks: (1) attention check questions in the online version of the questionnaire, (2) had over 30% item non-response, or (3) had a length less than one quarter of the mean length by mode. Based on this criterion, five cases were removed.

The national sample was weighted using data from two data sources: the L2 voter file and the Census Bureau's 2022 Current Population Survey (CPS) Voting and Registration Supplement. The national sample of women voters was weighted by age, party identification, census region, metropolitan status, 2020 general election vote mode, past primary vote participation, and recent general election vote history based on the L2 voter file; while education, race/ethnicity and nativity were weighted based on the CPS supplement. Women voters in Arizona and Michigan were weighted to national election pool (NEP) region as well as the demographics listed above. Due to limitations in the voter file of Michigan voters, party-identification was not included in the weighting. Instead, the sample was matched to match exit poll result for women voters in the 2020 presidential election, among validated 2020 voters. Each of these weights account for differences in the probability of selection including adjustment for the sample design and stratification by race/ethnicity, age, and 2020 general election vote.

The margins of sampling error including the design effect for the national sample of women voters, Arizona women voters, and Michigan women voters are plus or minus 3 percentage points, 5 percentage points, and 4 percentage points respectively. Numbers of respondents and margins of sampling error for key subgroups are shown in the table below. For results based on other subgroups, the margin of sampling error may be higher. Sample sizes and margins of sampling error for other subgroups are available by request. Sampling error is only one of many potential sources of error and there may be other unmeasured error in this poll or any other public opinion poll. KFF public opinion and survey research is a charter member of the Transparency Initiative of the American Association for Public Opinion Research.

NOTE: Partisan breaks presented in the table below and in all KFF reporting is self-identified in the survey, not from voter file data.
