Introduction



- The 2022/23 capital budget and 2022/23 2026/27 capital improvement plan advances projects that **improve the health**, **safety and quality of life of City residents.**
- The projects address issues in a priority order, making Government more efficient and responsive.
- Projects this year include a continued commitment to:
 - Roads and Drainage
 - Shoreline
 - Transportation
 - Public Safety (Improvements to Police & Fire Assets)
 - Buildings
 - Grounds Tree, Dune Plantings, Fencing
 - Parks Rehabilitation of City Park and Playgrounds
 - Equipment
 - Technology
 - Sewer Waste Water Treatment Plant Improvement and Rehabilitation of Sanitary Sewer System
 - Water Replace aging Infrastructure
 - Various/Miscellaneous Economic Development

Capital Budget Process

- January 2022 Request sent to all Department Heads and Commissioners to fill out Capital Project Summary Forms. Each form contains the following:
 - Name of Department Requesting Project
 - Project Category (equipment, infrastructure, building, technology, etc.)
 - Description of the Project
 - Project Justification
 - Estimated Cost of Construction
- February 2022 Capital Project Summary Form Due
- March 2022 City Comptroller, DPW Commissioner and City Manager conduct meetings with Department Heads and Commissioners regarding proposed projects.

Capital Budget Process (cont.)

- March 2022 During the same time period DPW performs a comprehensive review of existing available funds from prior year Capital Budgets that are available and have not been utilized.
- April 2022 Additional meetings are conducted with Commissioners and Department Heads to prioritize proposed projects.
- April 2022 Projects are selected and incorporated in the Capital Budget/Capital Improvement Plan
- By April 30, 2022 -The proposed Capital Budget/Capital Improvement Plan is submitted to the City Manager and City Council. Capital Budget is published (April 19, 2022)
- Prior to the Public Hearing The proposed Capital Budget/Capital Improvement Plan is submitted to the City Clerk and made available for inspection prior to the Hearing on the document
- May 17, 2022 A Public Hearing is held on the Capital Budget/Capital Improvement Plan.
- After the Public Hearing and prior to adoption, comments are addressed.
- The City Council will vote to adopt the Capital Budget/Capital Improvement Plan.





Sewer

- Sewer System Component (mains and services) for Complete Street Projects
- Emergency Sewer Repairs/Replacement
- Long Beach Wastewater Treatment Plant Consolidation Project
- Nassau County and the City of Long Beach are working collaboratively to convert the City's WWTP to a pump station that will ultimately transport all LB wastewater directly to Bay Park for treatment. The proposed pump station and 19,300 linear foot 24" diameter force main will transport wastewater flow from the Long Beach to Bay Park WWTP. The project is comprised of two components, i.e., the Force Main Construction (left) and Conversion of the plant to a pump station (right). Both projects are 100% designed and ready to be bid. Construction is scheduled to be completed by September 2025. The project cost is approximately \$100 million.




Plan Summary


- The Department of Public Works requests \$7.3 million in 2022/23 general fund improvements for this year.
- \$3.7 million has been requested for Sewer and Water fund projects as well. Proposed appropriations, not including grant funded projects, are shown in the table below:


