# SCHOOL'S ARTS PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

P.S. 169, Sunset Park School is a Title I elementary school with a diverse population of 948 students. We value the arts and utilize it to support our large English as a second language (ELL) and special needs students' social emotional, academic and creative needs. Our unique arts curriculum provides our students with daily exposure to a sequential and meaningful Blueprints for Teaching and Learning in the Arts-based visual arts and music programs that are aligned with Common Core State Standards (CCSS). Students regularly learn new techniques and engage in group projects. We encourage students to submit original artwork to visual arts contests and citywide festivals. Some of the many accomplishments are four exemplary artworks selected as semifinalists in PS ART and four others selected to the Brooklyn Borough Arts Festival and exhibited in the Brooklyn Children Museum. This year we are welcoming the community to share our schoolwide visual arts exhibit as part of our curriculum night. For the 2023-2024 school year, we are hoping to expand the arts programs with grant fundings. Through the Cultural After School Adventures (CASA) grant we plan on working with the Brooklyn Arts Council (BAC). Through the Multiple Language Learners and Students with Disabilities Grant we plan on partnering with Marquis Studios. Through The Arts and Family Engagement grant we will offer parents/family engagement virtual tri-lingual workshops in the visual arts. As we continued to provide a meaningful hands-on art-making experiences, we are committed to support our emerging artists and foster their interest and appreciation for the arts.


