Yearly, the UOU enforces congress mandated compliance for over 300 undercover agents and over 1,100 active confidential informants through field reviews and audits. To satisfy capability requirements for the transparent functioning of the CUCs, the UOU requires that the CUC community attend an Undercover Operations Training.
