
SCHOOL'S ARTS PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Students in high school grades were able to take one to two semesters of visual arts. Students worked on standards-aligned visual arts assignments to build their secondary school arts portfolios through painting, sculpture and graphic design. Third year students were able to design independent study courses in the visual arts according to interest and school capacity. Some students in high school also received an independent arts study using whichever programs they wished.


High School Arts Participation: The figure below shows the percentage of students participating in arts classes by grade and by arts discipline during the 2020-21 school year.

Note: With the shift to remote learning in March 2020, NYSED waived the unit of study instructional time requirements for the remainder of the 2020-21 school year.
