

## SCHOOL'S ARTS PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Two goals in furthering the arts program at P.S. 173 include a plan to continue to train classroom teachers to incorporate more arts into content areas and to continue to increase students' awareness and appreciation of the arts through parent involvement and outside partnerships. Children in grades K-2 are exposed to a range of theater topics such as pantomime, storytelling, puppeteering, creative movement, as well as performing scenes and readers theater. It is our goal, to host a Theater Arts Residency for our children to continue to expand their repertoire of skills that can be showcased to our entire school community. The music program focuses on song and musical repertoires drawn from poetry and storytelling. This dialogue of shared feelings is a bridge for Social Emotional Learning. Students also learn the Five Strands of Learning by playing, singing, reading, and listening which impacts their physical, verbal, emotional and cognitive responses. In visual arts, students are taught skills and techniques as they experiment and explore materials. Students in the upper grades will continue a sketchbook practice. Social and emotional themes are weaved into projects illustrating community, identity, and relationships. Plans for next year include partnerships with arts organizations and greater exposure to art history, architecture, and design.




