
In a typical classroom, there are students and teachers.




For many, it might seem hard to imagine a classroom with anything more than that.

Luckily, we don't have to scratch our heads for very long because we have some friends who can help—




the **Philosophy GALs**: Guide, Anchor, and Liaison! They embody key ideas about what it is that the *Philosopher in Residence* does.




Guide might seem like a teacher at first, but you'll find that she is actually quite different.



She is the one who introduces the rules and routines.



She also tries to find ways to dive deeper even when things seem simple.



One way she does this is by inviting the students to share their wonders by sharing some of her own.



Anchor is gentle, but strong and assertive too.



When two students are having their own side conversation...



...she gently reminds them with a simple **POPAAT**. (Please one person at a time)



Or, when the discussion seems to be dragging in a new community...



...Anchor might suggest to LMO. (Let's move on)



Liaison is the quietest of the three.




She doesn't say very much, but she is certainly listening.
