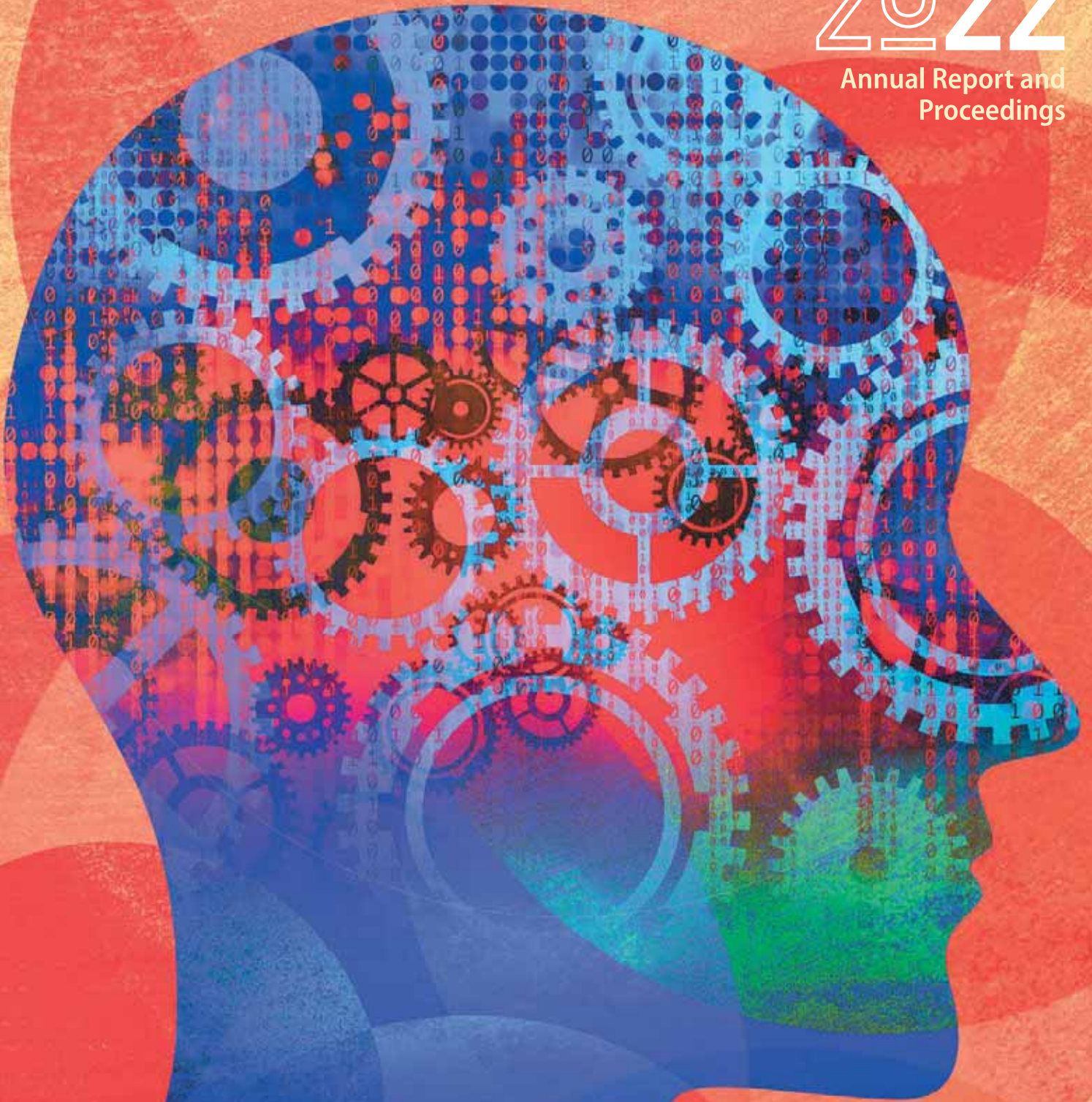

# Message from the Chair of SACSCOC Board of Trustees



## The Pandemic Aftermath

Since 2022, the world, including the higher education community, has lived in and through the COVID-19 pandemic. The pandemic created a catalytic force for change that we had to accommodate. Higher education was forced to take its world of ideas and operationalize them in order to adapt to the compartmentalized world of isolation, while remaining true to our mission, purposes, student enrollments, faculty and staff workforce, and protect the quality of our respective member institutions. And we did it!

Now in the aftermath, SACSCOC must do what accreditors require its member institutions to do. Namely, we must 1) assess the data of our outcomes, 2) use this analyzed data for improvements, and 3) dedicate resources to ensure continuous progress.

The results from surveying our member institutions about how they coped with the challenges of the pandemic revealed that our institutions continued to foster the exchange of ideas among faculty and students, honed skills among both groups and graduated future leaders for industry, classrooms, research labs, and communities throughout the nation. We learned that while enrollments dipped as seen nationwide, innovations occurred in myriad venues both virtually and in hybrid formats.

As we embark on this “after life”, the challenge that faces us in higher education is how do we dedicate our human and fiscal resources to capitalize on the new techniques and innovations. Respondents repeatedly indicated that despite the unwelcomed and painful pandemic disruptions, the modifications and changes have made their institutions nimbler and more resilient.

SACSCOC is committed to ensuring that we serve as a valuable resource of peer evaluators for our member institutions. We honor academic freedom and the respective missions of our member institutions. As an organization, our members represent a diversity of missions regarding research, technical skills, religious education, historically black Institutions, women’s colleges, and specialized and independent graduate programs. We are proud of the exchange of ideas that member institutions add to the national conversation regarding student outcomes and achievements, assessments, financial matters, and other important topics that garner the respect of our colleagues across the country.

While we permit these institutions to grow and thrive in accordance with their respective missions, SACSCOC will maintain the guardrails that the *Principles of Accreditation*—our accrediting standards—provide to all members. Most importantly, these *Principles* ensure to the public that our member institutions adhere to the values of integrity, continuous quality improvement, peer review, accountability, student learning and transparency.

# Message from the President of SACSCOC



## Higher Education and Politics

Over the last three years, since the appearance of the COVID-19 virus, higher education has seen a significant change in the way it does business. In addition to having to make decisions regarding whether or not to close campuses and offer courses/work virtually, wear masks, or get vaccinations, college and university officials have had to deal with state legislatures passing laws about things that, historically, have been the purview of those very institutions. Post-tenure review, academic freedom, curricular offerings, transgender athletic programs, and memberships with accreditation agencies are just a few of the areas in which many legislative bodies have now passed laws limiting or prohibiting the decisions related to each.

Legislative encroachment in higher education is not new but the degree to which such vitriol toward it has grown is. Since 2016 when J. D. Vance, a Republican nominee for senator from Ohio wrote a book declaring that “Universities do not pursue knowledge and truth” but “deceit and lies,” (The Chronicle of Higher Education, Nov. 9, 2022), candidates in states like Florida and Arizona, have passed legislation related to such things as undocumented students receiving in-state tuition, affirmative-action, restrictions on what and how to teach about race and gender, abortion services, and whether masks can be worn on campus.

Higher education as a public good seems to be disappearing and is being replaced with a political agenda that is doing the very thing about which politicians are complaining, that is, teaching only one side of things or controlling the higher education agenda. The restrictiveness of the agenda that is evolving is truly contrary to the way higher education was designed to work as a public good. Perhaps it is time for change; however, one must wonder if governmental control is the best way for that change to occur.

## Philosophical Statement

SACSCOC supports the right of an institution to pursue its own educational mission as inherent in fundamental values of institutional autonomy; the right of faculty members to teach, investigate, and publish freely; and the right of students to access opportunities for learning and for the open expression and exchange of ideas. However, exercising these rights should not substantially interfere with the overriding obligation of an institution to offer a sound educational experience that optimizes student achievement outcomes.

Dr. Crosby earned a BA from Wake Forest University, MS from Florida State University, PhD from the University of Florida, and a graduate certificate in Institutional Research from Penn State.

### Dr. Jay D. Marr



Dr. Jay D. Marr recently joined SACSCOC as a Vice-President after a 26-year long career at Sullivan University in Louisville, Kentucky. After completing his master's degree, Dr. Marr's tenure at Sullivan began in 1996 in student services, where he eventually rose to the position of Vice President for Student Services and Dean of Students. In 2009, Dr. Marr made a successful transition from student services to academic affairs, and he spent three years as Vice President for Academic Affairs and Chief Academic Officer. Later, in 2012, he was named President of the University, and he held that position until late 2022. Dr. Marr began his service to SACSCOC nearly thirteen years ago, and as a former Peer-Reviewer, Committee Chair, Member of the SACSCOC Board of Trustees and Executive Council, he has long had a passion for accreditation and the peer review process. Dr. Marr earned his associate, bachelor's and master's degrees from Ball State University in Muncie, Indiana, and his Doctor of Education degree from Spalding University in Louisville, Kentucky. 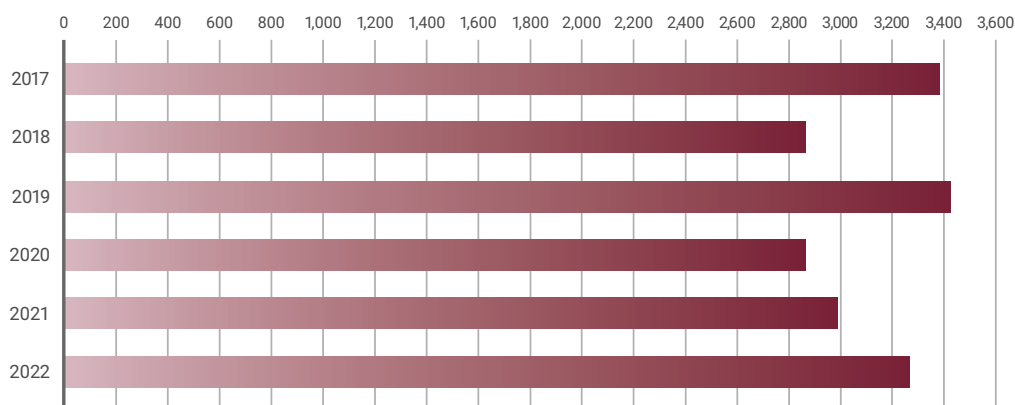

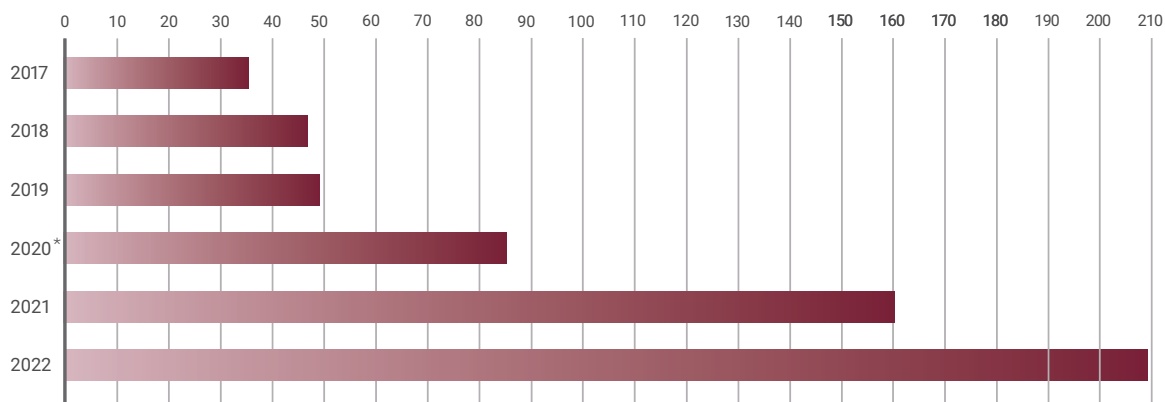

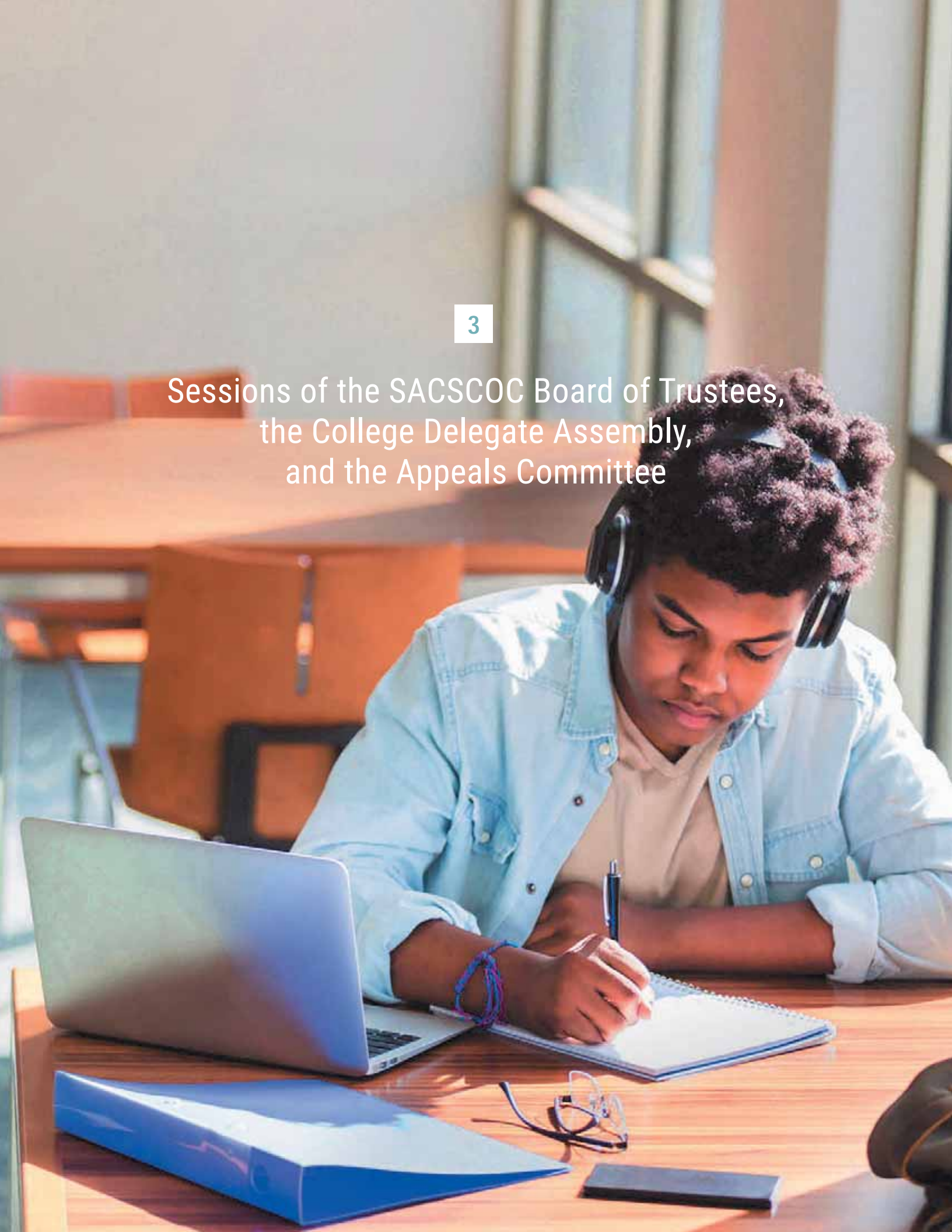

The Committee plans to make recommendations at the June 2023 meeting and presented to the College Delegate Assembly for review and comment before the vote in December 2023.
  2. an overview of SACSCOC's Strategic Plan activities;
  3. an update on the Substantive Change Office activities, which continues to increase; and

4. an update from the Office of Training and Research.
- The Council approved several policy revisions to align SACSCOC policies and procedures with recent changes in the federal regulations. Nine (9) policies were revised, two (2) Guidelines were endorsed, and one policy was deleted since the provisions regarding the closure of programs, sites, branch campuses or institutions are now included in the “Substantive Change Policy and Procedures.” Two (2) new policies were approved. (See discussion of policies below.)

Chair Maloney called on SACSCOC legal counsel, Mr. Patrick McKee, for a report to the Board. Mr. McKee updated the Board regarding litigation involving Bennett College and Paine College. He reported on the settlement and recouping litigation expense from Paine College. A decision in the Bennett matter is still pending.

### President's Report

Following Mr. McKee's report, Chair Maloney informed the board that the Executive Council extended the President's contract for another year. Further, she noted that the Evaluation Committee revised the President's evaluation process. The Chair recognized President Belle Wheelan for her report. Dr. Wheelan expressed her appreciation to all Board members for their dedication and service and for their support. After she presented the proposed budget for FY 2022–2023, there was a motion and a second to approve the FY 2022–2023 budget to include a raise for the staff and to use \$750,00 from the settlement and \$250,000 from the investment account to address deferred maintenance issues at the SACSCOC office. It was approved.

Chair Maloney thanked Dr. Wheelan for her continued strong leadership.

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## **INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT**

To the Board of Trustees of  
Southern Association of Colleges and Schools  
Commission on Colleges, Inc.

### **Opinion**

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges, Inc. (a non-profit organization referred to as the Commission), which comprise the statement of financial position as of June 30, 2022, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Commission as of June 30, 2022, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

### **Basis for Opinion**

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditors' responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Commission and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

### **Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements**

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Commission's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

## Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

### **Notes to Financial Statements**

#### **Note 1: DESCRIPTION OF THE ORGANIZATION**

The accompanying financial statements include the accounts of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges, Inc. (the Commission), a Georgia nonprofit corporation, without capital stock, and a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, Inc. (SACS). The Commission was incorporated exclusively for educational purposes, and is the regional body for the accreditation of degree-granting higher education institutions in the southern United States. The Commission grants normal credit terms to its members.

#### **Note 2: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

##### ***Basis of Accounting***

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP). The Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) provides authoritative guidance regarding U.S. GAAP through the Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) and related Accounting Standards Updates (ASUs).

##### ***Use of Estimates***

The preparation of U.S. GAAP financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Estimates that are particularly susceptible to significant change in the near term are related to the allowance for doubtful accounts, the estimate of defined benefit pension plans and the fair value of investments and financial instruments.

##### ***Cash and Cash Equivalents***

Cash and cash equivalents include cash and all highly liquid investments with an original maturity of 90 days or less.

##### ***Accounts Receivable***

Accounts receivable are stated at unpaid balances, less an allowance for doubtful accounts. The Commission provides for losses on accounts receivable using the allowance method. The allowance is based on experience, third-party contracts, and other circumstances, which may affect the ability of members to meet their obligations.

Receivables are considered impaired if full principal payments are not received in accordance with the contractual terms. It is the Commission's policy to charge off uncollectible accounts receivable when management determines the receivable will not be collected.

### **Note 2: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)**

#### ***Investments***

The Commission reports investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities at their fair values in the Statement of Financial Position. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets in the accompanying Statement of Activities. Investment income and gains restricted by donors are reported as increases in net assets without donor restrictions if the restrictions are met (either a stipulated time period ends, or a purpose restriction is accomplished) in the reporting period in which the income and gains are recognized.

#### ***Property and Equipment***

All acquisitions of property and equipment in excess of \$1,500 and all expenditures for maintenance, renewals, and betterments that materially prolong the useful lives of assets are capitalized. Repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred. Property and equipment are carried at cost or, if donated, at the approximate fair value at the date of donation. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method.

#### ***Net Assets***

The Commission reports information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets that are based upon the existence or absence of restrictions on use that are placed by its donors: net assets without donor restrictions and net assets with donor restrictions.

Net assets without donor restrictions are resources available to support operations and not subject to donor restrictions. The only limits on the use of net assets without donor restrictions are the broad limits resulting from the nature of the Commission, the environment in which it operates, the purposes specified in its corporate documents and its application for tax-exempt status, and any limits resulting from contractual agreements with creditors and others that are entered into in the course of its operations.

Net assets with donor restrictions are resources that are subject to donor-imposed restrictions. Some restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that are restricted by a donor for use for a particular purpose or in a particular future period. Other restrictions may be perpetual in nature; such as those that are restricted by a donor that the resources be maintained in perpetuity.

When a donor's restriction is satisfied, either by using the resources in the manner specified by the donor or by the passage of time, the expiration of the restriction is reported in the financial statements by reclassifying the net assets from net assets with donor restrictions to net assets without donor restrictions.

There were no net assets with donor restrictions as of June 30, 2022.

#### ***Revenue Recognition***

Membership dues, registration fees and exhibits and application and special fees are accounted for under ASC Topic 606, *Revenue from Contracts with Customers* (ASC 606), recognizing revenue when performance obligations under the terms of the contracts with customers are satisfied. Prior to the adoption of ASC 606, the Commission recognized revenue when persuasive evidence of an arrangement existed, delivery of products had occurred, the sales price was fixed or determinable and collectability was reasonably assured. Income from membership dues and certain member service fees received in advance are deferred and recognized over the periods to which the dates and fees relate. These amounts are included in contract liabilities within the statement of financial position.

#### ***Functional Allocation of Expenses***

Directly identifiable expenses are charged to programs and supporting services. Expenses related to compensation, benefits and taxes, professional fees and contractors are allocated based on actual percentages of time spent in each functional area. Expenses related to the office, administrative costs, and maintenance are allocated across functional areas based on a fixed percentage.

#### ***Income Taxes***

Under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, the Commission is exempt from taxes on income other than unrelated business income.

The Commission utilizes the accounting requirements associated with uncertainty in income taxes using the provisions of Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) ASC 740, *Income Taxes*. Using that guidance, tax positions initially need to be recognized in the financial statements when it is more-likely-than-not the positions will be sustained upon examination by the tax authorities. It also provides guidance for derecognition, classification, interest and penalties, accounting in interim periods, disclosure and transition. As of June 30, 2022, the Commission has no uncertain provisions that qualify for recognition or disclosure in the financial statements.

#### ***Subsequent Events***

Management has evaluated subsequent events through the date that the financial statements were available to be issued, December 14, 2022, and determined there were no events that occurred that required disclosure. No subsequent events occurring after this date have been evaluated for inclusion in the financial statements.

#### ***Recently Adopted Accounting Guidance***

In September 2020, the FASB issued ASU 2020-07, *Not-for-Profit Entities* (Topic 958): *Presentation and Disclosures by Not-for-Profit Entities for Contributed Nonfinancial Assets*. The ASU specifies requirements for contributed services. The ASU is effective for fiscal years beginning after June 15, 2021, and has been applied to the disclosures relating to the year ending June 30, 2022 within these financial statements. There were no adjustments resulting from the adoption of this accounting policy.

***Accounting Guidance Not Yet Adopted***

In February 2016, the FASB issued ASU No. 2016-02, *Leases* (Topic 842). This ASU requires that a lease liability and related right-of-use-asset representing the lessee's right to use or control the asset be recorded on the statement of financial position upon the commencement of all leases except for short-term leases. Leases will be classified as either finance leases or operating leases, which are substantially similar to the classification criteria for distinguishing between capital leases and operating in existing lease accounting guidance. As a result, the effect of leases in the statement of activities and changes in net assets and the statement of cash flows will be substantially unchanged from the existing lease accounting guidance. The ASU is effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2021. Early adoption is permitted. The Commission is currently evaluating the full effect that the adoption of this standard will have on the financial statements.

**Note 3: FINANCIAL ASSET AVAILABILITY**

The Commission maintains its financial assets primarily in cash and cash equivalents and investments to provide liquidity to ensure funds are available as the Commission's expenditures come due. At June 30, 2022, the Commission had approximately \$16,608,000 available for use. Financial assets at year-end exclude property and equipment, website development costs, deferred compensation investments and prepaid expenses. The Commission is principally supported by its program service fees. The goal of the Commission is to maintain available financial assets to meet its next 60 days of operating expenses.

**Note 6: LITIGATION SETTLEMENTS**

The Commission filed a lawsuit against a member during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2011. The member was originally seeking restoration of accreditation, of which the court did not grant. The Commission filed suit seeking the recovery of attorney's fees related to previous suits. In October 2011, a release of claims and settlement agreement was reached between them. The member signed a note payable to the Commission for \$600,000, to be payable in ten annual installments of various amounts, with any remaining balance and accrued interest, at a rate of 3%, to be paid on or before June 30, 2022. At June 30, 2022, the Commission has recognized the remaining settlement award as a note receivable in the amount of \$99,000, net of an estimated allowance for doubtful accounts of approximately \$79,200.

During the year ended June 30, 2022, the Commission reached a settlement agreement with Paine College in which the College was required to reimburse the Commission for a portion of the legal fees incurred. The Commission received the full settlement amount of \$750,000 during the year ended June 30, 2022. This litigation settlement amount is reflected in the statement of activities for the year ended June 30, 2022.

The Costs incurred during application development for both website development and database software have been capitalized in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

**Note 9: REVENUE**

Membership dues are accounted for in accordance with ASC 606 and thus recorded ratably over the course of the accreditation period. Membership dues received in advance are deferred until the applicable membership term and are recorded as contract liabilities on the statement of financial position.

Revenue from registration and exhibit fees and application and special fees are recorded at a point in time or over a period of time depending on the nature of the event or activity.

**Note 10: FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS**

Fair value is the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. There are three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair values:

*Level 1:* Quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the entity has the ability to access as of the measurement date.

*Level 2:* Significant other observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs, other than quoted prices, that are:
  - observable; or
  - can be corroborated by observable market data.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

*Level 3:* Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at June 30, 2022.

*Common Stocks, Bonds and Bond Mutual Funds:* Valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded.

*Corporate Bonds:* Valued using pricing models maximizing the use of observable inputs for similar securities. This includes basing value on yields currently available on comparable securities of issuers with similar credit ratings.

**Note 10: FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS (Continued)**

*Mutual Funds and Public Real Estate Investment Trusts:* Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds and public real estate investment trusts held by the Commission are open-end funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and to transact at that price. The mutual funds and public real estate investment trust funds held by the Commission are deemed to be actively traded.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Commission believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine fair value of certain financial instruments could result in different fair value measurements at the reporting date.

***Changes in Fair Value Levels***

The availability of observable market data is monitored to assess the appropriate classification of financial instruments within the fair value hierarchy. Changes in economic conditions or model-based valuation techniques may require the transfer of financial instruments from one fair value level to another. In such instances, the transfer is reported at the beginning of the reporting period.

Management evaluated the significance of transfer between levels based upon the nature of the financial instrument and size of the transfer relative to total assets. For the year ended June 30, 2022, there were no significant transfers in or out of Levels 1, 2 or 3.

**Note 11: CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK**

The Commission maintains cash with a financial institution in excess of the FDIC limit of \$250,000 by approximately \$6,760,000 at June 30, 2022.

**Note 12: COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES**

From time to time, the Commission may have asserted and unasserted claims arising in the normal course of business, most often these claims involve the Commission's denial of accreditation of a member institution. The Commission does not expect losses, if any, arising from these asserted and unasserted claims to have a material effect on the financial statements.

**Note 13: PENSION AND POSTRETIREMENT PLANS**

The Commission sponsors a defined contribution pension plan (the Plan) covering all employees. The Commission makes a contribution to the Plan each year equal to 12.5% of all participants' compensation. Total expense for the year ended June 30, 2022, was approximately \$731,000.

The Commission, along with the Career and Technical Education Consortium of States, Inc. (CTECS), provides certain health care insurance benefits for retired employees and their dependents. The Plan has been closed to new participants. Certain employees become eligible for health care insurance benefits if they retire after they reach 60 years of age and achieve 10 years of continuous service while working for the Commission. The Commission accounts for these benefits under FASB ASC 715, *Compensation - Retirement Benefits* (ASC 715), which requires a company that sponsors a postretirement benefit plan to recognize in its statement of financial position, the funded status of a benefit plan.

Each entity is responsible for employee benefits for employees that retired from each respective entity. Based on the allocations of employees retired from each employer, a portion of the benefit obligations have been allocated to the Commission. The Commission contributed approximately \$59,000 to pay benefits during the year ended June 30, 2022.

**Note 14: DEFERRED COMPENSATION**

The Commission has entered into deferred compensation agreements with certain current and former employees. These agreements require the Commission to pay a portion of each employee's salary into a salary continuation account that is invested into certain investments as defined by the agreements. These payments are required to continue through each employee's stated vested date. Upon retirement and participant request, the fair values of the salary continuation accounts are to be paid to the employees in sixty substantially equal monthly installments. At June 30, 2022, the investments – deferred compensation consist primarily of common stocks and are presented at fair value based on Level 1 measurements.

**Note 15: RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS**

The Commission has an agreement with an insurance carrier whereby the Commission's group health insurance are partially self-insured. Under the agreement, the Commission funds each employee and/or his/her dependent claims up to a maximum of \$50,000 annually. The maximum liability to the claim fund cannot exceed \$1,000,000 annually.

At June 30, 2022, the Commission had no unfunded liability for submitted claims. Claims for occurrences prior to June 30, 2022, were unknown at that date and are estimated to be insignificant.

As discussed in Note 13, the Commission also maintains a plan that provides certain health care insurance benefits for retired employees and their dependents. The Commission has certain employees and former employees that participate in this plan. The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools accounts for these benefits under FASB ASC 715, which requires an entity that sponsors a postretirement benefit plan to recognize in its statement of financial position, the funded status of the benefit plan. Accordingly, the entire funded status at June 30, 2022, has been recorded by SACS.

**Note 15: RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS (Continued)**

The Commission's portion of the obligation in the amount of \$948,681 has been recognized as due to related party - postretirement benefit obligation in the accompanying statement of financial position.

During the year ended June 30, 2022, the Commission charged CTECS \$52,500 for the use of business administration personnel and office space. At June 30, 2022, the Commission had a receivable of \$24,140 due from CTECS for various operating expenses paid by the Commission on behalf of CTECS.
