SCHOOL'S ARTS PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Public School 138M's arts instruction is designed to provide opportunities for students to interact and communicate with the artists, as well as classmates, in differentiated and therapeutic multi-sensory experiences. Our instructional goals are: to increase skills for exploring movement, music and visual arts processes; to increase sound/music production skills using age/ability/interest-appropriate experiences; to support positive behaviors through increased, multi-modality communication and expressive skills; and to make connections to core content concepts and skills. Our professional goals are: to increase staff skills for aligning core concepts and skills to relevant and meaningful arts activities; to increase content knowledge and develop improved skills for integrating the arts across content areas to promote academic achievement; to expand strategies supporting student communication, positive behaviors, and independence. Collaborating artists are implementing strategies that align with students' varied abilities, preferences, and ages. They provide engaging interactive opportunities to learn successful art skills and techniques. Students demonstrate gains in sensory skills that positively affect both communication and behaviors.






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
Middle School Arts Participation: The figure below shows the percentage of students participating in arts classes by grade and by arts discipline during the 2022-23 school year.



NYSED Middle School Arts Guidelines and Requirements: This graph shows the percentage of 8th grade students in this school in June 2023 who have taken at least one half-unit in an arts discipline and a second half-unit in a different arts discipline over the course of 7th and 8th grade (one half-unit is the equivalent of approximately 55 hours of instruction by a licensed, certified arts teacher).
