

Vale Laurie Orchard

For the many staff and students of Mitchell Conservatorium who knew Laurie Orchard personally or by reputation, it was with sadness that news was received of his death earlier this year aged 96. Laurie was the grandson of famed musician, music educator and administrator William Arundel Orchard.



Throughout his long and distinguished life, Laurie continued the family's tradition of excellence in music performance, teaching, lecturing, composition and administration, including as the inaugural Director of the Mitchell Conservatorium. Among many honours, Laurie was awarded an OAM in the 2022 Australia Day Honours List. The Orchard family's legacy to the Australian community continues through The Arundel Fund. The Fund is administered by Mitchell Conservatorium and aims to perpetuate the Orchard family's passion "to teach music well" through the creation of educational programs and provision of essential support and resources for both teachers and students of music. Former MitCon Executive Director honoured by NSW Churchill Association

Former Mitchell Conservatorium Executive Director Dr Graham Sattler recently received a Churchill Medallion awarded by the NSW Churchill Association. Graham is highly regarded in the field of music education and a regular presenter at international Music Education conferences.

Graham recently spoke at a number of regional conservatoriums where he outlined the results of his Churchill Fellowship research into best-practice musical inclusion and community music leadership training programs in the US, Canada, England, Ireland, Scotland, Norway, Portugal and Armenia.
