

Youth work training (levels 1 - 6)

A coherent training route is available for youth workers across Northern Ireland accredited by OCNNI, Ulster University (UU) and the University of Gloucester. This suite comprises of OCNNI Awards and Certificates in Youth Work Practice at levels 1, 2 and 3; a UU level 4 Certificate; and UU BSC (Hons) and Postgraduate in Youth and Community Studies.

This pathway for young people, volunteers and paid staff ensures that knowledge, skills and applied practice is available and suited to meet young people's needs, to work in a range of youth settings and to take on varying levels of responsibility.

1595 qualifications at levels 1 – 6 were delivered in **2019**
